S'side Co-op Purchases Fur Pool Bldg. For Eggs

The Summerside Co-operative Association Ltd. yesterday purchased the former P.E.I. Fur Pool building for use as a new egg marketing centre. Charles Yeo, president of the co-operative, confirmed last evening that new egg washing and egg grading equipment has been ordered, and the new facilities are expected to be in use by April. This development which follows weeks of meetings to coordinate plans is hoped will result initially in a 400 per cent increase in local egg production. This is expected also to result in more producers going into the poultry business, and already several have taken steps to increase their flocks. The new facilities are considered adequate to handle the foreseeable increase in egg production, and the storage facilities in the new building will be adequate to handle about 4,000 cases of eggs.

Roads Are Open In S'side District

SUMMERSIDE — Roads were still open and travelling good in the Summerside area last night after 3.7 inches of snow fell during the day. The forecaster at the "met" section said that very little more snow was expected to fall during the night. He was also optimistic that the strong winds of up to 60 m.p.h. would not strike the area as previously forecast as the storm decreased in intensity as it moved across the district. However winds were expected to be around 25 m.p.h. from the northwest with gusts to 35 m.p.h. Flows were standing by at the government garage last night but were not sent out, at least during the early part of the night. However it was expected that secondary roads would easily fill in if high winds developed.

3-Month Term Given In S'side Assault Case

SUMMERSIDE — Alban Luce, 17, of Summerside was sentenced to three months in Prince County Jail by Judge W.E. Darby in county court yesterday, after being convicted of assault. Luce was charged with robbery with violence after an incident on the night of Dec. 30 when the complainant Joseph Martin of Summerside was badly beaten up and lost his wallet which was later found on the accused's person. Judge Darby pointed out before sentencing that "this is a very serious crime—one of the most serious in the whole calendar of criminality." He told Luce that he was convicting him of assault only due to a technicality. His Honor stated that the charge read "did steal from the person of" but there had been no evidence to prove that Luce took the wallet from the person of Martin. Martin said he didn't know how the accused got his wallet while the accused stated he found it on the seat of Martin's car. He took the car after the assault resulting in a police chase to Day's Corner. Defence counsel G. Bruce MacDonald asked for a suspended sentence because of Luce's age and the fact that he had no previous record. Mr. MacDonald also pointed out Luce has served 30 days already as he has been in custody since Dec. 30. Crown Prosecutor George R. MacMahon told the court Luce had been convicted of assault nearly two years ago and received a suspended sentence. At that time he asked for the maximum of two years. Judge Darby said he would allow the time already served to count as part of the three month term.

Jail Is Preferred To Fine Of \$100

SUMMERSIDE — An eighteen year old Richmond resident, Robert Donald Waite, stated yesterday that he would rather spend the time in jail than have to collect money for a fine of \$100 levied by Prince County Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald after the accused had entered a plea of guilty to a charge of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol. The accused, who was arrested in Bedouque on January 27, was given a 15 day jail term. Two charges of breaking and entering stores in O'Leary were heard yesterday and both cases were adjourned until Feb. 6 after the accused pleaded not guilty to both and elected trial by the magistrate. The charges were laid in connection with the theft of goods from the stores of Claude MacNeill and Rank MacKinnon on Friday night, Jan. 26. Glendon Yeo, of O'Leary, was the accused in both cases and was not represented by counsel. There is reported to be about \$100 worth of goods involved. The RCMP worked in conjunction with the O'Leary town constable Bill Crain, on this case. Kevin Joseph Perry, Skinners Pond, entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of possession of a still and also had his case adjourned until Feb. 6, for hearing. A \$25 fine was levied against John Lewis Jones of Roseville, upon his pleading guilty to a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased from a vendor. Two men, Fulton Thompson Cousins, Darnley, and George Nelson Campbell, South West Lot 16 paid fines of \$10 and costs on

Mr. Howard said it is discrimination to give Newfoundland fishermen \$300,000 in federal funds after giving \$42,000,000 to Prairie farmers, and "an even greater insult" to ignore west-coast fishermen altogether. Herman M. Batten (L-Humber - St. George's) said he couldn't understand the distinction between farmers and Newfoundland fishermen. The \$300,000 would mean about \$20 apiece for the fishermen involved. If the same payment were made to western farmers, the bill would have been \$5,000,000 instead of \$42,000,000. James R. Tucker (I - Trinity - Conception) said there appears to be confusion over the number of fishermen involved. But he said there are at least 9,000 and not more than 12,000, and the \$300,000 would mean \$30 a family or less than three cents a day.

