Vermont Girl Wins Women's Ski Event

NORFOLK, Norway, Feb. 14 (CP) — Andrea Mead Lawrence, a trim brunette from Rutland, Vt., flashed down a hazardous, steel-covered trail today to win the women's slalom race and send the United States off to a fast start in the sixth winter Olympics.

The 19-year-old wife of a member of the U.S. men's ski team covered the 1640-yard course with its 59 control gates, in two minutes, 6.8 seconds. She had a margin of 2.2 seconds over Dagmar Rom, movie actress from Austria who deserted the cameras for the Norwegian ski trails.

Rhoda Wurtele Eaves, 25-year-old Montreal housewife, finished ninth in 2:14. It was a creditable showing for the Canadian girl who had No. 1 spot and was trail-breaker for the field of 45 skiers from 16 countries. Mrs. Lawrence one of the top-seeded skiers, had preferred the spot as No. 4.

The three other Canadian girls who raced today finished far behind Rhoda. Rosemarie Schutz of Montreal was 23rd, clocked in 2:18; Lucille Wheeler of St. Jovite, Que., 16-year-old member of the team, was 27th in 2:22; and Joanne Hewson of Montreal 30th in 2:23.9.

In third place, timed in 2:10, was a German hausfrau, Mrs. Anne Marie Buchner.

PUSAN, Korea (NEA) — The lean, bearded soldier known as Chuck shuffled into the shower room to get cleaned up to go home on rotation.

The room was bare wood with a concrete floor and not very private. But the soldier treated his surroundings like a man entering a temple to commune with the Deity.

He turned on both faucets, then tested them with his palms. "Oh God," he sighed. "That's good."

Slowly Chuck moved under the water and you could see him relax as the hot needle spray began driving the caked dirt out of his body.

He stood with his whiskered face slightly turned into the shower, hands hanging limply at his sides. He stood there maybe five minutes like that, hardly moving a muscle.

It was obvious that a lot more than Korean dirt was being washed off of Chuck. He was being cleansed of months of killing-fright, being shot at, living in a dank bunker on a frozen ridge, dangerous patrols deep into enemy lines, terrible homesickness.

It seemed for a while that he had fallen asleep under the shower. But moving around to get a better look at his face, you could see he was wearing an almost beatific expression, eyes closed, lips drawn wide in a happy smile.

It was as if the whole mystery of life were being revealed to him and what he saw was infinitely sweet.

His first movement was to turn his back to the shower so that the main stream was hitting the nape of his neck. He held this position for another five minutes, still smiling, hands at his sides.

Then he began to rotate his head ever so slowly. This played the steaming stream all over the top of his head and shoulders. With what was obviously an effort, he commenced to massage his scalp with his fingers.

Opening one eye, he took a piece of soap and began to lather his scalp—all with a motion so languid you'd never guess Chuck was a man about to catch a boat in two hours to be rotated home after nine and one-half months of fighting.

After allowing the water to rinse the soap out of his hair, he lifted first one arm, then the other and let the water splash into his armpits. Still smiling, SUN with his eyes closed.

Finally he stepped out of the shower and commenced lathering himself from head to toes, with exquisite slowness paying no attention to a new batch of showerers crowding into the room.

Nobody showed him out. Nobody tried to speed him up. A man doesn't know that kind of ecstasy but maybe once or twice in his life.

Chuck just went on lathering and showering until almost boat time.

Referee Explains Why Game Was Awarded Sydney

The Sydney Millionaires were awarded the game last night when the Islanders refused to play after being told to do so by the referees for the third time during the contest. The Guardian learned at 1:30 this morning from referee Jerry Mathieu.

Referee Mathieu referred to rule section (b) of the C. A. H. A. rule book which reads "If a team is withdrawn or fails to go on the ice or being on the ice fails to start play a second time within the same game, when ordered to do so by the referee in charge, the two minute allowance shall not be granted and the referee in charge shall immediately declare the game forfeited to the non-offending team and points awarded to them."

A club is allowed to delay the game once for less than two minutes but if the time exceeds the two minute mark then the referee can award the game to the opposing team.

Referee Mathieu stated that he gave the Islanders their first warning during the dispute over the early second period goal by Bill Dinning. He said that he gave a second warning after the Dutkack, Levandoski fight and the Islanders refused to play and that he sent the playing captain over to the Islanders bench and they still refused to play.

He gave his last warning in the final brawl which ended the game. As soon as they let me go I forfeited the game to Sydney," he stated.

Asked about the Dinning's goal, the matter which started the first dispute Mathieu stated that he saw it go in the net and strike the bar which runs from the top to the bottom in the back of the cage.

Referee Elliott when asked about the game ending shoving duel stated that right winger Denis Smith started to push him over the boards and Whitlock joined him. He claimed that he pushed Whitlock back in order to avoid being shoved over the boards.

