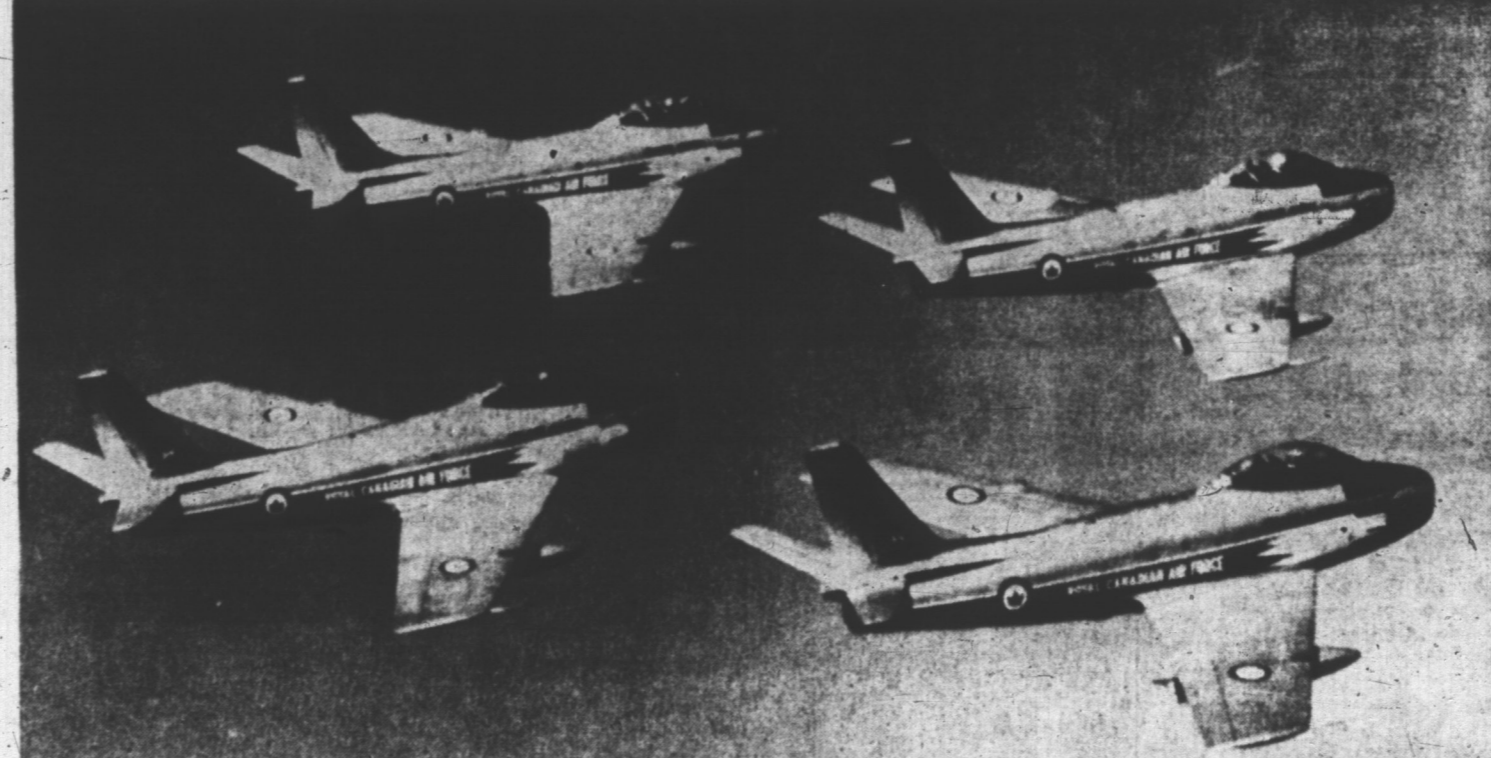

### Scotia Takes Trucks Today

MONCTON — The C.N.R. ferry Scotia II resumes summer service across Northumberland Strait today. The ship, arrived at Cape Tremontine last night from Montreal where she was made ready for operation between Cape Tremontine, N.B., and Borden, P.E.I. Canadian National Railways has placed this vessel into service specifically to carry trucks between the P.E.I. terminal and the New Brunswick mainland, with a schedule of three round-trips daily. Automobiles will be transported if there is any available space after all waiting trucks have been taken aboard. Scotia II will operate in conjunction with the ferries Abegweit and Prince-Edward Island, the three ships making a total of 26 schedule trips each day. This is the first time that three ferries have been assigned to the Strait run.

### Brazil Tackles Job

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — The Brazilian Navy said an unidentified submarine's periscope was sighted Wednesday in the Atlantic off the northeastern state of Bahia. A communique said a naval force maintained contact with it for 20 minutes but did not fire because of lack of opportunity. Two torpedo boats chased the submarine. The sub was first reported fired upon but the navy later denied this. The communique said the submarine was running at about four knots submerged and Brazilian submarines were moving on the surface.

