Warns People of Poison in Mussels

HALIFAX, July 29—(CP)—Nova Scotians were warned yesterday by Hon. F. R. Davis, Minister of Health, of a strong toxic poison capable of causing death common in mussels at this time of year. The poison has not yet been definitely isolated or classified, and no neutralizing agent has been found to offset its effect. It is not destroyed by boiling fish, Dr. Davis said. The government warning was issued following an investigation of the deaths of two people in Digby Neck and the violent illness of four others after eating cooked mussels. Investigators found the poison was not of the form that affects

only people sensitive to certain foods and that it differed from the type caused by putrefactive changes in shellfish or contamination of water, Dr. Davis said.

SALMON PUDDING

Put a cup of cold salmon into a bowl and break it up with a fork. Add two tablespoons breadcrumbs, two tablespoons melted butter and a pinch of pepper and salt. Bind the mixture together with two well-beaten eggs and turn it into a greased mould. Cover with greased paper and steam slowly till the mixture is firm. Turn the mould out on to a hot dish and serve with butter sauce made as follows: Chop up a small onion finely, mix it with two dessertspoons vinegar and cook slowly in a pan till most of the vinegar has evaporated. Then add a piece of butter, a little at a time, stirring continuously until the mixture becomes thick. Serve at once.

Prominent Toronto Livestock Expert Dies

TORONTO, July 29—(CP)—Alexander F. Westervelt, 64, for 14 years manager of the Royal Winter Fair and an outstanding Canadian livestock expert, died in hospital here yesterday after a brief illness. For the past 20 years he had lived at Clarkson, a few miles west of Toronto, where he operated a small farm as a hobby.

Mr. Westervelt collapsed at his desk last Friday while making preparations for the forthcoming fair, and died Tuesday afternoon. Until pneumonia set in later the doctors gave him a good chance to recover.

Since its inception in 1922, he had been the guiding spirit of the Royal Winter Fair and he was responsible for many of the innovations that caused the fair to grow from year to year and attract exhibits from coast to coast.

One of his most notable achievements was the inauguration of a breeding record system for the Canadian National Livestock Commission.

He was born just north of Brampton.

Dust Weapon In Spur to Plant

TORONTO, July 29—(CP)—Increased interest by industry in nonferrous alloys as a weapon against rust and other forms of corrosion has made necessary an enlargement of the laboratory facilities at the Huntington, W. Va. plant of the International Nickel Company Inc. The company also announced new administration offices would be built and a new unit added to the open hearth furnaces.

The plant, which produces monel metal, pure nickel and incoined in commercial shapes, is operating at approximately the 1929 level and in 26-ton open hearth furnace will be built to bring ingot production in balance with the capacity of the rolling mill. A three-story brick administration building is being erected for the executive offices and the chemical and physical laboratories are being enlarged.

Shoe Industry Keeps In Time

BOSTON, July 29—(CP)—The greatest revolution in fashion design "since the whalebone corset was relegated to the scrap-heap" has occurred in the shoe industry within the past two years, according to Miss Ruth H. Kerr, fashion adviser. Miss Kerr, an authority on style trends, says this revolution is due to the discovery that shoes designed specifically to complement the natural contours of the human foot contribute materially to the general smartness of a woman's appearance.

"In place of the exaggerated narrow toe of a few years ago, and the still more fantastic 'needle toes' of the 90s we now have a more comfortable 'lasts' over which shoes are built. In working out these 'lasts,' shoe sculptors have found the proportion of the human foot is in direct relation to the proportion of the individual measurements of the body. The problem therefore has been to bring the individual foot-style trends.

"The long narrow foot that used to be admired because it was 'aristocratic' is not always the fashionable of today," she explained. "Shorter, wider, lower heels—all are part of the stylist's scheme to bring the shoe into relation to the rest of the costume.

"It is essential for a woman to know how to take care of her shoes. The first step in shoe care, is to place the shoe on a tree immediately it is removed from the foot. The second step is to choose the correct cleaner for the type of leather."

Honour Conferred on Dr. George Hilton

In recognition of his long and distinguished services in the realm of veterinary science, the honorary degree of D.V.M. (Doctor Veterinary Medicine) was recently conferred by the University of Montreal on Dr. George Hilton, Veterinary Director General, Dominion Department of Agriculture. Dr. Hilton is a graduate of the University of Toronto. Following his graduation he engaged in private practice at Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. In 1906 he joined the Dominion Department of Agriculture as Chief Veterinary Inspector and on February 1, 1924, was appointed Veterinary Director General.

Dr. Hilton is internationally known as an outstanding veterinarian. For 15 years he was the Canadian representative of the executive board of the American Veterinary Medical Association. He is an honorary member of most of the Provincial Veterinary Associations in Canada and honorary president of the Central Canada Veterinary Association.

While attending the International Veterinary Congress in London in 1930 he was made an honorary associate of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons and given the degree of H.A.R.C.V.S. Last year he received the League of Nations Committee appointed to consider uniformity in international shipments of meats and meat food products.

Exports of Canadian hams and bacon to the British Isles during the month of April, 1936, were heavier than a year ago at \$215,000 lb., as compared with \$346,000 lb. in April, 1935. Ham and bacon exports to the United States during April amounted to 181,600 lb., as compared with 66,100 lb. in April, 1935.

Lady Strathcona And Party Go To Quebec

ANDOVER, N.B., July 29—(CP)—Lady Strathcona, wife of the third holder of the title, who arrived here recently to enjoy fishing at Strathcona Lodge, on the Tobique River, has left with her party for Quebec after successful angling. Lady Strathcona caught several salmon, weighing from 10 to 20 pounds, and others of the party had similar success.

Lady Strathcona and her party, which includes her son, Hon. Euan Howard, and Peter G. Lubbock and Hon. Christopher Lodergh, brother and son, respectively, of Lady Wakehurst will join the latter, who has been awaiting them at Murray Bay, Que. enroute to England.

Electricity For All Nova Scotia Homes

YARMOUTH, N.S., July 29—(C.P.)—"Extension of electricity to every possible rural home in this Province" was forecast today by Premier Angus L. Macdonald of Nova Scotia in a "Farmer's Day" address at the 17th anniversary of the founding of Yarmouth.

"The farmers are more fortunate than their brethren who dwell in great cities," he said. "Modern improvements today bring the life of the farmer to a more pleasant state and I forecast soon the extension of electricity to every possible rural home in this province to aid every man and woman through making their life an easier and more convenient one."

The premier stressed in his speech the importance of agriculture in the province's economy.

"Nova Scotia is a district that depends to a great extent on the sea for her great future," he said. "For from the sea come the fish harvest of the province and over

the seas go to a large extent her commerce.

"But equally important to the welfare of the people is the farming industry. It has been said that Nova Scotia is not an agricultural country. In that I cannot agree, for modern methods and hard-working farmers have made this Province a place of fine farms. "It is a great mistake that our people do not always buy the available products of the farms but trade with others in these commodities. Such is a condition which may be well righted."

KENTVILLE, N.S., July 29—(C.P.)—One man was killed and another critically injured today when tons of clay fell on them as they worked at the forest home hydro project near here. Lawrence Goodwin of Berwick lost his life when a portion of the bank from which he was shovelling clay tumbled off and trapped him beneath its fall. He was employed by the construction company only yesterday. Michael Sherill of Wolfville suffered a broken back in the same fall.
