Farmer Islander Dies In Toronto

Many older people of Charlottetown will remember the late Mr. William W. MacPhee who died at his home in Toronto on Tuesday at the age of 63.

Mr. MacPhee left here over 30 years ago. A native of Clyde River, he had lived in this city for many years and had served as a truant officer and also on the staff of The Guardian. His father, the late Mr. James MacPhee, had operated the old Savoy Hotel.

When Mr. MacPhee here he took a position as associate editor of the Orange Sentinel, in Toronto, and later was with both the Toronto Star and the Toronto Telegram. A long-time member of the Orange Lodge, he had founded and was Past Master of the John Knox Lodge, Toronto.

In 1945 the late Mr. MacPhee was a candidate as an Independent Liberal Conservative in the Ontario election campaign. He was also one of the organizers of the Maritime Provinces Association in Toronto.

Surviving in addition to his wife, the former Miss Cassie MacLeod, Pictou, are four daughters and three sons. One son, Flying Officer John Goodwill MacPhee, was killed overseas in the last war. The daughters are Mrs. E. R. Gilbert, Mrs. M. P. Mabey, Mrs. E. A. Aberdeen and Mrs. P. W. Bennett, all of Toronto. Three sons surviving are also residing in Toronto. They are Daniel, James and Harvey Bishop.

The Father Of Canadian Munitions Island Born Military Expert Visiting Here On 75th Birthday Anniversary

Lieut. Colonel S. S. Weatherbie, of Ottawa, is observing his 75th birthday today in his native Province, having been born in Georgetown on the 28th of April, 1876.

Colonel Weatherbie has had a unique and interesting military career. This began in 1890 when, on July 1st of that year, he attended his first military training camp at Brighton, Charlottetown, as member of the 4th Regiment, P.E.I. Artillery. During the next several years he also was a member of the Halifax Garrison Artillery and Gunner Officer (7) in Canada's Navy, to wit the D.G.S. "Stanley" on fisheries protection service.

In January 1896 he attended the Royal School of Artillery, Quebec, for a short course, after which he joined the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery, serving during the next several years as Bandsman, Clerk and Pay Sergeant. He was selected to go to England to take the Artillery Long Course at Sheerness and Woolwich, in 1899 where he obtained a First Class Certificate of 87%.

He was then selected to take the highly tough, competitive Master Gunners Course at the Ordnance Gunnery School (Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps) on July 1st, 1903, Captain Weatherbie was the junior Captain and is now the only surviving officer of that first Gazette. Being posted for duty at Millia Headquarters he was appointed Staff Officer of the new corps. With the taking over by the Canadian Government of the defences of Halifax and Esquimaux it became necessary that Canadian officers be trained for technical positions, one of these being inspecting Ordnance Officer at Halifax. Sees Bigger Spot For Canuck Women In Public Sphere

CALGARY, April 28 —(CP)—Two prominent bachelors who guided Canadian affairs of State for a long time have been blamed for the lack of women in the country's political life. The accused: The late Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and the late Viscount Bennett. The accuser: Mrs. Evelyn Tufts of Ottawa, resident correspondent in the parliamentary press gallery for 15 years.

"They never had a chance to get acquainted with women and they didn't appreciate them, but we may do a lot better from now on," the still blonde grandmother said here on a recent visit. She noted the late President Roosevelt had woman as Minister of Labor in his cabinet. He also appointed the first woman diplomat, Mrs. Ruth Owen, to Denmark.

This placing of confidence in women by President Roosevelt, she believed, was due largely to the fact that he had as his wife a most outstanding woman who set a pattern of public service few American women have equalled.

Progress Made In Soil Testing

Approximately 300 farmers in the Province have portions of their soil tested at the laboratories of the Experimental Farm each year, it has been learned from Mr. G. B. Whiteside, soil analyst.

The services, carried out with the cooperation of the Provincial and Federal Governments is designed to aid farmers in their fertilizer practices, it was stated.

The laboratory was opened in 1944 and the number of farmers taking advantage of its facilities has remained practically constant with many of them repeating the practices yearly.

Farmers in certain areas are more prone to have their soil tested than those in other districts. An analysis of the figures last year showed that 74 per cent of the applicants were from Queens County; 10 per cent from Kings; and 16 per cent from Prince. Proximity of the laboratory to farmers in Queen's County is a possible reason for the Queen's County farmers heavy use of the facilities.

In addition to testing soil for these applicants the men in the lab do a great deal of research work on soil fertility and advisory work on soil from various experimental centres. Mr. Woodside is aided in his work by Mr. Roy Boswell. He stated that they must keep within the limitations of what they can handle but any soil that is sent into the laboratory by farmers will be tested.

Ledger of Liberty Lodge No. 14, Good Templars organized May 11, 1865. Records of Goods In Bonded Warehouse, Charlottetown 1864-1865. Ledger and Day Book, John P. Tanton, general merchant, commencing Jan. 1, 1857. Arithmetic Books (3), handwritten, as used in Charlottetown Schools by John P. Tanton, 1842-1844.

A number of other books dealing with Prince Edward Island etc., are included in the generous gift, which is greatly appreciated by the Archives. "In many other homes in Charlottetown there are rare books and pamphlets which the Archives are happy to receive," states Mr. Bramwell Chandler. Anything bearing a Charlottetown or Summerside printer's name has a place waiting for it in our Archives.

Among the Coombs' books are Calkin's History of British America as taught in Prince Street School in 1800's and Currie's practical Grammar authorized for use in P.E.I. schools a decade earlier. The headquarters of the P.E.I. Libraries located in Prince of Wales College is the collecting depot for material of this kind.

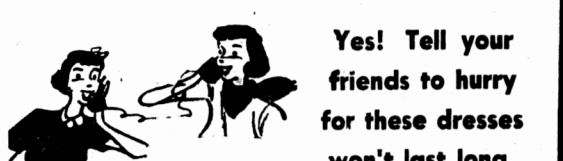
Eight members answered roll call by displaying exhibit of historical interest. One visitor was present and one new member was welcomed to the Institute.
