The Local Legislature of Manitoba has adjourned until the 8th April, to ascertain the Dominion Government railway policy as affecting Manitoba. The test vote on adjournment stood: Government, 14; Opposition, 9.

OUR DOGS—WHAT WILL BE DONE WITH THEM?—The Clerk of the Stipendiary's Magistrate's Court to day publishes a notice to the effect that prosecutions will be immediately commenced against all persons who are known to be in possession of dogs, and who have not registered them and paid the dog-tax.

PETER DONNOLLY was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon, charged with stealing clothes from a linein Mr. Michael Funnace's yard, and was remanded 8 days. He will be examined before Theophilus DesBrisay, Esq., J. P., on Friday, on a charge of stealing a horse and two geese from Mr. Peter Connolly, Lot 30.

ECCLESIASTICAL—The Halifax Herald says: The Rev. Bruce Mackay, late priest in charge of Christ Church, Cherry Valley, P. E. I., and now parish priest of Tangier, N. S., proceeds to Bermuda in next steamer, to enter upon his new field of labor, having been appointed by the Imperial Government to a Crown living.

SIR William Jenner has retired from the Chair of Morbid Anatomy, in University College, London, which he has filled with rare success for nearly thirty years. The "Lancet" says that the demands made upon his time by his appointments and the public, have compelled Sir William's resignation, and laments that in England they have no endowments which are worthy the acceptance of their master minds.

The rumor is again put in circulation that Senator Macpherson, whose fierce arraignment of the Mackenzie Administration did it no little damage in Ontario, is to be the next Lieutenant Governor of that Province. The term of the present occupant of the high office has a year or two to run. But there seems to be no inherent improbability in the story of Senator Macpherson having been fixed upon for the succession.—*St. John News*.

The Governor General and the Princess were at the Ottawa Opera House on the 6th inst. to hear Mrs. Scott Siddons. The house was crowded except in the gallery, and the whole affair went off with *eclat*. After the last piece, "The Jackdaw of Rheims," had been powerfully recited, Mrs. Siddons was called to the royal box, and congratulated on her effort by the Marquis and Princess, both of whom shook her warmly by the hand, and entered into a conversation, which lasted for some minutes. On entering the theatre H. R. H. bowed thrice to the assemblage, which rose to receive her, the band playing God Save Queen. After taking leave of Mrs. Siddons, the audience again vociferously applauded, which H. R. H. again graciously acknowledged.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.

There is not the slightest ground for the rumor that has recently gained currency, to the effect that Hon. James Cockburn, M. P. for West Northumberland, is about to accept a Judgeship.

An at-home, skating party, and dinner party were given on Saturday by H. R. H. the Princess Louise.

The lumbermen of the Dominion will meet in the City Hall, to-morrow, for the purpose of discussing the tariff question. There is a prospect of a large attendance.

LONDON, Feb. 10.

A dispatch from Hazipur says that Wali Mohamed's presence at Jellalabad is necessary because of negotiations proceeding between the Government and Yakoub Khan.

Mohamed thinks that Yakoub will continue to resist until the Ameer is dead.

At Candahar, five fanatics dashed into the British camp on Thursday, and wounded seven men. Three soldiers were also accidentally shot, one fatally, during the disturbance. The fanatics were killed.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 10.

The laborers have appointed a deputation to learn the views of the steamship owners' association, but the deputation is prohibited from making any compromise.

Not a single vessel sailed from Liverpool for a foreign port on Monday.

Several hundred sailors have formed a union.

The boiler makers of London have struck.

The bolt makers, pattern makers, and hundreds of other tradesmen intend to follow.

Anecdote of Princess Louise.

The Niagara Falls correspondent of the Buffalo Courier describes the following incident of the Princess Louise's visit to the former place:—"Her Royal Highness is very thoughtful and considerate of all who are connected in anyway with her household. Lately she observed that one of her servants frequently placed his hands upon his face. His peculiar appearance aroused her suspicion. She immediately inquired the cause, and learned that he was suffering with a raging toothache. Placing her soft hands upon his cheek, she prescribed as follows:—"Now George you go directly and get a great, large fig; cut it open, and heat it as hot as you can; place it upon your face, over the ache, and in a little time, I am sure, you will feel much better." George was overwhelmed with her Highness's kindness and declared positively that when her hand rested upon his face every bit of the pain was driven away."

Her daughter, the Hereditary Princess of Saxe-Meiningen is expecting her confinement this month; so that if all goes well, Her Majesty the Queen will be a great-grandmother before she is sixty. Up to this time no Queen of England has ever lived to see her great grandchildren; but Her Majesty may now reasonably hope to be a great-grandmother and to see her grandchildren's grandchildren.

THE *Argus* says:—"The case before the Court ever since the trial of Millner and Johnston was brought to a close, is that of *Alley vs. Duchemin*. It excited a great deal of interest in the community, as it is considered that the result will establish a precedent which will affect the business of every owner of a factory in the city. The evidence for both the prosecution and defence was all in on Saturday, and on that evening Mr. E. J. Hodgson addressed the Court on behalf of the defence. The speech lasted for several hours, and is pronounced by all who heard it to have been one of the ablest efforts ever made in a civil case on this Island. On Monday morning Mr. Charles Palmer closed the case for the prosecution."
