Judges Denounce The Klu Klux Klan

Civil Investigation Will be Held Into Recent Clash at Lorena

WACO, Texas, Oct. 5.—Civil investigation of the clash at Lorena, near here Saturday night of participants in a Ku Klux Klan parade and Bob Buchanan, McLennan county sheriff, and his deputies today was understood to be held in abeyance pending the outcome of the sheriff's injuries. He was shot through the right lung and leg. Nine other persons were shot and stabbed, two seriously.

The clash was precipitated when Sheriff Buchanan attempted to unmask one of the leaders of the parade. He was seized and then immediately about him and the unknown man with whom he grappled became the scene of a general melee.

Young Harness Horses Lacking

CLEVELAND, Oct. 4.—The surprising number of harness horses out racing would seem to give denial to the statement by experienced breeders that the number of trotters and pacers is growing less, but a careful analysis shows that the bulk of the horses now at the races are horses with some age, racing in slower classes than their records would allow under old conditions, yearly allowance giving them an opportunity to still make some money for the owners. This season not over a dozen young and fresh untired horses have been seen that look good—and this answers the claim that breeding has not diminished.

It has reached almost the vanishing point, and in a few more seasons, unless there is a revival of breeding there will be a real famine in trotters and pacers good enough to win money on the half-milers.

Rotary Club

The weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club was held yesterday as usual at the Country Club. Rotarian Harold Jenkins occupied the chair. The guests present were: Mr. J. J. Cruickshank, of Denbarr, Mr. Sherwood of Ottawa, Mr. Robbins of Toronto and Mr. A. R. McMasters, M. P.

A very interesting address was given by Rotarian Harry Gorbell, secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., on the subject of boy's work. He believed this to be quite as important as anything his hearers would listen to in the evening (laughter) for nothing means more to Canada than the mental, physical and moral welfare of her boys who will some day become the men of the nation. He emphasized the three important influences on a boy, namely: the home, the school and the church. The indifference of parents to their children is very largely responsible for filling the juvenile courts. It would be a good thing if Charlottetown fathers took a more personal interest in the education of their boys. Few boys are naturally bad, but bad habits are acquired when their impulses and energies are not properly directed. Towards this end the Big Brother Movement which Rotary Clubs are taking up is a splendid thing. Rotarians should not think they have done enough by merely looking after the welfare of their own boys—there are lots of opportunities for helping along the other fellows' boy who has not had perhaps the same chance. This is the meaning of the Big Brother movement.

The speaker believed that the gambling devices seen on our public squares at exhibition seasons have a very injurious effect upon the character of boys, who come to look upon such practices as quite legitimate. Boys are great hero worshippers and they are quick to follow the example, good or bad, set by their parents or teachers. If parents, fathers realized the harm cigarette smoking did to their boys for instance they would be far more careful in their own smoking habits.

The speaker was a firm believer in helping the boy to elect his own goal in life. A "Find Yourself" campaign will be inaugurated this winter in Charlottetown schools which will be promoted by a Y. M. C. A. committee organized for the purpose, at which educational talks with a view to vocational guidance will be given.

The speaker concluded by emphasizing the great need of leadership in all lines of boys work. Every programme falls down because the organizers cannot get enough big hearted, sympathetic men to take up the work, which is really a fascinating occupation and surely a noble one.

Rotarian J. R. Burnett gave a brief report of what he had heard in connection with boys work campaign at a recent luncheon of the Rotary Club at Toronto.

Mr. McMasters, M. P., called upon to say a few words, expressed his pleasure upon this his first visit to the city and province. He had enjoyed the interesting address on boys work and felt in hearty sympathy with the speaker. At the same time he suggested that more attention also be given to the moral, moral and physical training of the girls of Canada, who are the future mothers of the nation.
