**Peace and Hepatitis Stressed in Commons**

**OTTAWA (CP)** — Do you have a persistent ache in the liver chest, recurring nausea, increasing lack of interest in food and activity and a general feeling of "less-than-feeling"? This question isn't leading up to an advertisement for a non-toxic cure for your ills. It's a warning that these symptoms may be a danger signal of a serious disease which seems to be on the increase in Canada and causing health authorities concern.

The disease is infectious hepatitis and, without proper care, infected, serious cases of it can wind up in jaundice and, at worst, cirrhosis of the liver and death. Your best step is to see your doctor.

The seriousness of the rise in hepatitis among Canadians was underlined in the Commons by Health Minister Mon-

leith who said a committee of the Dominion Council of Health is studying the disease and has, so far, recommended some steps in combating it.

**INCIDENCE RISING**  
 He was replying to a question from Dr. Stanley Haidatis (1-Toronto) who noted that hepatitis is up 15 per cent in Canada last year.

Mr. Monteith said the commonest stressed sanitary control of the disease is to avoid contact with the disease and to maintain a high standard of public sanitation — and use of gamma globulin, a kind of preventive serum made from blood.

Mr. Monteith said hepatitis is an important health problem in Canada and elsewhere and "we will continue to take active steps to keep this disease under control."

Reported cases rose from 172 in 1958 to 1959, to 478 in 1959 and 12,381 last year. Rates per 100,000 population in those years were 2.2, 29.9, 27.3 and 67.9.

Available figures on deaths show 104 in 1954, 82 in 1959 and 133 last year for death rates per 100,000 population of 0.7, 0.5 and 1.7, respectively.

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**N.B. Schedules Budworm Effort For Next Year**

**FREDERICTON (CP)** — Forest Protection Limited, the company responsible for budworm spraying in a new Brunswick, has announced plans to continue its operations next year.

Directors of the company announced that a new type of insecticide will be used on small portions of the spray area in which main salmon streams are located.

Use of the new spray would determine operating the effect on budworm and gain experience in the use of a combination of insecticides and guard against undesirable effects on the fish and wildlife of the province.

At a directors' meeting Monday, Dr. B. F. W. Pflieger, and entomologist Dr. R. B. Belva and R. MacDonald indicated that the area of forest endangered by spruce budworm had shrunk appreciably in 1962.

The company decided to undertake a spray program in 1963 designed to cut back high populations of budworm and to protect trees on approximately 400,000 acres at a cost estimated at not more than \$500,000.
