LAUNCHED.—The Agriculturist says: On the 24th inst. the Kathleen, a fine three hundred and fifty ton barkentine was launched at the shipyard of Mr. John Ellis, Grand River. The Kathleen is owned by Hon John Yeo, Port Hill, and will be commanded by Capt. Williams. She will load dead at Miramichi or some other port in northern New Brunswick, for England. A YARDMASTER INJURED.—The Summerside Pioneer says that Mr. John H. Burns, yardmaster at Summerside for the railway, met with an accident on Wednesday evening last. He was working one of the semaphores when the pawl slipped out of the ratchet wheel and the lever flew up with great force and struck him under the jaw. Had it struck him about the temple undoubtedly serious consequences would have resulted. BIG OYSTER SHIPMENTS.—The Summerside Pioneer says that the steamer from that place for Point du Chene, took away some 750 barrels of oysters on Saturday morning, and that there were over \$5,500 worth shipped during the week by the Miramichi. On Thursday, there were nearly a thousand barrels offered as freight, the calm weather being favorable for raking up the bivalve. DRIVING PARK.—To avoid confusion at the gates of the driving park during next week's races, tickets of admission to the grounds have been placed in all the drug stores of the city, viz: The Apothecaries' Hall, Medical Hall, W. R. Watson's, C. D. Rankin's, Redlin Bros., A. S. Johnson's. The formal opening by the Lieut. Governor and Mayor Haviland will take place at 1:30 p. m., local time. Races will start immediately afterwards. It is desirable that all who wish to secure positions on the grand stand should be in their places not later than that hour. The Citizens' Band will be in attendance, and will play a choice selection of music during the intervals between the several races. THE TUBE.—Everything is now ready for the great trotting event of the season, which comes off on Wednesday and Thursday next at the New Driving Park. All the horses here are being fitted for the race, and many more are coming from the other side. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Athletic Sports. ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 29. It was showery all yesterday morning, but the sun was shining at the opening of the Maritime Provinces Amateur Athletic Association. The circular track was in very poor condition, but the hundred yards was a little better. There were about 1500 spectators present. In the hundred yards dash White finished first, Bauld second and Brady third. Time, 10 2/5. In the one mile the starters were McIntosh, Creighton, Walsh and McLeod. McIntosh finished first. Time, 4 50/100. There was great interest in the two hundred and twenty yards run. The starters were Brady, Power and White. The latter won with lots to spare, nearly two yards, and Brady was second with one yard and a half behind. In the half mile Tracey won easily in 2 10/100, with Creighton second. In the pole vault Jordan was the winner with nine feet three inches, and Ellis was second with eight feet nine inches. The broad jump was won by Jordan with twenty feet two inches, and Watson was second. Bowen and Tracey were the only starters in the quarter, and the former won in 54 seconds. Arthur Brady and probably Frank White will go on to the New York A. A. Club's handicap games. Ottawa Notes. OTTAWA, Sept. 29. Sir John Thompson and Mr. Tupper left for Nova Scotia yesterday afternoon. Captain Sherwood, chief of the Dominion police, received a letter from New York detectives stating that thousands of dollars worth of new Canadian bank notes, signed and ready for circulation, have been found in a house recently occupied by crooks in that city. Where the notes came from is a mystery. Major Moyné, of the Royal Military College, reached here Friday on his way from Quebec, where he has been inspecting the scene of the rockslide. He refused to say anything upon the subject of his investigation. A Riot in Progress. BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 27. A telephone message from Pratt Mines at ten o'clock Friday night announced that a riot was in progress there and help was needed at once. Before particulars could be obtained the telephone was cut. The Sheriff had gone to the scene with military. The trouble grew out of the killing or fatally injuring of a negro woman by Deputy Sheriff Maxwell. This aroused the negroes, and message later came to the Sheriff and Chief of Police here asking for help at once. One message states that 300 armed negroes are burning the town and attacking the whites. Exhibition Awards Distributed. PARIS, Sept. 29. The exhibition awards were distributed in the Palace de L'Industrie to-day. President Carnot and Premier Tirard made speeches, in which they expressed hearty thanks to the foreign powers and exhibitors who had contributed to the great success and brilliancy of the exhibition. Premier Tirard announced the award of 903 grand prizes, 5,153 gold, 9,690 silver, and 9,323 bronze medals, and 8,070 honorable mentions. The Strike at Rotterdam. ROTTERDAM, Sept. 29. At a meeting of the strikers on Friday evening it was resolved to exclude all socialists from the movement, and to conduct the strike in an orderly manner. A resolution was adopted, amid cheers for the House of Orange. A workman was expelled from the meeting for attempting to make a socialist oration. John Burns, the socialist and labor agitator of London, has sent £300 to Rotterdam to aid the strikers. Baseball News. ST. JOHN, N. B. Sept. 29. After the fourth Shamrock-St. John game had been considered off, and the public had given up all hopes of witnessing any more exciting ball playing this year, the managing committee of the Athletic Club held a meeting and decided that the fourth game should be played on Thursday.
