British Guiana Minister Visits

The Rev. Neil Ramsaroop, minister of Ramdeholl Memorial Presbyterian Church, New Amsterdam, British Guiana, who is making a tour of the Maritime Provinces, will visit the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island during the week of May 21st-26th.

The parents of Rev. Mr. Ramsaroop came to British Guiana as indentured immigrants to the sugar plantations. They were won to Christ by the effective preaching of Canadian Presbyterian Missionaries.

The Rev. Neil Ramsaroop received his early education in the Canadian Presbyterian Mission Primary and High School. After graduation from High School he served the church in British Guiana for eleven years as a Catechist. In 1942 he started Theological studies at Bethel College, and following his graduation in 1945 was called and ordained to the Christian Ministry. He has been minister of Ramdeholl Memorial Church since 1948. It is the second largest of the British Guiana congregations.

The General Board of Missions of the Presbyterian Church in Canada brought the Rev. Mr. Ramsaroop to Canada last year for post graduate theological studies in Presbyterian College, McGill University, Montreal. He will return to the Montreal College for further study in the Fall.

The Island Churches which Rev. Mr. Ramsaroop will visit during his tour will include Tyne Valley on May 21st, Summerside May 22nd, Clyde River May 23rd, Murray Harbour North May 24th, On Sunday, May 26th, he will preach in Zion Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, at the morning service, and at the evening service in New London Presbyterian Church.

Farewell Party On Retirement

On May 10th, Mr. John D. MacDonald of Milton, P.E.I. retired from the fruit and Vegetable Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture, after 20 years of faithful service. Mr. MacDonald was noted by both shippers and inspectors for his just decisions, his attention to duty, his mild manner and true friendships. Mr. MacDonald's devotion to duty was previously demonstrated by his service in World War I from September 1914 to May 1919.

Gray was Premier of P.E.I. and on the committee at the time of the meeting held in Charlottetown to discuss a Maritime Union of which developed Confederation.

Mrs. Larkin was endowed with zealous christian faith and she practiced her religion with fervour. For many years she was a member of the Catholic Women's League of the Sacred Heart. Dying as she lived in union with God, she accepted her illness patiently and received frequently the Sacrament of Holy Mother Church. She had the consolation of being cared for in her illness by her husband, her son Herbert and his wife. They spared nothing to make her last sojourn on earth comfortable.

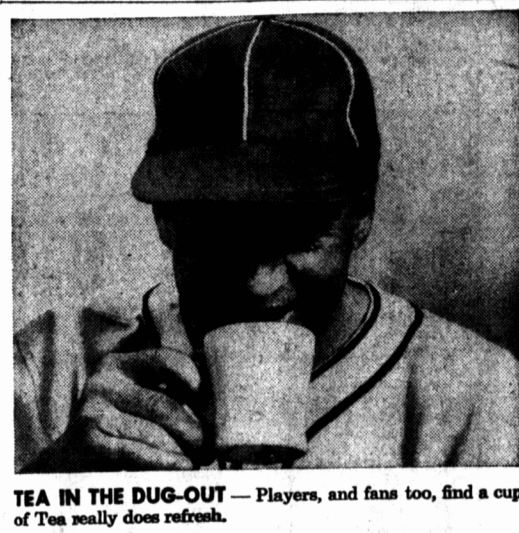
