THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

A suit seeking to bar the use of
 the trade mark "Desert Gold" for
 hosiery has been filed in circuit
 court of Cook County, Ill. by Mut-
 ation Mink Breeders Association,
 Racine, Wis., against Julius Kay-
 ser and Co., Inc. located in Mer-
 chantville, Chicago. The
 plaintiff, Cooperative Corporation,
 composed of mutation mink breed-
 ers, claims ownership of the trade
 mark "Desert Gold" registered
 with secretary of state of Illinois
 under registration number 31,752.

At the American Fur Auctions
 in New York last week raw muta-
 tion mink including EMBA and
 independent merchandise was re-
 ported 92 per cent sold at prices
 close to February levels. The AFA
 completed a two-day sale with an
 offering of dressed mutations, mostly
 EMBA merchandise. A total of
 86,000 skins was offered. The raw
 mutations met with better recep-
 tion than a collection of standard
 ranch pelts. The latter reported as
 50 per cent sold with goods mov-
 ing at firm prices. In dressed
 mutation collection the percentage
 of turnovers was unavailable but
 sapphires, whites and homozygous
 types appeared to be meeting with
 the best reception.

The sales room view of the
 above auction was that the poorer
 merchandise had been over priced
 all season and that the trade
 was finally putting the cheap stuff
 in its place. Another view was
 that many local dealers found
 Scandinavian merchandise more
 reasonably priced than was the
 case with low end domestic goods.
 Finally some trade people felt the
 weakness in cheaper goods was
 related to a general fear that the
 federal government was cracking
 down on makers of blended mink
 garments who improperly label
 their garments "natural." One
 manufacturer noted, the "paint-
 ers" are afraid to buy goods and
 sell their production as "natural"
 because they know the Federal
 Trade Commission is looking for
 violators.

COMPENSATION
 A despatch to Women's Wear
 Daily, N.Y. has the following:
 Washington—The House today de-
 cided that a fur fox breeder whose
 mama foxes became so upset by
 low-flying Army planes that they
 chewed up their children, may be
 compensated by the Government
 for his loss. It is now up to the
 Senate to consider the measure.

AGRICULTURAL NEWS
 P. E. I. Department of Agriculture

MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN
 Next week through the press and
 over the air there will be publicly
 drawn to the attention of rural
 Prince Edward Island the fact that
 the Federation of Agriculture is
 carrying on a campaign to in-
 crease the number of members.
 The Federation is a farmers' or-
 ganization, it's worth and its fu-
 ture depends entirely upon the sup-
 port it received from the rank and
 file of farmers.
 The percentage of farmers that
 have supported the Federation by
 their membership during the past
 two or three years is not great
 enough to provide either the finan-
 ce or the prestige to do a real-
 ly adequate job. If every farmer
 supported the Federation its pro-
 gram could be expanded and the
 Directors relieved of the worry of
 inadequate financing. On behalf of
 the Directors it may be said that
 they have given much of their time
 and travelled at their own expense
 in carrying out their duties, they
 would be getting off very easily
 if their only contribution was three
 dollars per year.
 The present membership cam-
 paign will decide the future of the
 organization, if the response is
 good, Federation work can be ex-
 panded and each member will re-
 ceive increased dividends. If not,
 investment. If, on the other hand,
 there is no noticeable increase in
 interest then the Board of Direct-
 ors must consider cutting its suit
 to fit the cloth and this is bound
 to lead, in this case, to ineffective-
 ness and part-time or piece meal
 effort on the part of the Federation.

It must be emphasized that upon
 the individual farmer depends the
 value of the Federation. It is not
 the President; it is not the Sec-
 retaries; it is not the Board of
 Directors that are the most im-
 portant part. They are simply the
 means by which the membership
 translates into appropriate and ef-
 fective action their opinions and
 ideas.
 In addition it must be emphasised
 that basically the solution of
 farm problems depends upon the
 farmer's ability to act in conjunc-
 tion with other farmers, this is the
 true organization, an age in
 which the farmer is playing and
 it would appear logical to suggest
 that if he is to stay in the league
 he must play the game by modern
 rules.
 Support of the Federation by the
 individual farmer represents an
 effort by him to improve his own
 private position. If the farmer
 wishes to look at it from a purely
 personal standpoint, membership
 in the Federation is an investment
 in his own future welfare.
 The percentage of farmers who
 are opposed to the organization is
 likely small, there are many who
 are indifferent or take it for granted
 that the Federation will be
 around whether or not they stand
 behind it, this is not necessarily
 so, a really effective farm group
 requires as close to one hundred
 percent support as possible. The
 period from April 23rd to May 5th
 will point the direction in which
 farm organization will travel in
 this province. There are only two
 directions, upwards and ahead to
 united effective action or a retreat
 into indifference of an attitude of
 letting things go.
