IN THE HOME.

Don't put borders on carpets for small rooms.
Don't hang chandeliers or lamps in low celled rooms.
Don't be chary of rich, warm tints in northern rooms.
Don't buy what suits the fancy, regardless of their combined effect.
Don't select anything because it is fashionable, but because it is good.
Don't have any apparatus, much less any regular, arrangement of furniture.
Don't believe for a minute that expensiveness is essential to beautiful effects.
Don't make a table a pivotal point from which the rest of the furniture radiates.
Don't make a narrow door narrower with a heavy drapey. We drape too much.
Don't use decided patterns for upholstery if you have done so for wall and floor coverings.
Don't use large patterned wall paper in small rooms, or a deep border with low ceilings.
Don't have any fanciful, fixed arrangement of window draperies in rooms in daily use.
Don't buy chairs that are not well made and comfortable, or lounges that are not low and broad.
Don't let aestheticism dominate common sense and get plain carpet (filling) for the floors of rooms in daily use.
Don't delude yourself into thinking that beautiful rugs spread over homely floors are more artistic than all over carpets.—Woman's Home Companion.

Hitting Power of the Ocean.

Landmen who are slow to realize the tremendous force of the sea had an object lesson ashore in New York city when five large tanks, built to contain 120,000 pounds of soap, but temporarily filled with water, and situated on the fourth floor of a large building, collapsed and completely wrecked the whole structure, killing three men and doing a large amount of damage. The tanks were each 15 feet high and about 13 feet in diameter and contained 161,703 pounds of water, but the floors and supporting beams proved altogether inadequate to stand the strain. A wave of the dimensions of one of these tanks is not at all unusual at sea, and when such a wave breaks on a vessel's deck the force of the blow can only be estimated by the amount of damage it does in spite of the elasticity of the water beneath the vessel to ease her in receiving the shock. When the city firemen state that a stream from a hose under 50 pounds pressure will cut through an ordinary brick wall, the force of the sea in a gale may be perhaps better imagined.—Marine Journal.

When You Are in a Tunnel.

It is a most curious fact, but the approach of a train in a tunnel may be easily ascertained some seconds before it becomes visible to those traveling toward it in an opposite direction. The length of a tunnel is no obstacle to the realization of this curious phenomenon and compressed air is the medium which produces the peculiar "under water" sensation. Without any warning the drum of the car is pneumatically pressed inward the moment the locomotive of the other train enters the tunnel, which, for all practical purposes, is only a large tube, owing to the now limited air space. Many persons must have noticed this peculiar feeling in the ears without giving the matter a second thought. Others have won bets upon the chances of the tunnel containing more than one train at a time.—New York World.
