### FOR CROSBY DEATH

## Plaintiff Awarded \$39,178.75 In Suit Against Simpsons Sears

Believed to be the highest award ever made by a judge or jury in this province, a Supreme Court jury yesterday assessed damages at \$39,178.75 and judgment was entered for the plaintiff for \$39,178.75 in the civil suit of the estate of Carl Crosby—Crosby versus—Simpsons Sears Ltd.

The case arose from the highway death January 13 last of Carl Crosby when he was struck by a light truck owned by the defendant company and driven by Albert Gordon Batt, an employee. The accident occurred in the early evening near the gate leading to Mr. Crosby's home on the Malpeque Road.

The jury indicated it was not satisfied there had been no negligence on either side and found the deceased had been 35 per

cent at fault by being negligent by walking on the travelled portion of the highway without due care and attention. It found the defendant 65 per cent at fault. This was the basis for entering judgment for the plaintiff for the \$39,178.75.

The court action had been taken by Mrs. Edith Fern Crosby, widow of the deceased, on her own behalf and that of her five children. She had entered suit claiming \$100,000 damages. Counsel for the plaintiff was Gerald R. Foster, Q.C. who had Kenneth MacDonald as associate.

### Reefer Supply Said Adequate

### Ice Situation Looks Good For Local Fishermen Today

A flight yesterday afternoon by government transportation officials around the shores of the province has revealed ice conditions are better than they have been for some days, provincial transportation director B. Graham Rogers said yesterday.

The lobster fishing season opens officially Saturday and fishermen are scheduled to set their traps today.

Mr. Rogers said winds from the west are needed to clear the ice away. "The great danger is the chance of winds shifting to the east again."

The survey flight showed the south shore almost free of ice except for a mile-wide strip from Cape John to Pictou. A west wind would clear this and allow Northumberland Fisheries to begin service between Wood Islands and Caribou.

There was also some ice reported east of Pictou Island and two fairly large patches east of that.

Ice conditions on the north shore were quite heavy from slightly east of Brackley around to East Point.

Mr. Rogers said conditions for fishermen west of Rustico looked good "if the wind doesn't come in from the east."

Today's forecast from the weather office is for north winds of 15 miles per hour.

West Prince fishermen are in readiness for the opening this morning and weather conditions appear favorable for setting out traps.

At Tignish and Alberton, shores have been free from ice for several weeks and only a shortage of bait is expected to cause some concern.

Catches of herring have been extremely light but most fishermen have enough bait to run out their gear. Some bait was brought in from outside points to augment local catches.
