GREW VERY TIRED.

Lord Aberdeen in the Role of an Organ Pumper.

The Ottawa correspondent tells the following good story at the expense of Lord Aberdeen :

An interesting story is being told about the corridors of the House concerning the late Cure Champagne, of the village of Gatineau Point and Lord Aberdeen. It will be remembered that a few springs ago Lady Aberdeen had a narrow escape from being drowned while driving along the Gatineau river road. The spring freshets had washed away a portion of the roadway, and the spirited team attached to the Vice-Regal carriage became unmanageable and plunged into the swiftly running waters and were drowned. Lady Aberdeen herself escaped with her life.

Cure Champagne on the following Sunday held a thanksgiving service in the Roman Catholic church at Gatineau Point, a little attention which won for him the gratitude of the Governor-General and Lady Aberdeen, a few Sundays later the church was supplied with a new bell, the gift of Vice Royalty, and the Cure became a great friend and frequent visitor of Lord and Lady Aberdeen at the Vice-Regal residence across the Ottawa River.

Now it seems that Cure Champagne during his lifetime was a skilled musician, and when engaged in his favorite pursuit was apt to become very much absorbed and oblivious as to what was going on about him. It was about the time this friendship sprang up that the Governor-General had installed in the private chapel at Rideau Hall, a new church organ of which he was exceedingly proud. One day, when calling at the moderate mansion of the Cure, Lord Aberdeen, knowing Father Champagne's love for music invited him over the river to try his new organ. The Cure was of course much delighted, and at the specified time presented himself at the Vice Regal residence. He was conducted by Lord Aberdeen to the chapel, and was soon absorbed in producing volumes of music from the new organ. The organ, however, had only been installed a few days, and there had been time to have it provided with the electric machinery necessary to pump the wind for the bellows. When the Cure sat down to play Lord Aberdeen recollected that the servant who was usually on hand to work the lever of the bellows had not been notified that the organ was to be tested, and of course was not on hand.

Not wishing to detain the enthusiastic Cure until a servant could be called, Lord Aberdeen quietly slipped behind the curtain provided to conceal the human air pumping machine, and began to operate the lever. For a full hour the Cure poured forth a flood of melody while His Excellency supplied the wind. Finally, the R. V. ceased playing for a moment, and the Governor-General, passing from his exertion, and in a bath of perspiration, stepped from behind the curtain and in a panting voice asked the Cure how he liked the instrument. Father Champagne all unsuspecting of the tremendous exertions of his illustrious host, expressed his keen appreciation and indicated the desire to render another oratory. This was too much, however, for the painting Vice-Regal representative, who in a voice of quiet appeal, informed his guest that he could not possibly stand any more at present.

It is needless to say that the mortification of the Cure was complete when he discovered the true state of affairs. In order to make a reputation of the experience impossible Lord Aberdeen had electric pumping machinery for his new organ installed the very next day.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Montreal Gazette: Sir Michael Hicks-Beach spoke for two hours in delivering the budget speech in the Imperial Parliament. Mr. Fielding spoke for three hours and a half in delivering the budget speech in the Canadian Parliament. Sir Michael's was the greatest budget, too. These are matters that are not judged by the number of words used.

Mail and Empire: "Eternal vigilance is the price of protection." That is what Mr. Fielding told the House a year ago. Now the price depends on Uncle Sam. If he can make a "dicker" with the Government, protection will be knocked down to him.

The Minister of Agriculture stated in the House of Commons a few days ago that it is the intention of the Government to establish an experimental tobacco station in Eastern Ontario.

Said Mr. Tarte at Brantford: "You know that I have not a reputation for being economical. . . . We have to spend money." Then he outlined some schemes which will involve an outlay of millions of dollars. "Money is cheap," he exultantly exclaimed; "\$30,000,000 represent at three per cent. only \$90,000!" And the listening Liberals cheered lustily.

Switzerland is preparing to erect six more sanitariums for the treatment of consumption. Four are already open. The latest one, in the canton of Zurich, is splendidly situated amid pine forests. Its total cost was \$110,000. This was raised by voluntary subscriptions. The patients pay from two to four francs a day, according to their circumstances. The Cantonal Government contributes one franc a day per head. This is but a sample of what is being done all over Europe. But the authorities here see such places as Government Ponds and do nothing.

Canadian Pacific stock has gone above the par mark on the stock exchange and the situation generally fairly warrants the confidence of those who are buying it. The Montreal Gazette remarks that it is somewhat hard to realize that eighteen years ago there were many men, and a whole political party in Canada, who did not believe that the road would be built, and that fifteen years ago, even those who undertook the work were anxious about the outcome. Courageous faith in a country has rarely been more markedly justified than in connection with this enterprise.

The Mail and Empire reports that Sir Wilfrid Laurier found a "unanswerable objection" to the proposal to take the census in 1900 in the fact that it would require an amendment to the British North America Act. He said:—"Canada will do well to refrain from lightly amending the provisions of the B. N. A. Act except in cases where there is not merely a strong, but an overwhelming case. It was preferable, to his mind, to put up even with inconvenience than tamper with the constitution, which it is the duty of Canadian to retain in its entirety, unless a great wrong would be done by its retention." These words will be remembered when he introduces his Senate resolutions. He has set himself a big task. He must prove not only that there is a "strong" case, but an "overwhelming" one in favor of those resolutions. It will prove amusing.

The Dreyfus Case.

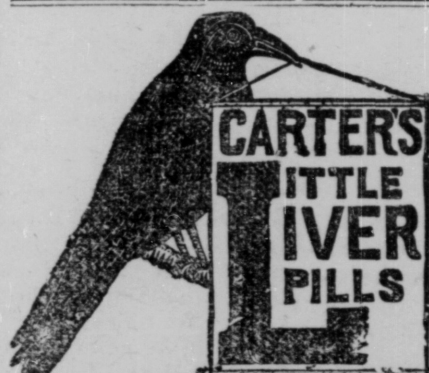
PARIS, May 4.—Slowly but steadily the net is closing around the French General Staff, in the Dreyfus revision enquiry. General Mercier, who was minister of war at the time Dreyfus was condemned, on being called upon by M. de Freycinet, the present minister of war, to produce the report regarding the secret dossier which Lieut Colonel Du Paty De Cliau testified he had sent to Mercier, replied that he had destroyed it, and he called General Conze as a witness to the truth of this statement. Unfortunately, for Mercier, General Conze had already testified before the Court of Cassation that, although Mercier destroyed the original, he kept a copy.
