a fractured vertebrae and contusion of both lungs. The coroner explained that the first injury was not enough to cause death in itself but the injury to the lungs caused hemorrhage within the lungs, a condition which could not be controlled, medically or surgically.

Dr. Lloyd Cox, who was the first witness called, told of the patient's condition on arrival at the hospital. He was conscious and rational in his speech. He was spitting up blood and complained of severe pain in his lower back. Immediate x-rays were taken which showed that he was hemorrhaging into the lungs themselves rather than into the chest cavity. A fractured vertebrae was also confirmed by x-rays. The condition of the man was fair during the night but the continuous bleeding into the lungs interfered with his breathing and eventually caused his death.

DROVE VICTIM TO HOSPITAL

Attended TLC Meetings At Ottawa

Mr. George Cheverie, member of the staff of the Charlottetown local office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, has just returned from Ottawa where he attended the five day convention of the Trades and Labour Congress of Canada.

Mr. Cheverie, who is 2nd vice-president of the National U.I.C. Association was in Ottawa for the annual executive meeting of that organization, which is affiliated with TLC. Together with Mr. Murdoch Campbell of Winnipeg, he was delegated to represent the National U. I. C. Association at the TLC meetings. There were 500 delegates and forty-eight delegates from affiliated organizations in all ten provinces were in attendance at this convention, which was noted for its unanimous denunciation of the few remaining labour unions who still tolerate Communists in their management.

Resolutions were adopted by the convention directing its executive to request the government to bring Civil Service salaries into line with wages paid in industry, to institute the five-day week in government offices and to standardize the weekly working hours in all departments.

During the meetings Mr. Cheverie talked with TLC President Percy Bengough, executive secretary Gordon Cushing, vice-presidents Jenoves, Berg and Jodoin, who all expressed a keen interest in both organized and unorganized workers in P.E.I. He was also told that he was the first delegate in fifty years to directly represent a group in P.E. Island at a TLC convention, although others had attended as representatives of district or regional groups.

fire started in an area 48 miles north of here where nobody had any business to be, but a good spot for blueberry pickers.

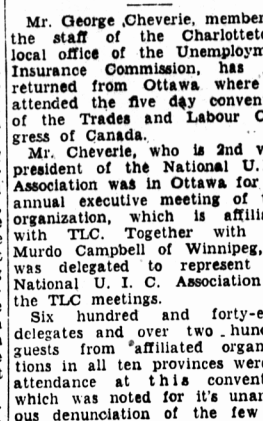
Forest Travel Ban In Quebec Area

With already 160 square miles of forest destroyed, the blaze is described as the most serious in northern Quebec in 25 years. More than 600 men have been fighting a losing battle due to high winds.

APART from the major fire burning out of control north of Forestville, Mr. Kieffer said, most of the fire outbreaks are of a minor nature. The ban means travel is banned in crown lands and on private timberlands of 2,000 acres or more. Any permits issued for forest travel are cancelled automatically.

QUEBEC (CP)—Henri Kieffer, chief of Quebec's fire protection service, announced the forest travel ban Monday along more than 600 miles of the St. Lawrence river north. Kieffer said the ban, effective between Montcalm, north of Montreal, and Saguenay has been ordered because of a three-week drought throughout the area and

Rev. Charles G. Dickieson (above) son of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Dickieson, New Glasgow, P. E. I., graduated recently from the University of Chicago where he received his Master of Arts degree as well as that of Bachelor of Divinity in Philosophical Theology and Literature.

A former student at Prince of Wales College, he taught school in this Province for a year prior to going to the University of Toronto where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1949. Possessing a keen interest in English, Rev. Dickieson enrolled in several post-graduate courses while at the Chicago university and also did extensive work in theological studies. In his thesis work for his Master of Arts degree he dealt with poetic theory and took as his examples Blake and Coleridge in terms of their philosophical-theological significance. He also did a great deal of study of the works of many other great British writers and spent considerable research time on Russian Orthodoxy during the preparation of his thesis on literary structure in the work of Russian novelists.

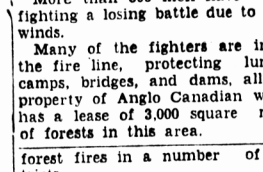

FOURTH QUEENS ANNOUNCEMENT

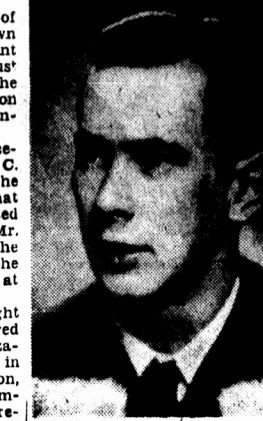

To Teach Boys Woodwork At Notre Dame Convent



TORONTO (CP)—This fall, thanks to Sister Ste. Marguerite Louise, boys at the Notre Dame Convent School on Prince Edward Island will be able to learn woodwork.

Sister Louise was one of 125 teacher-students graduating from the five-week industrial art training course at the Ontario College of Education here. Examples of her woodworking handicraft were on display with the work of fellow students.

She admitted that the long robes of her religious order hampered her work, but said it didn't bother her too much because she was not doing advanced work with machines.

"There is no training like this available on the island," Sister Louise explained. "So I came here to get it. The boys enjoy this kind of work so much."

Like the other graduates from the course, including six other sisters, Sister Louise is a fully qualified teacher. Some of the teachers are already industrial arts specialists. Others, in the elementary groups, will go on to take the full year course in industrial arts next fall.
