The Dynamite Conspirators.

LONDON, June 15. The trial of the dynamite conspirators—Dr. Gallagher, Bernard Gallagher, Ansburg, Curtin, Whitehead and Wilson—began on the 11th, was concluded yesterday. The prisoners were charged with an offence approaching high treason. In the trial it was necessary to prove that all prisoners included in the indictment for treason-felony intended to levy war against the Queen. In order to establish this offence, it was sufficient to show a conspiracy existed to take lives and destroy property, without regard to who suffered. Bernard Gallagher was in a different position from the other prisoners. His own statement might be considered to connect him with the dynamite plot, but the evidence regarding him required very careful weighing so as not to risk punishing an innocent man. Lynch, the informer, repeated the testimony concerning the doings of the conspirators he gave at the preliminary hearing. Dr. Gallagher, Wilson, Whitehead and Curtin were found guilty of treason-felony, and were sentenced to penal servitude for life; and Ansburg and Bernard Gallagher were acquitted.

A Plot to "Remove" the Careys.

DUBLIN, June 15. The city police have discovered a plot to "remove" James Carey and other informers.

Telegraph Notes.

A landslide has occurred in Kuczurmara, in the Duchy of Bukovina, Switzerland, by which 112 houses were destroyed.

London Truth states that the Queen has quite recovered from the injury to her knee. It is the intention of the Queen to leave Scotland on the 20th instant, and arrangements for the departure are being made.

The Paris La Debates says two envoys from the Annamite King have arrived at Saigon and protested against the action of the French at Hanoi. They said the king desired a peaceful solution of the present difficulty.

An explosion occurred on the 13th on board a tug in Rio Chuelo, near Buenos Ayres, killing eight persons and seriously injuring nine others. Four were blown a great distance, and horribly mutilated, and one was smashed to pieces against a house.

A negro named Jordan Corbin entered the house of Benj. Carden, Rockford, Ala., on the 13th, and, without any provocation, shot him, his wife and son dead. The fugitive escaped and gave the alarm. Scouting parties are hunting the country for the murderer.

The London Standard's Shanghai despatch, dated Monday, says the situation is becoming very serious. Chinese troops are massing around the city. A very uneasy feeling prevails among foreigners with regard to the unprotected condition of the foreign settlements.

An explosion took place on the 13th, in a factory at Scutari. Late accounts regarding the explosion say it was caused by lightning and state that 150 persons were killed and 53 wounded. Two hundred barrels of gunpowder and six thousand cartridges were destroyed.

Private advices from Vera Cruz state that yellow fever is very bad there. The authorities are trying to conceal the fact and physicians and newspapers there will give no account of the number of deaths occurring. The fever is reported to be of an intensely malignant type.

The Rome correspondent of the New York Herald had an interview on the 13th with Cardinal Simeoni, who made the following statement: The letter to the Irish Bishops had no political aim or purpose. Into political questions the Holy Father cannot and does not enter. The letter was disciplinary and written in the interests of morality and discipline only. It could matter nothing or very little to the Holy Father whether Parnell received a testimonial of 10,000 or 100,000, or 1,000,000 lire. Parnell was personally not in the mind of the Holy Father or the Propaganda when the letter was issued, but behind Parnell, and sheltered under the prestige of his name, are many agitators, Irish and American, whose conduct is immoral and revolutionary, tending to sow dissension between nations and to create a branch between priests and people.

A Berlin despatch says:—In relation to the retirement from political life of Herr Von Benningsen, it is stated that after the receipt of the last note addressed to Prussia by the Vatican, Bismarck was undecided as to whether he should break off negotiations with the Vatican. He therefore sounded Herr Von Benningsen on the subject of effecting a compromise with the latter's party, the National Liberals. The interview convinced both that a common policy was impossible. Bismarck decided to rely on a Clerical and Conservative majority. In the debate yesterday, on the Church bill, in the Lower House of Lantag, Herr Windthorst, Ultramontane leader, reiterated the hope that the Government and Conservatives would unite and improve the bill by accepting the amendments proposed by the centre. If they did not accept them he said the centre would reject the whole mea-

sure. A special committee of the Reichstag, which was appointed to consider the workmen's accident insurance bill, recommended that Parliament decline to accept the proposals of the Government and demand a new bill, allowing rural laborers to share the benefits of insurance against accidents.

Right Hon. John Bright delivered an address at Bingley Hall, Birmingham, on the 12th inst., before an audience of over twenty thousand persons. More than ten addresses of congratulation, from various Liberal associations, were presented to him. Great enthusiasm prevailed. Mr. Bright, in his speech, reviewed the events of the last fifty years and laid stress upon the enormous advantageous conferred upon the country by the repeal of the corn laws. Referring to America, Bright said: "Permit me to address a word to the artisan classes of the United States. I fought her battle in this country. (Cheers.) I sympathise with her as much now as I did then; almost as much as if I had been born upon her soil. I believe the question in the United States, between a protective and simply a revenue tariff, is waving its solution. The opinion is growing that irresistible facts are offering themselves for the consideration of statesmen and every intelligent man in the great Republic. An extraordinary condition of things exists there. No country of any age ever experienced or dreamed of an actual surplus of revenue of thirty millions sterling. This fact is fatal to the high protection party. The Government does not well know what to do with it. After an eloquent allusion to the war which abolished slavery, Mr. Bright said: I believe the next election for President of the United States will be fought on free trade lines. The great people of the United States will declare it to be the inalienable right of every American citizen to spend his money in the world's cheapest market.
