Miss Ellis has long shown an aptitude for her chosen profession. In 1951 she was awarded the Dominion Command, Canadian Legion Scholarship, and the following year at Mount Allison won the Malcolm Bent Scholarship of \$200. Earlier while in Grade 8 at O'Leary, where her family formerly resided, she won the award for P. E. I. in a drawing contest sponsored by the University of New Brunswick. During that same term she led students of the Province in the Grade 8 examinations and she led her school in the Grade 10 matriculation examinations.

She also has been a winner of the Maritime Art Contest sponsored by Mount Allison University and took the Birks Gold Medal for proficiency in art while she was attending Prince of Wales College. At the latter college she took two years work in one, earning her certificate and finishing in 14th place in the Second Year.

She took an active part in many of the campus activities in that year and was a member of the cast of "Ways and Means" when the student show was put on during the last studio night.

Miss Ellis also won an 'All Round Sportsman' crest and was awarded a felt "A" as one of the girls having 50 or more points for Varsity sports. She played on the girls hockey team for three years.

Expect Increase In Honey Production

The bee population of Prince Edward Island will be approximately 10 million this summer, according to information received from officials regarding the number which have been imported to date. So far there have been 825 packages received in the Province, and each package contains approximately 10,000 bees.

These are being distributed to 110 beekeepers in all parts of the Province by the Prince Edward Island Beekeepers Association. One of the largest of the beekeepers received 184 packages direct to his own property.

Of the balance there were 500 packages handled through Charlottetown for distribution. This latter is a joint operation of the Provincial Department of Agriculture and the Experimental Farm, and the farms the bees are arranged for by Mr. Warren Burns.

Although the number brought in this year is about the same as the total for last year it is hoped that the production of honey will be higher. It is conceded that 1953 was not an especially good season, but it is thought that 1954 may show a considerable improvement.

New Pipe Organ For United Church

Trinity United Church is to have a new memorial organ dedicated to the memory of those who lost their lives in the war of 1939-1944.

The organ will be installed and ready for playing on or before December 22 of this year. The new 40,000 lb. instrument will have 48 stops and will contain 2,968 pipes. Only two organs in the Maritimes are larger than the one for which the church contracted for last evening. They are at Centennial Church, Saint John, N. B. and at All Saints Cathedral, Halifax.

The present organ was installed in the church in 1910 and was thoroughly overhauled in 1930. It is a 39 stop instrument.

The difference in size and weight of the present and the new organ will call for certain alterations in the organ case which will have to be moved out of 33 feet; at the same time the choir seating will have to be re-arranged.

The full three manual organ has been purchased from Cassavan Bros. of Saint Hyacinthe, P. Q., who have been builders of church organs for over a century. Many of their organs grace the churches of United States and Mexico as well as Canada.

During the interim in which the old organ is being dismantled and the new one installed, a two manual organ, fitted with a volume speaker will be used.

Make Plans For Holland Cove Camp

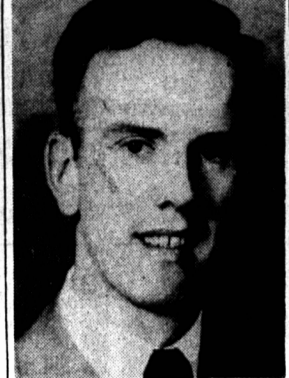

TORONTO, (CP)—International Nickel Company of Canada, Ltd., and subsidiaries had net earnings in the three months ended March 31 of \$16,046,937 U. S., after all charges, equivalent, after preferred dividends, to \$1.06 per common share.

This compared with \$15,500,551, or \$1.03 a share, in the first quarter last year, and with \$12,441,846, or 82 cents a share, in the quarter ended Dec. 31.

District Governor Speaks

District Governor Urquhart gave a brief and humorous address in which he complimented the Charlottetown Lions Club for the wonderful community work they are doing and also commended them for their recent formation here of a Lionettes Club to support the men in their service work. As District Governor during the past year, Lion Urquhart holds the distinction of being instrumental in the formation of 13 new Lions Clubs during his term of office.

Stating the need for greater fellowship in the unsettled condition of world affairs today, Mr. Fowler pointed out that Lionism is doing its part towards that objective. SHAWY GOVERNMENT

Overshadowing the harassing debate on Indo-China here is the confidence vote today in Paris on Premier Joseph Laniel's wobbling government. Laniel may fall because of his refusal to accept a debate in parliament on Indo-China policy during the Geneva conference.

Foreign Minister Bidault carefully avoided a rejection here of the Vietnam peace proposal in the hope there might be room for negotiating a compromise solution. But the Viet Namese foreign minister did not pull his punches.

Dinh said the Communist plan did not even constitute "a serious basis for discussion."

Referring to France's agreement April 28 to grant full Viet Namese independence and establish French-Viet Namese association within the French union on equal terms, he said:

"In these circumstances, the fight conducted by the Vietnam no longer has any justification... If it should nevertheless continue the fight, it would automatically give new proof that it is no more than an insurrectional movement which has passed into the service of foreign interests."
