Bad Weather—But a Highly Creditable Show.

Some of the Visitors.

A BRIEF REVIEW.

Most of the Prizes.

ALTHOUGH the weather is wet and disagreeable, the attendance at the Exhibition at Georgetown to-day is very good. Among those present we noticed Senator Macdonald, Charlottetown, and Senator Prowse, Murray Harbor; Hon. Daniel Gordon and A. J. Macdonald, M. P. P., Georgetown; A. C. Macdonald, M. P. P., Montague; James Glaw, M. P. P., Murray Harbor; Lewis Carvell, W. J. Fraser, John McLeod, Capt. John Hughes, Charlottetown; W. A. Brennan, D. Scharr, James McDonald and George Matarr, Summerside, and H. C. Grasswell, St. Eleanors.

The exhibition was opened at ten o'clock this morning. There was no opening ceremony, Premier Peters, who was expected to be present, not appearing. The Georgetown Band rendered good music at intervals during the day. The display in the drill shed is much larger than that of last year, and it is nicely arranged. Of roots and vegetables there is an excellent show. The potatoes, carrots, mangels, parsnips, pumpkins, squashes, melons, celery, cabbage, etc., are all of good quality. The show of butter is small, but the quality is very good. The factory at New Perth exhibits five boxes of cheese, the quality of which is very superior. The display of fruit is much larger than at the last exhibition. The showing of apples is particularly good, and there is also a good exhibit of plums, damsons, etc. There is only one sample of grapes. The flower show, though small, is a very interesting feature. There is a capital showing of knit goods in drawers, socks, stockings and mitts. There is also a good display of white and fancy druggery, blankets, rugs, mats, etc. In fancy work, there are some very pretty sofa cushions, tidies, table covers and pillow-shams, and there is the usual assortment of crazy quilts and fancy counterpanes. The exhibit of paintings is not large, consisting only of some seven pictures, but the work is very good. Mr. Stewart, of Brudenell, exhibited eleven cases of stuffed birds, thirty-four birds in all, for which he was awarded a first prize. Mr. Poole, of Montague, shows a case of native insects, consisting of about 125 specimens. The display of grain is smaller than that of former years. The heaviest wheat weighs 64 lbs. Mr. Jordan, of Murray Harbor, shows his celebrated codliver oil and emulsion. The K. D. C. Company are to the front with an exhibit of their well known dyspepsia cure, samples of which they are distributing freely. Miller Bros. make a good showing of Dominion and Kern organs and Raymond's sewing machines.

The hands are going forward, not backward, on the dial of time.

Twenty farmers, delegates from the state of Michigan, are at Winnipeg to inspect Manitoba and the Northwest and select lands for those they represent. In an int review on Monday they declared their belief that next year there would be a surprisingly large immigration from Michigan and other states to this country. People struggling on poor farms in the States, they say, are just beginning to realize what the Canadian Northwest offers them.
