

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 17.

The Daily News learns that for some time past large quantities of printed matter, intended to incite the Indian Mussulmen against the British, have been sent from Pera to India. The attention of the Government has been called to the circumstances indicating that the inflammatory publications have been forwarded with the knowledge of the Port.

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 17.

A troop ship left here to-day for India, with nine hundred and fifteen men for the army in Afghanistan.

QUETTA, Aug. 17.

The wire was cut just after the details of the repulse of the Afghans at Kuch was received. Although the defeat of the tribesmen appears complete, reinforcements have been sent in case further attacks are made. The messengers from General Phayre to Candahar have returned as they were unable to enter the city. The siege has commenced in earnest. A heavy continuous fire on both sides is kept up. Ayoub Khan is attacking on two faces of the city. A number of men are pushing forward trenches towards the walls. The messengers deny that the Herastese have deserted Ayoub.

LONDON, Aug. 18.

A despatch from Quetta announces that a messenger from Candahar has brought a letter from General Primrose, dated 11th inst., which says that the enemy had opened fire with Armstrong guns at a distance of 2500 yards from the city. Damage so far is slight. In the morning a heavy musketry fire was opened at the walls from villages situated on three sides of town. But few of the troops were wounded. There was water for the garrison for forty-five days. Exact strength of the garrison is 1,243 effective Europeans, 3,386 natives and 382 sick. Gen. Primrose states Ayoub Khans force at 10,000.

LONDON, Aug. 17.

The Times has an article in regard to the further export of gold to New York, and says that it is stated that there are not many more American eagles in London, and until New York exchange falls further bullion is hardly likely to be exported unless it can be picked up in the open market.

BERLIN, Aug. 16.

The lady of the Sultan's harem who recently took refuge in the British Embassy at Constantinople, and who subsequently surrendered, has been strangled as an accomplice in the Palace conspiracy.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 17.

The ambassadors here have forwarded to their respective governments a request to the Minister of Foreign affairs to prolong for 24 days the time granted for the settlement of the Montenegrin question, and to assent to a modification of the Dulcigno project.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 17.

In compliance with the desire of President Hayes, the Sultan has decided to maintain Turkish legation at Washington.

LONDON, Aug. 16.

The London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says that the measure of dissatisfaction felt in high quarters at proposed marriage of Lady Burdett Coutts and Mr. Bartlett, is indicated in the refusal of use of the Chapel Royal, at Savoy, for ceremony.

LONDON, Aug. 17.

Jonas Reis & Co., bankers and bullion merchants and foreign exchange brokers, of Liverpool, have suspended payment.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 17.

A collision occurred on the Mersey to-day between Dublin steamer Langford and White Star Line steamer Baltic, which sailed this morning for New York. The former sunk. Passengers and crew were saved. The Baltic put back and went into dock for repairs.

LONDON, Aug. 17.

Owing to the progress of the past week it is hoped that Parliament will close on September 3rd.

The emigration returns from Liverpool for July show an increase of 5,000 persons compared with July, 1879. Thirteen thousand went to America. All the cabins of the steamers leaving Liverpool for New York for weeks to come are engaged, consequently the Cunards will, each Saturday, send two steamers to New York to accommodate returning American tourists.

UNITED STATES.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 17.

John Buchanan, dean of the Eclectic Medical College, who gave heavy bail before a United States Court to answer charges of fraudulent issuing medical diplomas, committed suicide this morning by drowning.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.

The grand parade of Knights Templar embraced about twenty thousand Knights. Procession was three hours in passing a given point.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.

A despatch from Eureka, Nev., says the telegraph office, which was burned out, has opened at railway depot, a mile from town. The fire is larger than the one of a year ago. The "Daily Leader" is a total loss. People in the burned section are greatly discouraged. Many were still in debt from the last fire and it is a heavy blow on the town.

The Gospel According to "The Burning Bush."

To the Editor of the Examiner.

Sir,—There appeared in your issue of yesterday a letter over the signature of "The Burning Bush," in reply to mine contained in your issue of Tuesday last. I have carefully read my letter as published in the EXAMINER, and cannot, from the beginning to the end, find a single offensive word. I gave you, in a few words, my opinion of the lecture on Daniel O'Connell, by the great orator, Dr. Leeming, of Australia. "Merely this and nothing more." Yet "The Burning Bush" says that "Timothy" is out with an epistle to clergymen." I challenge "The Burning Bush" to produce a single passage in which the word clergymen is used, or a single passage in which it can be shown that I referred to clergymen at all. There are in this town "pulpit ranters" who are not clergymen. I respect the high and saintly office of the clergy, and I trust that no act or word of mine shall ever be said or done that will in the least detract from the holy and sacred character of their work and persons. The remembrance of the sacrifices that they made when they consecrated themselves to the service of the Redeemer, is sufficient at all times to induce me to offer to them the highest consideration, and respect.

"The Burning Bush" uses language which I hope I shall never use. Language, unchristian, uncharitable, ungentlemanly. I am dubbed a man of "vulgar taste," "a notorious publican," "a man who will not reduce into daily life the advice given him even by 'ranters';" "a rank Communist." In the same remarkable piece of elegant composition, he calls me "a canting hypocrite, a man who is neither a practical Catholic nor a good Presbyterian—an empty, ignorant blow." If we be allowed to judge the man by the language he uses, it may be safely said that he possesses neither refinement, education nor religion. In conclusion, I am threatened with "the lash."—I wonder not the danger, for the man who would use the above choice expressions would also use this murderous weapon.

One word as to the attack on my religion. I am accused of being "neither a practical Catholic nor a good Presbyterian." Perhaps not. But under the guidance of the great God I place myself in the hope and belief that before the judgment seat of the Eternal, the secrets of the corrupt heart will be exposed and punished, and that the pure of soul will be rewarded. This is also my belief, that "The Burning Bush" must repair, publicly, the injury that he has done or receive the condemnation of his Maker.

Now I must take leave of "The Burning Bush," for the light that it gives is not the light that it gave of old. He dipped his pen in gall to resent an imaginary offense. If the style of the clergy be attacked, may their champion partake more of the spirit of Chateaubriand and less of the spirit of Barere.
