CRICKET. FLORENCE C. C. vs. MONCTON.

In spite of the wet and unpromising weather, the home team was on the field bright and early, and, although the stump, were not pitched till an hour and a half after the time fixed, they were Charlotte-town boys and accustomed to a fashionable want of promptness in these little things, and no doubt went to bat in better humor on that account. Someone had blundered; but then it was not their fault, and being all optimists, they made due allowance for all concerned, and put down the mistake to the short notice which the committee had for the match arrangements.

Ackman and Robby for the visitors, handled the leather with the magic facility of our men, but to contend with last year, and were well seconded by the new hand, with our old friend Simpson for an effective change. In the field the men from the club were all alive. The ball was in hand before half its journey was done, and came in to the wicket like a greased thunder-bolt. It took the local talent some time to appreciate this. They did not believe it could be done until they saw it done more than once to their sorrow. Very little confidence was displayed in batting on either side until the tall man of the Monctonians took hold, and instead of leaving the first innings a tie at 27, as it was early stages, the juniors saved the day. McKee went in resolved to play his own game and punish everything that came to him. Before he fell he wiped off four for two apiece. C. McQuillan played the most brilliant innings of the day and retired amid much applause. Moncton went to bat with 30 to win, and evidently expected to make it and as many to spare. But fate forbade, and the uncertainties of cricket were beautifully exemplified.

The chief factors in this unexpected result were the admirable field management of Captain Carvell, the red hot bowling of McQuillan brothers, the splendid catches of Flood at long on, and the final catastrophe when Dr. Jenkins retrieved his reputation and brought down the grand stand by catching the last man when he had to make but 5 runs to win.
