

Permanent Traffic Safety Campaign For City Schools

On Monday, September 16, a permanent traffic safety campaign will be instituted among the children of the six public schools of Charlottetown. The drive which is being sponsored by the Junior Board of Trade along with the City Police Department, K.A. Parker, superintendent of schools and a number of leading business firms, has the full co-operation of the principals and teaching staffs of the schools. Heading the campaign are John Morris, chairman of the Junior B. of T. Traffic Safety Committee; F.A.S. Jones, honorary chairman, who first suggested such a project and Police Sergeant Gus Dowling. For their emblem they have chosen "Elmer

of thirty accident-free days the pennant will be raised again with fitting ceremony. Both the hoisting and lowering ceremonies will be conducted by Sgt. Dowling in the presence of the whole student body. On each occasion he will also give a short lecture on traffic safety and re-explain the five safety rules of Elmer.

These rules are: "Look both ways before you cross the street. Keep out from between parked cars. Ride your bicycle safely, and obey all signs and signals. Play your games in a safe place, away from the street. Walk - Don't run when you leave the curb.

Elmer the elephant was chosen because of the universal belief that an elephant never forgets. This friendly little fellow was born in the mind of Charles Thompson Toronto, one of the creators of Bugs Bunny, another favourite of the children. In the many cities and towns where he has been adopted, his five safety rules and the affection the children feel for Elmer, has been responsible for a marked reduction in traffic accidents involving children.

On September 10 the flag raising ceremonies will be conducted at West Kent School at 10:15 a.m. and at Rockford Square at 3:06 p.m. The following day similar ceremonies will be carried out at Prince Street School and Queen Square and on Wednesday at Notre Dame Academy and the Model School.

Sabre Jets To Head Overseas

ST. HUBERT, Que. (CP)—Twenty-four Sabre jets, destined for RCAF squadrons in Europe, were to take off from this air force base early today on the first leg of their flight across the Atlantic.

The first stop is Goose Bay, Labrador, then Greenland and Scotland. The planes will proceed in small groups.

The mass flight is the latest in Operation Random which has ferried some 600 jets—Sabres and T-33 trainers—to Europe so far without a casualty.

The ferry pilots will include the sabre pilots who took part in the record-breaking cross-Canada flight last week.

Legion In N. B. Holds Convention

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—The New Brunswick command of the Canadian Legion ended its annual convention here Tuesday with the adoption of several resolutions and the election of George H. Hayter of Saint John as president.

Delegates voted to urge the New Brunswick government to give Indians the right to purchase liquor through legal outlets and to provide assistance to elderly persons wishing to construct homes.

They also approved yearly contributions of at least \$1,000 to the Olympic training plan and called on provincial authorities to discourage the flying of the United States flag outside hotels and motels where "disrespect might be shown the flag of a friendly country."

Other officers elected were: Vice-Presidents Arthur E. McAllister, Petticoatic, and H. L. McFee, Fredericton, and honorary treasurer Harry D. Lockhart, Moncton.
