Two Fined For Marketing Potatoes Without License

On charges of marketing potatoes without a producer's license, Mr. Aden Mulligan of Emerald, R.R., and Mr. Delbert Rayner of Travellers Rest were each found guilty in county magistrate's court before Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C., at Summerside yesterday.

Mr. Mulligan was fined \$75.00 and costs or one month and Mr. Rayner was fined 25.00 and costs or ten days. The difference in fines was due to the categories in which the defendants were placed as producers, Mr. Mulligan being subject to a \$75.00 license and Mr. Rayner being subject to a \$25.00 license. In both cases no evidence was taken as the facts were admitted by counsel for the accused.

Both parties had previously pleaded not guilty and based their defense on points of law rather than fact. Written briefs were filed with the court by counsel on each side and dealt with constitutional points of law, but Magistrate Hinton stated he would be guided by the law as he found it in the statute books and said he would leave questions of the constitutional validity of the statutes to a higher court.

Mr. Gordon MacMillan of Charlottetown acted as counsel representing the Potato Marketing Board while Mr. D. O. Stewart, Q.C., of Summerside, represented Mr. Mulligan and Mr. Rayner. Two other similar cases before the court were further adjourned until September 22nd for the taking of evidence.

These were the cases of Simmons & MacFarlane, and Leslie Simmons, both of Summerside. The balance of the cases before the court-four more-were set for hearing on September 8th-S.

Bedeque Man Carries Off Top Honors At Provincial Flower Show

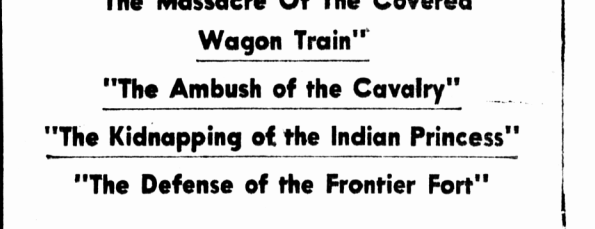