CONCEPT DIFFERS

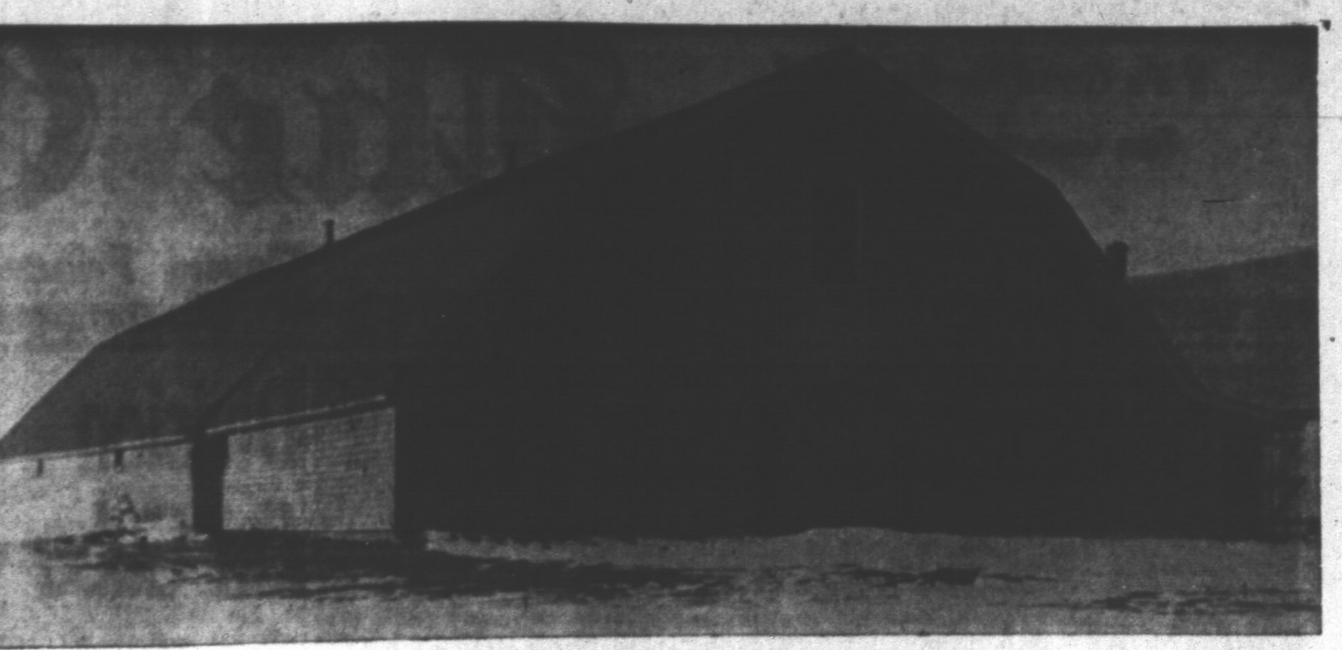
Charles R. Granger (L-Grand Falls - White Bay-Labrador) said that evidently the government's concept of need differs between the Prairies and Newfoundland. He said the \$300,000 should be used to buy materials which fishermen could use to repair their nets, traps, boats, engines, and stages. This would not only spare their own cash but prepare them for greater productivity in the spring. "A real chance has been missed to accomplish something really worthwhile and give assistance to people who really need it," Mr. Granger said. The time would have to come when fishermen are put on an equal footing with farmers.