### LOCATE SPOT

The contact was reported between Porto Seguro and Caravelas, about 1,000 miles from Rio de Janeiro. The navy would not elaborate on what was sighted. At one point the communique said what was sighted was something like a periscope different from the Brazilian type. A diplomatic source said it was unlikely that a friendly submarine would be in these waters. He said there are no United States submarines in the South Atlantic at this time. Last May 29 the U.S. Navy said it had investigated a report of the sighting of an unidentified submarine in the Gulf of Mexico.

### SHARK STORY PROVES HOAX

LOS ANGELES (AP) — That account of a watch in a shark's stomach turns out to be just a whopper of a fish story, it was reported Tuesday. The Los Angeles Mirror-News quotes the teller of the tale, Joe St. Denis, as admitting it was a hoax. "Well, with the shark scare on and everything, we got this idea," St. Denis told a reporter. "I called in to the radio station that we caught a huge shark, cut it open, and found a man's watch in its stomach." When he got back to shore last week, the pressure was on to produce the watch. "A jeweler gave me some old parts. I smacked them around a bit, and dipped them in acid to look more real. There was no shark. There was no watch. There was nothing. It was just a joke, a gag. It sounded funny at the time."

## \$9 Million Federal Grant Goes To Two Provinces

OTTAWA (CP) — Construction of thermal power plants in the Maritimes may get \$9,000,000 federal aid in this fiscal year, the government indicated Wednesday in the Commons. Resources Minister Alvin Hamilton said this would be part of federal assistance towards increased electrical production in the seaboard area. Replied to questions from H. J. Robichaud (I. — Gloucester), Mr. Hamilton said he estimates that \$3,450,000 may be paid in the current fiscal year, ending next March 31, toward a 20,000-horsepower steam power plant at Trenton, N.S., and \$5,632,953 for a steam power plant in East Saint John, N.B. Work already under way at the East Saint John plant would cost an estimated \$10,000,000 to complete. The minister's figures showed that from the 1957-58 fiscal year through the current one, about \$19,850,000 is being provided for thermal power plants, subventions for coal used in producing industrial power and power transmission in the Maritimes. This comprises \$6,870,400 for Nova Scotia and \$10,980,000 in New Brunswick.

## Deputy Red Premier Has Chat With Yanks

By RALPH HARRIS WASHINGTON (Reuters) — Frol Kozlov, a first deputy premier of the Soviet Union, met with President Eisenhower and State Secretary Christian Herter Wednesday. The exchanges were described by officials who were present as the friendliest ever held between leading Soviet and United States statesmen for years. Kozlov, the affable, grey-haired deputy to Nikita Khrushchev, emerged from the White House, beaming and talking with enthusiasm about the "wonderful" conversation he had held with the president. But it was obvious to observers even before Kozlov had ended his exchange in the president's office that the "unusually friendly atmosphere had failed to narrow the gap between the negotiating positions of the Soviet Union and the Western powers on Berlin and Germany. The scene in Mr. Herter's office was authoritatively described in these words: "Mr. Kozlov played the old Gromyko record, and Mr. Herter played his own right back." The president told a press conference held shortly before he met Kozlov that he "certainly will attempt to promote and develop some ideas that we hope will be fruitful" but ruled out any idea that the U.S. would recede from the basic principles of its policy on the Berlin and German questions.

## Adenauer's Candidate Is Germany's Winner

By SEYMOUR TOPPING BERLIN (AP) — Heinrich Luebbe, the hand-picked candidate of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, Wednesday was elected president of West Germany. The election by the 1,038-member electoral college went off without incident despite the threats and protests of the Communists. The Reds had warned that holding the convention in West Berlin, 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain, was a dangerous affront to East Germany. The voting demonstrated that the 83-year-old chancellor, despite recent grumbling over his whip-cracking tactics, was still in command of his rump Christian Democrat Party. The 64-year-old Luebbe, a short wiry man little known except for his record as agriculture minister for the last six years, was elevated to the ceremonial presidential job on the second ballot. He got 526 votes, six more than needed. SCHMID-SECOND Carlo Schmid, 62, a scholarly 62-year-old socialist candidate, was second with 306. Max Becker of the Free Democrats received 90. The first ballot followed party lines, with Luebbe polling 517 votes, one vote more than there were Christian Democrats in the electoral body. Schmid got 305 and Becker 104. More than a score abstained on each ballot. The socialists and Free Democrats had hoped to slip one of their candidates in if any substantial number of Christian Democrats bolted on the secret ballot. Physical Fitness Comments Noted TORONTO (CP) — The deputy to Prince Philip as president of the Canadian Medical Association said Tuesday night CMA members are "all dieting."
