THE COOK'S CORNER

SHERBET

1 envelope plain, unsweetened gelatine, 1-2 cups cold water, 1-2 cup boiling water, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup lemon juice, 1 pint strained strawberry juice.

Method: Soak the gelatine in 1-2 cup of the cold water. Dissolve in boiling water. Then add sugar and remaining cold water, lemon juice, and strawberry juice. Chill, and freeze, stirring occasionally.

STRAWBERRY SAUCE

Two cups strawberries, 1 tablespoon granulated sugar, 1 tablespoon butter, 1-2 cups powdered sugar, 1 egg white.

Method: Hull and crush berries and let stand with granulated sugar in a moderately warm place. Cream butter, add powdered sugar gradually, working it in well.

PLAIN JAM

Sugar, fresh berries. Method: Pick over and hull berries. Allow three-quarters of a pound of sugar (1 1/2 cups) to every pound of hulled berries.

Method: Pick over and hull strawberries. Wash, mash and cook quickly just until soft. Strain and set. Juice aside. Use tender rhubarb, wash, and cook gently without additional water, having it cut into small pieces but not skinned. Mix fruits and sugar and let stand several hours. Then heat and cook gently until clear and thick. Pour into jelly glasses and seal.
