ABOUT two thousand men are at work building the Callender branch of the Canada Pacific, which connects Western Ontario with the national highway. The road will be completed by May, 1886.

The British Government has decided to limit the increased expenditure on navy during the coming financial year, to £1,200,000, opposing the proposal to divert the sinking fund to defray the cost of new ships.

The expenses of the Nile expedition, South African reinforcements and increase of navy will be met by an extra income tax of two pence in the pound.

"ARE YOU READY?"—On exhibition at the Diamond Bookstore for some time has been a well executed pen drawing of the "Varsity Race." The contestants are in position to receive the word "go" and the anxiety of the oarsmen to take first water is well portrayed in their respective countenances.

The picture is a large one. It was, we learn, drawn by a fifteen year old son of Captain Andrew Sullivan. By its execution, young Sullivan shows he possesses an extraordinary taste for art which is well worthy of encouragement.

THE barque William Owen, Capt. Brown, owned by Hon. L. J. Owen, put into Georgetown yesterday. Capt. Brown, who arrived in this city to-day, reports that he left Montreal on Thursday, the 23rd. bound for Buenos Ayres, with a cargo of lumber. He left Quebec on the 28th and experienced a heavy gale on the River St. Lawrence on the 5th inst. When off Cape de Maud he lost the deck load, the foretopmast, staysail, lower fore-top-sail, foresail, mizzen-staysail and all m'vables about the deck, including the lower and all running lines. He was therefore obliged to put into Georgetown for new sails, water, hawsers, etc. The William Owen will resume her passage in a few days.

SCOTT ACT PROSECUTIONS IN KING'S.—Several respectable Hampton correspondents write to the St. John Telegraph complaining of the conduct of the Registrar of Deeds, who is also a justice of the peace, in the matter of Scott Act cases. The complaints are in part that the Registrar is a member of an alliance which contributes a fund for the prosecution of offenders, and is himself a contributor to the fund, and therefore an interested party, that he is instrumental in causing complaints to be lodged before himself, and that in a recent Scott Act trial before him and another justice he so far forgot himself as to use, from the bench, very improper language toward the defendant's attorney. The correspondents say the matter has been brought to the notice of the Attorney-General.

The Bazaar in aid of St. Joseph's Convent, Pownall Street, commences in Market Hall to-morrow afternoon, and will be concluded on Thursday night. It is under the management of St. Joseph's Society, an organization composed of young ladies. The Society has been at work several months preparing for the bazaar, and the work which it has performed reflects the greatest credit on the members. On the tables to-morrow will be displayed a profusion of elegant and useful work, which will be well worth seeing, if not securing. Refreshment tables will be stocked with delicacies, and more than the usual number of Bazaar amusements will be provided. The admission is only ten cents, and as the bazaar is in aid of a praiseworthy object we advise all to attend.

WRESTLING.—A wrestling match took place in New York on the 9th inst., at a well known sporting resort, between John Hart, of Manchester, England, and Matsada Sorakichi, the Japanese wrestler, in which the latter was successful. The first bout was catch-as-catch-can, and was won by the Jap after an interval of hard work. The second bout was in the Japanese style, and Matsada won in a brief space of time. The prize was \$250, and was awarded to the Jap. Wm. Malwood, of New York, champion Grasshopper-loan wrestler, and Col. McLaughlin, of St. Louis, Mo., had a mixed wrestling match, best three in five, for a purse of \$300, on the 8th inst. Each secured two falls, and in the fifth bout McLaughlin's hold took, which McLaughlin was declared the winner.

The Franchise Bill.

LONDON, Nov. 10.

The Commons to-day rejected by a vote of 194 to 169 the amendment to the Franchise Bill, the purpose of which was to prevent the Bill from going into operation until the scheme of redistribution should be accepted. The Bill then passed in committee on the whole without amendment.

Excitement in Paris.

PARIS, Nov. 10.

Great excitement has prevailed in the lobbies of the Chambers to-day, owing to the confirmation of a report that the Cabinet Council on Saturday decided to forego demanding indemnity of China. Much discussion prevails on account of this.

The Hong Kong Riots.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.

Full reports of the riots at Hong Kong, which began on Sept. 30th, and lasted three days, show that they were less serious than at first reported.

The Lord Mayor's Show.

LONDON, Nov. 10.

The show in celebration of the entrance into office of the new Lord Mayor of London took place to-day. It passed off with immense eclat.

Steamer Lost with all Hands.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.

The steamer Miramer, running between Japanese ports and Hong Kong, foundered during a storm off the Chinese coast, Sept. 21st. All hands were lost.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.

In the set-to to-night Sullivan knocked Prof. Lullin out in three rounds. There were 5,000 spectators.

HIGH TIDES IN RESTIGOUCHE.—There was the highest tide known for twenty years on the Bay Chaleur on the 5th. It was caused by the east wind at the time of full moon. At Jacques River every thing on the beach was completely shattered. Large rocks, boats of all sorts (including a sail boat belonging to the station agent, Mr. C. P. Brown), the bathing house of Mr. Barclay's hotel, and all the landings and roadways, were destroyed. The beach presents a desolate appearance, covered with drift wood and debris. A family by the name of McCurdy, living on a low point of land at Jacques River, came near losing their house. The water kept coming in, and they left it and tried to wade to the bank. When they were up to their waists in water, some neighbors saw them and came out to them with horses. To launch a boat was impossible. Two men, Caro and Blair, started out in a small boat Tuesday evening, and have not since been heard of. They were last seen rounding Black Point. At Mr. John McNair's Mill, Louis-on-Brook, boom, wharf, etc., were washed away and all thrown together. At Dalhousie, the wharf and part of the track were washed away. A terrific snow storm raged all day, both on the 5th and the 6th.—Chatham World.

At Hamilton, Ont., a few days ago, Mrs. Sullivan was arrested for kneeling down on the sidewalk in front of a grocery store and cursing the proprietor. Mrs. Sullivan in defence admitted that she had knelt on the sidewalk and cursed the whiskey that the proprietor sold. She said he had given her son whiskey, so that he was sent to prison for two months. Mrs. Sullivan was fined \$2 and costs or ten days in jail.

Six railway navvies have died on the Canada Pacific near Sudbury Junction from eating pork affected by trichinosis.
