A SURPLICE BODICE.

HOW TO MAKE A WAIST THAT IS FETCHING AND POPULAR.

Detailed Explanations Which, if Carefully Followed, Will Insure Success in Every Instance.

The surplice bodice is one of the early autumn styles that all women will hail with a hearty welcome. It is graceful and elegant in the extreme, and suited to both the slender and the stout, and may be adorned with any sort of trimmings.

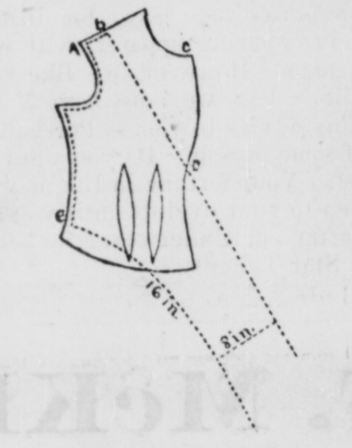


DIAGRAM FOR THE WAIST. The lines, whatever the length you determine on, it has to do only with the waist and fit with care.

First cut an ordinary basque lining, letting it extend only one inch below the waist and fit with care.

Cover the bodice and underarm pieces as you would for a plain basque, but cover the points with some contrasting material in plaits or shirred, and only so far as will make the vest.

Stitch all seams except the shoulder and the underarms, and some them with care; then face the lower edge of the basque.

When all that is done cut the surplice front.

Lay down the front of your basque pattern upon the cutting table. Over it lay a length of cloth, as the diagram shows. The line B D represents the "widging of the goos." The space A B should measure just two inches.

Cut out the armhole and cut along the seam line to the point E, which should fall one inch below the waist line. Slope the cloth to the point F, a distance of sixteen inches, so that at that point its width F G shall be eight inches.

From there continue to cut on a straight line to the end of the scarf, so that it shall be of the same width from that point to the end.

A length of one yard and three-eighths from F to the extreme end—sixty-six inches from the underarm seam—will allow a knot and ends that fall neatly to the knee. If you wish the scarf to be either longer or shorter simply alter its length below the point F.

Place the simple scarf to the fitted bodice at the shoulder, and at the under-



THE BODICE COMPLETED. arm seams which you have left un-bitched. Then stitch all together. Bore the under-arm seams and press the shoulder seams.

Finish the neck with a crush collar of the same material as the vest.

If you wish a dressy toilet, edge the scarf with some appropriate fancy braid or fine passementerie. Or, if you have the time, embroider some simple pattern or braid some simple device along its entire edge, so both the latter styles of trimming are much in vogue and either will make a tasteful, elegant finish.

Use any of the drooping puffed sleeves. Long one reaching to the wrist will be best for day wear; full elbow puffs will be suitable for either dinner evening dress.

When you wear the bodice, button the under-vest tightly in place; then draw down the surplice front, cross at the waist, pass once entirely around and knot at the left side.
