This Sunday morning a number of the airmen and airwomen, who are members of the Moncton Flying Club are starting out from Moncton without knowing where they are going to land. For they are going on a mystery flight and will follow one lead plane, until it arrives at a destination. The destination for this Sunday will be Elton Woodside's airport at Margate, P. E. I., just five miles from Kensington, the Kensington to Cavendish road.

And when they land they will be joined by other aircraft from Amherst, Charlottetown and Summerside, and all the pilots will join together and have a delicious dinner through the kindness of the hostess, Mrs. E. C. Woodside. Just about a year ago Elton Woodside invited all the plane owners in the vicinity to his farm airport and seventeen different planes paid a visit, so again he expects to see quite a number there.

Crossing Accident In Summerside

A car driven by LAG. W. E. Mathews of the local Air Force station was struck by a train and slightly damaged, at the Second Street crossing in Summerside about 10:40 yesterday morning. He was proceeding west on Second street en route to the airport when just as he had almost crossed the track, the diesel locomotive hit the rear of the car. He was not injured but it was a close call. Just recently the Summerside Board of Trade and Town Council both passed strongly worded resolutions asking the Canadian National Railways to, without delay, provide warning signals at the railway crossings in the town. Speak-up on the resolution at the last Council meeting, Mayor Henry Wedge said that there are nine railway crossings in the town and all are dangerous.

So far no indication of the attitude of the railway authorities in regard to these resolutions has been made known.

Two Injured In Collision

An automobile-motorcycle collision near St. Eleonors about seven o'clock last evening sent two people to the Prince County Hospital with injuries which are not thought to be serious.

The motorcycle was driven by AC. J. Lapointe of the R. C. A. F. Station and on the rear was a passenger, Jack Stevenson, 14, a son of Sgt. Charles Stevenson. The motorcycle struck a car driven by Mr. A. W. Martin of St. Eleonors at the left rear fender as the car was turning into a driveway. It was feared last night that Lapointe might have a broken leg. Otherwise, although suffering from bruises and shock, they were not in a serious condition.

Burly M.P. Tosses Noisy Red On Ear

OTTAWA, Sept. 15 - One Communist agitator was bodily thrown out of an M.P.'s room in the House of Commons recently as members of the Red-tinted Canadian Peace Congress demanded that Canada withdraw her support from the U. N. forces in Korea.

Approximately 100 members of the Canadian Peace Congress, the Canadian Youth for Peace Congress and the Canadian Women's Congress marched on Parliament Hill seeking interviews with the members to propound Communism propaganda.

A young Communist from London, Ont., later regretted that he used such forceful and demanding language to H. O. White, P. C. Middlesex East.

The burly Glaswegian farmer cut the Commy's rabble-rousing tirade short by grabbing him by the scruff of the neck and seat of the pants and tossing him bodily out of his office.

A woman companion of the young London Red departed with alacrity when she saw her partner being forcefully ejected.

The two London Compies, like the others who came from such distant points as Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton and Windsor, made arrangements by telephone for the main entrance of the Commons for interviews.

In the case of Mr. White the two identified themselves as "guests from London."

Once inside Mr. White's office on the fifth floor, the pair sought to quiz Mr. White on his attitude towards Canadian rearmament, and asked him if he was for peace or war.

The Middlesex East member's reply was that Soviet aggression made Canadian re-armament necessary; that it was a choice between peace and war that was being forced on the Canadian people.

But the male member of the Commy team persisted, endeavoring to get Mr. White to commit himself either for peace or war - for or against Canadian participation on the side of the U. N. in Korea.

Obviously angered by this persistent dogging on the part of the young Communist, Mr. White lost his patience, jumped up from his chair and lifted the bewildered caller out the door and into the hallway.

Later, during the Commons session in the afternoon, the delegates from the three pseudo-peace organizations gained entrance to the public galleries on passes obtained from various members.

To Form Wing Of Royal Canadian Air Force Ass'n.

Former members of the Royal Canadian Air Force have announced plans for the formation of a Prince Edward Island wing of the Royal Canadian Air Force Association.

The first organization meeting will be held at 8 p.m. on October 2nd in the Maple Leaf Gardens, Summerside, it was announced last evening by Greg. Mulholland and John Hopkirk, acting chairman and acting secretary respectively and it is hoped that all ex-R.C.A.F. and ex-R.A.F. veterans will attend.

The Royal Canadian Air Force Association, under the presidency of Air Vice Marshall A. L. Morfee (retired) has its national headquarters at 424 Metcalfe Street in Ottawa, Ont. It is now engaged in sponsoring formation of Provincial groups and local wings. The 260,000 men and women who formed the war time R.C.A.F. are being urged to unite in the new organization.

A distinguished group of former enlisted men and officers, elected at each annual convention, will serve as officers and directors of the Association. It is officially recognized by the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Air Vice Marshal Morfee has stressed that three points should be made clear in connection with the association.

First: This is a non-profit organization. It was created for the benefit of its members and the Air Force they served so loyally. It has no axe to grind of a commercial nature.

Second: No attempt will be made to duplicate the legislative and financial benefits which membership in veteran's organizations affords. Neither will the Royal Canadian Air Force Association cross the lines of the national organizations operating in the public interest in behalf of aviation and air power such as the Royal Canadian Flying Clubs Association. It will work through such organizations in matters of national and mutual interest.

