A RUSSIAN Nihilist with whom a reporter of the New York Herald asserts that he recently had an interview, is represented as defending assassination under certain circumstances in the following terms:—"No Russian home is safe, no person sure of life and liberty, no correspondence sacred. The predatory rule and the honest suffer. In such a state of society I justify lynch law, executed by the whole people in the name of the people, and I believe that startling examples temper the harshness of the all-powerful. Then again, the house of Romanoff has taught our people to disregard the ties of blood and the value of blood. It has been the most dissolute and the most bloody family reigning in Europe. It sons have conspired against their fathers; its wives have murdered their husbands. What else but a swift and bloody tragedy can affect such a stock?"

THE Scottish American says—"The following is said to be the prayer of a disappointed Scotsman on his arrival in Canada from Scotland:—"O Lord, we thy disobedient children approach thee this night in the attitude of prayer (an' likewise o' complaint). When we cam' tae Canady we expectit tae fin' a lan' flowin' wi' milk an' honey. Instead o' that we fund a place peopled wi' ungodly Irish. Scour them out; drag them ower the mouth o' the bottomless pit; but ye needna let them drap in; drive them tae the ootermast pairts o' Canady. Rather mak' them hewers o' wud an' drawers o' water; but, O Lord, ne'er mak' them magistrets, members o' Parliament, nor any kind o' rulers ower the people. An', O Lord, gine ye hae got ony lan' tae gie awa' gie it tae thine "ain' peculiar people"—the Scotch. An' the praise an' the glory will be a' thine ain—Amen.

At the recent meeting of the Anglican Synod, of Montreal, Mr. L. H. Davidson asked his Lordship Bishop Bond, who presided, if any bishop of this Province (ecclesiastical) had assumed the title of "Metropolitan." His Lordship: "Yes; the Bishop of Fredericton has assumed the title." Mr. L. H. Davidson—"I will then move that this Synod, having learned that the Lord Bishop of Fredericton has assumed and used the title of Metropolitan, this Synod respectfully but unhesitatingly protests against the assumption by said Lord Bishop of Fredericton, or any other of the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province, of the title and dignity of Metropolitan of Canada, reaffirming the decision arrived at by this Synod and embodied in the resolution printed on pages 644 and 645 of the report of the 16th Session of the Synod, which claims said dignity and title as rightfully belonging to its Bishop alone, and hereby requests him to continue to use said title, notwithstanding the action of said Right Rev. the Bishop of Fredericton." This was placed on the orders for consideration.
