

Phillies Stop Dodgers 4-1 To Capture First Pennant In 35 Years

Philadelphia Phillies won the National League pennant for the first time in 35 years Sunday when they defeated Brooklyn 4-1 in a thrilling final game decided on Dick Sisler's 10th-inning home run into the left field stands at Ebbets' Field.

Saved from a possible play-off by Sisler's dramatic blow, manager Eddie Sawyer's "whiz kids" gained the right in the final hour of the race to meet New York Yankees, kings of the American League, in the World Series opening Wednesday at Philadelphia. Had Brooklyn won, the race would have ended in a tie and necessitated a three-game playoff for the flag. Meanwhile manager Casey Stengel's Yankees lost their final game at Boston Sunday 7-3. The contest meant nothing to either club, as the Red Sox had clinched third place in the American League Saturday. The Yanks may engage in a workout at Yankee Stadium Monday before proceeding to Philadelphia. The third-place Sox did most of their damage against Ernie Nevel, first of four Yankee flingers. Harry Taylor on the Sox' mound was supported by a 15-hit Boston attack.

13th Homer Of Season

Robin Roberts of the Phils and Don Newcombe of the Dodgers had been locked in a tight pitching duel for nearly 2 1/2 hours at Ebbets' Field when Sisler decided the issue with his 13th four-bagger of the year.

Each team had scored in the sixth, the Phils on singles by Sisler, Del Ennis and Willie Jones, and the Dodgers on a freak homer by shortstop Peeewe Reese when the ball lodged in the right field screen. Roberts set the stage for his own triumph when he opened the 10th with a single. Eddie Waitkus followed with a pop single into centre, and then Richie Ashburn forced Roberts at third. That was the situation when Sisler smashed a Newcombe fast ball into the stands. The victory snapped a Philadelphia losing streak of six straight games and choked off a Brooklyn rally which had assumed sensational proportions. Sept. 18 the Dodgers wete nine games out of first place, yet the impetus of their closing drive carried them down to the final game and scared the Phils half to death.

Last Pennant In 1915

The last time the Phils won a pennant was in 1915, when they

had the immortal Grover Cleveland Alexander pitching for them. Boston Red Sox licked them 4 games to 1 in the World Series. They will be the underdogs again when they lock with the Yankees Wednesday.

The first two games of the World Series will be played at Shibe Park, the Phillies' home field, which seats approximately 33,500. The third, fourth and fifth contests are scheduled at Yankee Stadium with its great 70,000-odd capacity. The sixth and seventh games, if needed, will go back to Philadelphia.

The games will be played on successive days with no time out for travel. This gives an advantage to the team with the larger staff of starting pitchers, which in this case appears to be the Yankees.

The Phils suffered a blow recently when their great young left-hander, Curt Simmons, was taken into the army with his National Guard unit. He had won 15 and lost 8. Simmons said Sunday he has abandoned hope of pitching in the Series. Every reserved seat has been sold out both at Yankee Stadium and Shibe Park for several days. The Phils, eager to accommodate their pennant-starved fans, broke a precedent by selling seats to single games of the Series. The Yankees sold, as usual, only in blocks of three games.

Saints Defeat Abbies 3-0 In Football Opener

Pete Dunphy's try in the early part of the second half gave the Saint Dunstan University varsity team a 3-0 win Saturday over the Charlottetown Abbies in the opening football game of the season.

The game, played on the S. D. U. gridiron, was a hard fought encounter all the way and provided the large crowd on hand with plenty of thrills.

In the first half of the game both teams put on spirited rallies that always fell short and their long runs were broken before any great damage was done. Dunphy made the first long run of the game midway through the half but was hauled down with about ten more yards to go by the Abbie full-back. The Saints' scrum working hard all the way was providing their backfield with the ball nearly all the time but costly fumbles on the part of the backfield prevented them from making any dangerous threats. With a two man scrum being called about fifteen

yards from the Saints' line, Willie Wilson, Abbie forward, made a plunge over the line but the try was not counted when the Saints pushed the aggressive forward back over the line and prevented him from grounding the ball in the Saints' goal line.

Shortly afterwards George Scantlebury tried for a placement kick as a result of a penalty kick being awarded to the Abbies. The kick was wide of the mark and the teams left the field seconds after for the end of the first half.

Second Half

The second half opened with the Abbies proving to be the aggressors as they moved into Saints territory time after time. However the Saints came back to go about twenty yards of the Abbie line before a scrum was called. The Saints' scrum heeled the ball and Dunphy went over the line for the game's only score. Cyril "Bun" Callaghan tried for the convert but his kick was short and wide of the mark.

The Abbies came back strong and pulled off a nice run before Ronnie Nicholson, who was the last Abbie player to handle the ball, was tackled and brought to a stop. From the kick which followed the Saints kicked the ball into the centre of the field where the majority of play was for the remaining minutes of the game.

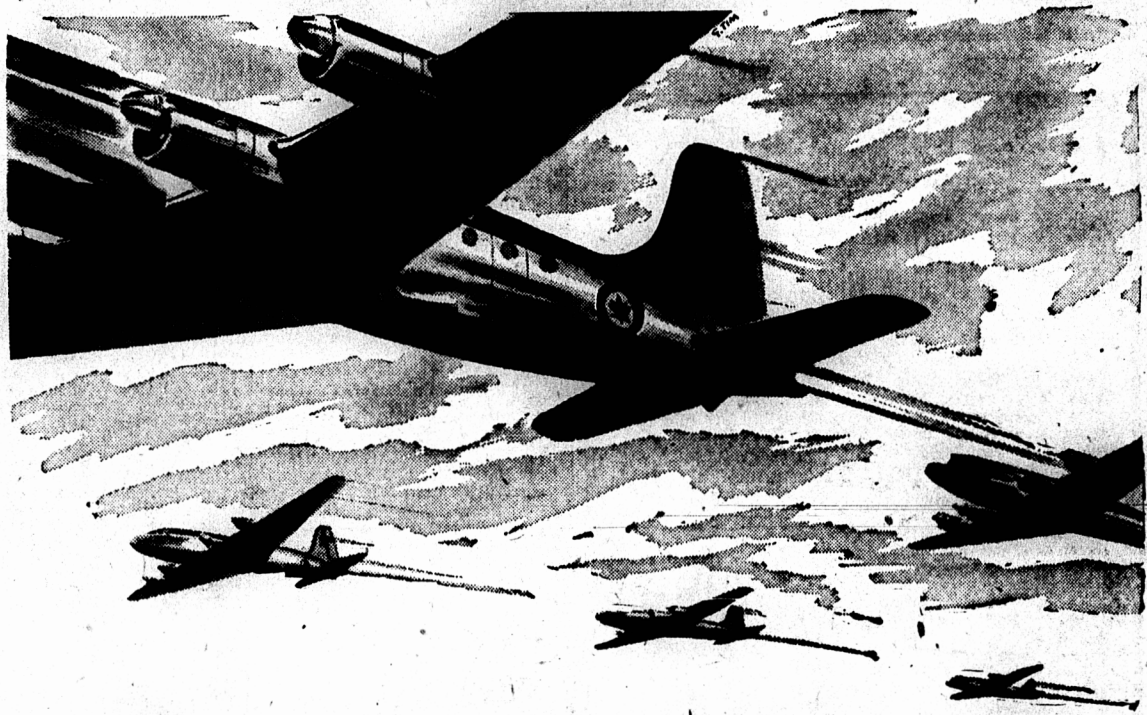
British Columbia Indians are allowed to hunt Alaska fur seals from open boats, so long as they don't use firearms.