Third: Policy will be determined by the voting members of this Association. R.C.A.F. regular personnel are cordially invited to become serving members which will entitle them to all the privileges of regular membership except the right to vote and to hold office. - S

Carloadings Increase

OTTAWA, Sept. 15 - (CP) - Carloadings on Canadian Railways increased during the week ended Sept. 9 to 78,022 cars, compared with 47,641 cars for the previous week and 73,549 in the corresponding week a year ago.

The Bureau of Statistics reported today that returns covering the strike week of Aug. 26 have not yet been received from one railway and consequently cumulative totals are not available this week.

Gains over the similar period in 1949 were registered in loadings of grain products, livestock, ores, pulpwood, lumber, and gasoline. Declines were confined to loadings of grain.

TORONTO, Sept. 15 - (CP) - For illegal sale of liquor, Mrs. Greta Hoffman, whose husband is said dying of leukemia, was sentenced today to two months in jail - the minimum penalty. Magistrate O. M. Martin said he was "truly sorry" to send the mother of three young children to jail.

All Objectives Gained

ABOARD THE FLAGSHIP OF JOINT TASK FORCE 77, Sept. 16 - (Saturday) - (AP) - The U.S. Marines pressed forward through and beyond Inchon gaining all primary objectives during the night.

The invasion was ahead of schedule, official reports said. Equipment of all types was flowing steadily across the invasion beaches and reinforcements were moving in clocklike precision.

By the middle of the morning Saturday, no gunfire support was being called for from the armada of warships in the channel, possibly indicating the Marines were meeting only light opposition.

No air activity was observed over the battle area. Tanks and heavy artillery went ashore and supplies were building up rapidly.

by Mr. J. S. Williams was read by the president. Substituting for Mr. Bryer R. Jones, acting supervisor of Inspectorate No. 4, the teachers were addressed by Mr. Rice. He stated that no selection had been made in choosing a supervisor for this district. Other points stressed by Mr. Rice were - the importance of understanding between teachers and parents, and the teacher's responsibilities in the community.

Teachers who were in need of advice were advised to consult the members of the Department of Education. Teachers were also requested to send in their attendance reports promptly at the end of every month. Teachers for Inspectorate No. 4 were asked to report their attendance reports directly to the Department until further notice.

All persons present were both surprised and pleased to have the pleasure of meeting and listening to Mr. H. B. MacLean, author of the MacLean Method of Writing. Mr. MacLean, a native of Prince Edward Island, is now teacher in the Normal School in Vancouver, B.C. Mr. MacLean gave a most interesting demonstration on the teaching of different letter forms and the building up of printing letters to the "cursive" or writing forms. He also congratulated Mr. MacKenzie and other members of the Department of Education for their Supplement to the Course of Studies.

Mrs. D. B. Lusty, Assistant Supervisor of School Broadcasts (Maritimes and Newfoundland) pointed out the benefits of school radio broadcasts, and urged that as many schools as possible obtain radios.

Following Mr. Lusty's address, Miss Mona Wilson of the Health Department, Charlottetown, introduced Dr. B. O'Meara of the Dental Division of Public Health. Dr. O'Meara reviewed the problem of dental health. He requested the teachers to instruct pupils in the correct use of their toothbrushes, and to encourage the children to carry more nourishing lunches to school. Material on dental health will be sent out to schools.

Afternoon Session

Teachers were also privileged to hear Dr. Lloyd Shaw, Director and Deputy Minister of Education. He stressed the modern methods of teaching and suggested that these be used by the individual teacher. He stated that the teacher must ever be a student - students of subject matter, and students of children.

Miss Helen Yeo then gave a very instructive demonstration on the teaching of spelling. Mrs. Cudmore was the next speaker and her topic was Junior Red Cross work. Miss Arsenault sent greetings, also Mrs. Mac-

T. L. C. Orders Unions To Clean House Of Reds

By John LeBlanc - (CP) - The Trades and Labor Congress of Canada today handed an ultimatum to its affiliated unions to clean house of Reds.

In one more stroke against Reds in unions, T. L. C.'s annual convention added a section to its constitution ordering affiliates to jet-tison Communist officers under penalty of being dropped themselves from the Congress.

The toughened policy, the Congress was told by its leadership, means that suspected Communists will have to prove their innocence. In another series of actions in its week-long drive on Reds, the Congress today also:

1. Wrote into the constitution a clause barring Red delegates from conventions at the discretion of the T. L. C. executive council.

2. Confirmed the executive's disbarment from the floor this year of Bruce Magnuson of Sudbury, Ont., a leading figure in the left-wing Lumber and Sawmill Workers' Union.

3. Turned down a proposal from the Vancouver Street Railwaymen's Union that it repeal a number of anti-Communist Callum, director of J.R.C. Mrs. Cudmore drew the teacher's attention to the display of Red Cross articles attractively arranged on the platform.

The Chief Supervisor, Mr. MacKenzie of Charlottetown was then introduced. Features dealing with the Course of Studies were also discussed.

The Question Box was answered by Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie. The convention delegates decided by resolution to return to their classrooms "with a renewed and stronger effort on our part." Another resolution urged the executive "to do all in its power to arouse interest and if possible to arrange for a demonstration at our next Easter convention."

At present, each delegate has a single vote on the convention floor. If a local union sends no delegates, it has no voice in convention proceedings. The executive wanted to change the voting system to be voted, either by direct representation or by representatives-at-large such as Canadian chiefs of international unions.

Several delegates protested that this placed too much power in the hands of these international-union officials. However, one of these officials - Sam Finlay of Toronto, Plumbers' Union chief - argued it could be employed to prevent Communist packing conventions as they had done in previous years.
