Yank Scientists Again Occupy Arctic Ice Island

OTTAWA, (CP)—A group of American scientists has again occupied the floating ice island T-3 in the Arctic ocean.

The Americans invited a Canadian scientist to go along but the offer had to be turned down because no one was available, the defence department said.

No Canadian has ever done research work on an Arctic ice island though T-3 itself was discovered in April, 1947, by RCAF Sqdn. Ldr. Keith Greenaway of Woodville, Ont., one of the world's foremost aerial navigators.

The Russians maintain at least two permanent drift stations in the Arctic ocean. One of these operated for a time last fall in Canadian waters near the North Pole.

There is a possibility that American and Soviet scientists drifting about the Arctic on ice islands may come within close range of one another, though this is a long chance.

Hospitals Get Ottawa Brushoff

OTTAWA (CP)—Hospital executives got Tuesday what they called "a beautiful example of the brush-off with the velvet touch" when they asked for more federal money.

Larry Taylor of Vancouver told a national health and welfare panel at the Canadian Hospital Association's 13th biennial meeting that hospitals should get more money from the federal government for x-rays they take of indigent Indian patients.

Dr. H. A. Procter of the federal health department told Mr. Taylor he sees no possibility of special fees for medical attention hospitals give Indians.

"We deal with Indians as citizens of this country, which they are," he said. "The British North America Act says there is to be no special legislation affecting Indians enacted by the provinces. Any date the federal government will legislate on medical matters on the basis of racial extraction."

"We think this is a shared responsibility. If an Indian has tuberculosis, it is a family risk. We know what an x-ray plate costs, what the federal costs, and the developer, and we are prepared to pay our share of those costs."

DRIFTS TOWARD POLE

American scientists abandoned T-3 a year ago because it had drifted too close to a shore weather station on Ellesmere island to make observations on the ice island of much use.

However, T-3, big enough to support a 4,000-foot runway for aircraft, has again drifted north toward the Pole. The American scientists will occupy it until Sept. 1.

Though the defence department is not sending any scientists into the far Arctic this year, the department of mines and technical surveys is sending two teams north this summer.

One will look for mineral deposits in the Queen Elizabeth islands. The other, using a plane, will try to determine whether the undersea Lomonosov range, discovered by the Russians, extends from the Soviet side of the Arctic to Ellesmere island, Canada's most northerly land mass.

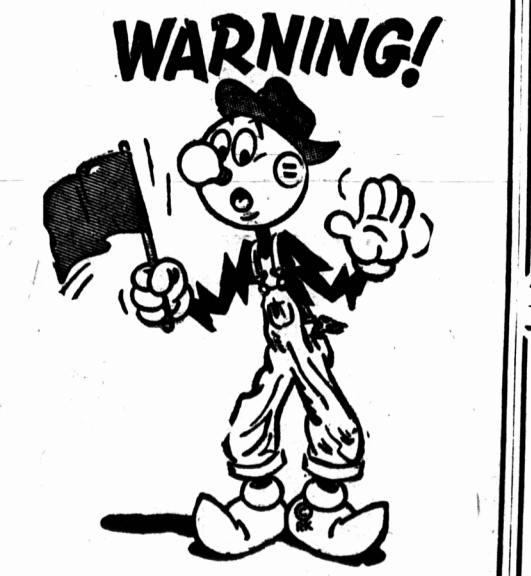