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Sydney Awarded Game In Third Period; Rugged Contest With Islanders

Two badly shaken referees Jerry Mathieu and Frank Elliot, in hot water from the opening minutes of the second period, awarded the Sydney Millionaires a Maritime Major Hockey League decision over the Charlottetown Islanders at the 7:35 mark of the third stanza last night after referees-players-police brawl in front of the penalty box.

The end came after nearly a period and a half of arguing, fighting and rough hockey in a game reminiscent of last year's championship contest which was being played under Islanders protest after a hotly disputed Sydney goal had been allowed in the early seconds of the middle period.

The final act began with referee Frank Elliot ditching out a holding penalty to defenceman Phil Vitale after the latter had pulled down Dunc MacIntyre in the Islanders end. When Elliot went to the penalty box to report the penalty, Vitale shot the puck along the boards towards the sin bin and Mathieu immediately gave the misconduct signal to the big defenceman.

With this Vitale challenged Mathieu to fight it out. The big defenceman took off his gloves and grabbed Mathieu by the tie but refrained from striking the official. The rest of the Islanders left the players bench and crowded around the scene.

Then as players, referees, cops and spectators milled around the officials the Islanders kept arguing and shoving. Punches were thrown by both and the referees called the game.

On the way off the ice the Islanders and referees had another slight clash in front of the Sydney dressing room which broke up with the referees escaping through the entrance in the south end of the rink.

For nearly a half hour after the game was over small orderly crowds milled around the rink with Police Chief MacArthur and most of his City Police Force on hand to keep matters in order. The press was denied admittance to the referees quarters and the officials slipped out the side door of the rink by taxi.

But trouble was brewing long before the end came. It started 33 seconds after the second period when Bill Dinning took a shot at the Islanders net from about 25 feet out and well over to the left hand side and the puck after striking the goal post or the twines beside it bounced back at about a 45 degree angle.

The goal judge did not flash the red light-later stated that the puck definitely did not go in the net, referee Mathieu, who was skating about midway from the blue line to the net, over-ruled the goal judge without consulting the official's opinion and awarded Sydney the goal.

The Islanders, led by Phil Vitale and Buck Whitlock protested vigorously with the result that the Islanders were given a two minute penalty for delaying the game. Sydney sat out the penalty.

Twenty seconds after play was resumed Vitale and Matthews were chased for roughing in the Sydney end. The trouble started with Vitale dumping Matthews and the latter slashed back with his stick. The two came to blows and were soon parted.

At the 2:16 mark Walt Pawlyshyn and Joe Levandoski, who had been cruising for a bruising, tangled and after being parted, headed for the penalty box together. At the sin bin door they argued for nearly a minute. Johnny Dutkack skated over between them and after saying something Levandoski upset the Islanders defenceman.

The two fell to the ice with Levandoski on top and referee Mathieu warned the players to stand back and let the players fight. After three tries Dutkack got back on his feet and crashed a vicious right into the Sydney player's jaw, ending the fight seconds later.

In the arguments that followed "Hub" Beaudry drew a misconduct, Levandoski got a minor and misconduct, Dutkack a like sentence. When play resumed the

Islanders had five men in the penalty box and Sydney two.

For the most of the remainder of the period the good sized crowd saw good, rugged hockey. At the 10:47 mark Phil Vitale got a minor for high sticking and when he disputed the decision the referee gave him a misconduct. Frank Bathgate was given an interference penalty for scooping McLagan's glove away with his stick.

Vitale had just finished serving his misconduct penalty in the third period when he got back on the ice and drew a holding penalty for taking Rohrer out of a play. This was at 4:28. Just over three minutes later the end came.

Sydney were leading 4-1 at the time as the result of two goals by Frank Bathgate and one each by Bruce Gallagher and Bill Dinning. The goals, like the game itself were of the off-color variety.

Bruce Gallagher opened the Sydney scoring when his half-hearted shot from about 35 feet out bounced through an Islanders defenceman's legs and into the corner of the net. Goalie Ray Frederick never saw the shot.

Frank Bathgate got credit for the visitors' second goal as the puck rolled off George McLagan's arm into the net with Bathgate and McLagan holding onto one another in the crease. Lorne Pirie drew an assist on the goal which was set up by Dunc MacIntyre's slap shot from the side of the net.

Dinning opened the second period with his disputed goal after being set up by Alex Burkow. Bathgate ended matters by scoring with Larry Travis holding onto his back. The puck was blocked by Frederick but it bounced over his arm and slid across the goal line behind him.

Favero scored the Islanders only goal in the opening seconds of the last period. The goal followed a sustained Islanders attack and Favero's slap shot from about fifteen feet out in the corner before Hicks even saw it. Whitlock and Pawlyshyn drew assists on the play.

Walter Pawlyshyn was the Islanders best man on the ice during the playing time. Newcomer Paul Sandoin turned in a good showing and George McLagan, who returned after his recent injury played well on defense along with his cohort Johnny Dutkack.

Frank Bathgate and Dunc MacIntyre were the pick of the Sydney forwards with Bill Dinning turning in another standout defensive game.
