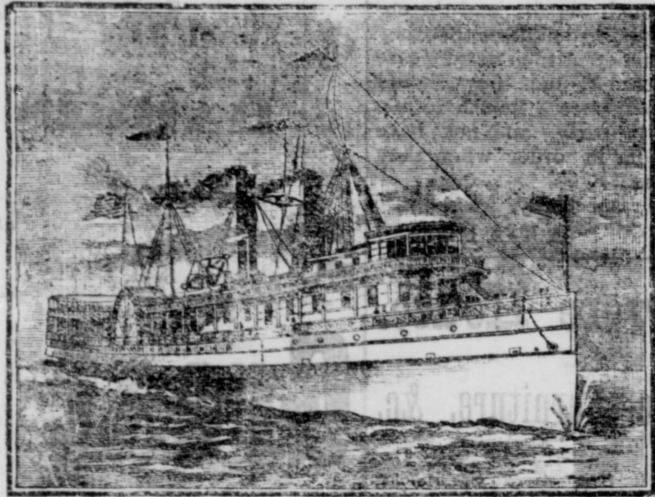

Italy's population is 29,943,607.
Brooklyn has now almost 1,000 electric
lights on her streets.
There are four millions of men under
arms in Europe to-day.
The customs duty collected at Winnipeg
in August was \$46,778.
The balloon for the Paris exhibition of
1889 will carry 100 persons.
During the year 1886 thirty-six telegraph
offices were opened in China.
The 17 months old King of Spain has a
salary of \$1,000,000 per year.
Admiral Vignes and party have returned
from their trip to British Columbia.
The bank of England has advanced its
rate of interest from 3 to 4 per cent.
Many a man has ruined his eyesight by
sitting in the barroom looking for work.
There are about 30,000,000 Mohammed-
ans in the north-east and south-west of
China.

There was an increased area of no less
than 76,988 acres under cultivation in Ire-
land last year.
A shipment of Canadian cheese to Japan
via British Columbia has been made from
Belleville, Ont.

The Bulgarian Government has this
year given orders for 124,000 medals for the
army for bravery.

Quoting the vital statistics of a certain

7,380 were children."

An extensive Italian colonization scheme
is being considered by a number of Italian
residents of Montreal.

The Queen directs that her Jubilee gifts
be publicly exhibited in the St. James
palace for three months.

It is said that the convict population of
the United States, not counting the rogues
out of jail, is 64,349, or one to every 930
inhabitants.

Washington Square Methodist Episcopal
Sunday School, New York, has contributed
\$46,893.50 to missions during the past
two years.

Mollie Garfield, the daughter of the late
president, is to be married this month to
Mr. Stanley Brown, who was her father's
private secretary.

The abolition of the wooden railway
bridge is now being called for. There are
2,500 miles of wooden bridges and trestle-
work on the American lines.

There were 7,558 photographers in the

miles west of Mattawa. Prospectors say
the quartz is of good paying quality.

of Yale in the class of '78, recently visited
Saratoga. He is a Hong Kong tea mer-

chant, has about 45,000 acres of tea under
cultivation and employs 4,000 coolies.

Sing or comfortably located in Canada.

The census of paupers in London, ex-
clusive of lunatics, in asylums and vagrants
for the first week of July shows: Indoor,
52,816; outdoor, 35,029; total, 87,845;
against 83,849 for the corresponding week
of 1886. These are rather startling figures.

Cincinnati is to have a monument to the
memory of President Harrison. Artists are
now at work on the designs, and a selection
will soon be made. The statue will be
unveiled in the fall of 1888, on the centen-
nial anniversary of the city of Cincinnati.

Here is a good bit of advice given by a
contemporary to a young man who con-
templated joining Henry George's anti-
poverty society: Marry an economical girl,

treasurer.

has always been accustomed?" Young
Man—"I think so, sir." She refused to go

had nothing to wear."

At Kamouroska, Q., a few days ago, a
boy, not knowing it was loaded, pointed a
gun at some children with whom he was
playing, when the cap exploded and the gun
was discharged. One child was shot in the
stomach and another in the arm. It is
thought both will recover.

When you sneeze—as you are now begin-
ning to do—it will be well to know what
you are doing. According to the latest
scientific authority, a sneeze is but "an
affection of the respiratory nervous centre,
the afferent impulse of which is conveyed
by the trigeminal nerve fibres."

The schooner Dido, of and from St. Ann's
Bay, Jamaica, bled, and New York, has
been abandoned at sea and the crew landed
on the coast of Carolina. She was built at
Summerside, P. E. Island, in 1882, was 120
tons register, and was insured in Halifax
for about \$5,000.

The report of the Deputy Minister of
Finance states that silver to the value of

portable telephone has just been made
known by two Belgians. The machinery
consists of a copper wire and a small bat-
tery to be carried in the pocket. When
required to communicate with persons at a
distance the wires are simply stuck in the
ground.

King Otto of Bavaria is crazy on the sub-
ject of shooting people. Every day he is
allowed to take a gun containing a blank
cartridge, and fire at a man who is pur-
posely skulking among the trees on the
Nymphenburg palace. The man falls as if
killed, and the mad king's desire is appeas-
ed for the day.

It is not generally known that in Ethio-
pia a people numbering about 200,000
have the Old Testament in Ethiopic version
and still adhere strictly to the Mo-
saic ceremonies and laws. They are the
children of Hebrew immigrants who in the
time of the great dispersion settled in Aethi-
opia and married wives of that nation.

The manufacture of corsets is becoming a
most important industry in Wurtemberg,
about 10,000 people being now engaged in
the trade. Large quantities of woven cor-
sets are exported to Brazil, La Plata, Eng-
land and the United States. The amount
sent to the last named country is, however,
less now than previously, as the United
States has also begun to manufacture this
article.
