\$300,000 Is 24-Hour Haul In Montreal Holdups

MONTREAL (CP)—The city's criminal element was quiet Wednesday following a 24-hour spree during which one suspected bank robber was shot by a policeman and more than \$300,000 taken in a series of thefts and holdups.

An attempted burglary went early Wednesday when managers fled empty-handed from an east-end grocery store. Merchandise was stacked, ready for transportation, but they apparently realized police were on the way.

Meanwhile, a police sweep through the north end netted six suspects, but police declined to say whether they were connected with Tuesday's crimes.
