

Diversion Of Canadian Water To U.S. Described Monstrous

SHERBROOKE (CP)—Senator Frank E. Moss (Dem., Utah), made a plea for study of a program to divert Canadian water to the U.S.

But Gen. A. G. McNaughton, 79, concerned with Canadian sovereignty, told the senator that plans to export water were sinister and monstrous and would imperil Canadian sovereignty.

liance, a plan for collecting water in northern Canada and Alaska and sending it south via the Rocky Mountains to the United States and Mexico.

Gen. McNaughton, a former Canadian chairman of the International Joint Commission, which handles water affairs between the two countries, said NAWAPA envisaged "a giant corporation dominated by US interests."

"With this mammoth inroad into Canada's lawful rights and interests, the corporation would inevitably have to assume sovereignty power to administer large areas of Canada at the expense of Canadian sovereignty."

MET REFUSAL

Canada faced a similar situation 25 years ago when it expected electric power to the U.S. on a yearly permit. "When under dire necessity of war, we wanted it back we met a stiff refusal."

"To me, it is obvious that if we make a bargain to divert water to the U.S. we cannot ever discontinue it or we will face force to compel compliance. There is nothing in our experience to date which indicates any change in vigor with which our American friends pursue objectives which they deem in their national interests."

Senator Moss, whose request for IJC study of the NAWAPA plan has not been acted on by the U.S. government, came closest to answering Mr. Mc-

Naughton's reference to force when he said: "I don't think Canada can manage this on a turn-on, turn-off basis."

He said there is no question in the United States that a decision on possible diversion should be made otherwise than by Canadians in their own best interest.

"If Canada decides it's not to its advantage, that's the end of it. There is no question about that."

MUST DECIDE

The theme of his presentation was that Canada "must decide now" to initiate studies that would determine its own needs and, if it found that there was a surplus for export, "then we can get on with the plans."

Senator Moss took issue with Gen. McNaughton's reference to opposition to water exports by Premier W. A. C. Bennett of British Columbia, who had said "not a drop of B.C. water would be sold to the United States."

The senator said: "Years ago, we heard the same thing about Canadian gas. You were never going to sell a foot of your gas. But now this is an important source of revenue for you."

Ray Williston, B.C.'s water resources minister, said last year the NAWAPA project is "simply ludicrous and one I cannot even talk about seriously."

Gen. McNaughton said the U.S. is short only of clean water Canada would be doing the U.S. a favor by declining to export water, since the Americans would be forced to put greater sums of money into programs to clear up and conserve their water.

Gordon Shrum, chairman of British Columbia Hydro, asked Senator Moss whether the United States would be prepared to turn over the Alaska Panhandle to British Columbia, since under NAWAPA much of B.C. would be flooded by a proposed lake in the Rocky Mountain trench.

"At least it's a specific proposal," reported Senator Moss.

Pay Increase Is Announced For Penitentiary Employees

KINGSTON CP—Pay raises and new job classifications for employees in Canadian penitentiary services have been announced by Revenue Minister E. J. Benson.

Mr. Benson told the 124th annual meeting of the Kingston Chamber of Commerce Wednesday that approximately 3,900 employees in federal correctional institutions will receive pay boosts totalling \$5,000,000.

In some cases the raises will be retroactive to April 1, 1964. The changes are the result of a study made by a consulting firm and discussions involving representatives of the Civil Service Association of Canada and officers of the Canadian Penitentiary Service.

"One of the underlying purposes of the changes is to bring penitentiary employees into line with their occupational counterparts elsewhere in the public service in terms of both classification and pay," he said.

Reviews of penitentiary employees' wages will be done by occupational category along with other civil servants. In the past, penitentiary employees were treated the same regardless of whether they guarded prisoners or performed stenographic duties.

The change also includes introduction of an allowance to compensate 1,800 employees other than correctional officers for duties bringing them into contact with prisoners.

This allowance ranges from \$700 a year for workers having continual contact with prisoners in maximum security institutions, to \$140 a year for employees having limited contact in minimum security institutions.

Correctional officers are excluded because working environment is taken into consideration when their salaries are determined.

Rates of pay of penitentiary employees were last reviewed and revised in April, 1964.

It is not easy to make five diamonds, even when you look at all four hands. Of course, the task is still more difficult if you see only the North-South hands, but, despite this, the actual South who played the hand made the contract and there was nothing the defense could do to stop him.

West led a club. Declarer saw that he had to lose a heart, and that the fate of the hand therefore depended upon whether he lost one spade trick or two.

Losing only one spade trick would have been relatively easy.
