

Hockey Season To Open Here Tonight

Islanders Play Hosts To Millionaires; Many New Players On Both Teams

Wes "Bucko" Trainor, who led the Islanders as a player against the Sydney Millionaires in the M. H. L. finals of 1950, comes back tonight to lead the local club against a new edition of the Millionaires at the Forum in the opening game of the 1953-54 season.

Two old clubs, with almost entirely new lineups will face one another tonight as the boys pry the lid off the new Maritime Major Hockey League and give hockey fans an idea of what they can expect in the weeks ahead.

The Islanders will be swinging into tonight's game with only three players who ever before wore the colors of the local club for a full season. The three are Trainor, Buck Whitlock and Gus Gustaverson.

The club is being built around these three veterans of the ice, along with a kid line that will feature local talent. The kid line is composed of Frank Dorrington, Lorne Hennessey and Orin Carver.

The Islanders will have plenty of goal-tending ability in the person of Roger Bessette. The agile netminder has seen considerable professional service having played with Cleveland, Buffalo and several teams in the Quebec League.

He will be fronted by one defense unit of Gus Gustaverson and Larry Blackburn and another combination of Don MacLaughlin and Bill Tyskko. Gustaverson performed for the Islanders last season while Blackburn played with Amherst and Saint John Beavers.

MacLaughlin comes here from Halifax where he played for several seasons with Halifax teams in the M. H. L. and is certainly no stranger to local hockey fans. Tyskko played last year with Sydney.

Paul Sandino and Trainor will flank Buck Whitlock on one of the Islanders forward lines tonight. Sandino arrived here over the week-end and worked out with the club yesterday in their final pre-game drill.

Coach Trainor expects good things from his "Kid Line" of Dorrington, Hennessey and Carver. Carver last year played with the Memorial Cup winning Barrie Flyers and Dorrington, who played

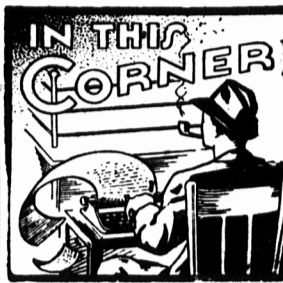

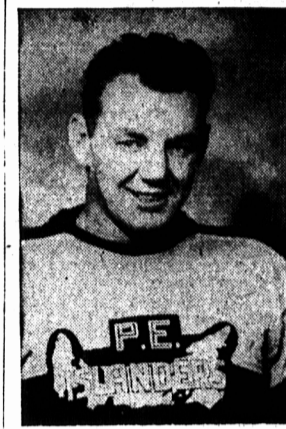
The win was the third for Major Waldo MacCormack's Mounties in three starts. Dalhousie could force a tie with the Mounties for League leadership by winning their three remaining games.
