A fire which did considerable damage to the interior of the house occurred about three o'clock yesterday morning at the residence of Mr. Carl Woodside which is located on the main highway about a half mile east of Summerside. A call was put in to the Summerside Fire Department and several of the firemen were called who took out the pump and with the help of neighbors succeeded in getting it extinguished.

The fire originated from the fireplace in the living room and having spread inside the walls was difficult to fight. Several holes had to be cut in floors and ceilings to get at the blaze. There might have been disastrous consequences as two children were sleeping in the room next to the living room and it was the cries of one of them which awakened Mr. and Mrs. Woodside. When Mrs. Woodside came to attend to it she found the room filled with smoke and it was with some difficulty that she reached them and removed them to another part of the house.—S.

Make Progress In Construction Of Bank At S'side

Original Date For Milk Boost Retained

Mr. Henry J. MacDonald, Dairy Inspector for this Province, and Chairman of the P. E. I. Milk Control Board has advised that it has not been necessary to advance the date of the increase of the retail price of milk in Summerside and Kensington as mentioned in an article in yesterday's issue.

The date originally set for the advance from 15 cents to 16 cents per quart was March 4, and it was thought necessary to move this date on to March 11 because of the improbability of the necessary insertion in the Royal Gazette of February 24.

Mr. MacDonald stated yesterday that as the Clerk of the Executive Council had managed to get the announcement in the Royal Gazette before the March 3rd edition, the date would remain as originally announced, March 4.

In accordance with section 8 of the Act in reference to the function of the Milk Control Board, notice of an increase in price must be announced in the Gazette, and in two issues of a daily newspaper.

The Summerside Crystals stole Borden's usual third-period thunder last night at Crystal Rink, barging through for three goals in the last five minutes of play to defeat the Nationals 5 to 2, and take a two-game-to-nil stranglehold on the East Prince Intermediate A hockey championship. The third game of the series will be played in Borden Thursday night, and if a fourth game is necessary, Crystal Rink will see the two finalists in section Saturday night.

Gordon Cutcliffe and Gerard Bernard each shot a brace of tallies for the victors. Cutcliffe winning the Victory Cleaner award for most valuable player on his all-round aggressive play.
