

Bruins Blast Hawks 4-3; Horvath Grabs Two Points

CHICAGO (AP)—Boston's big "Uke" line scored five times as the Bruins pounded Chicago Black Hawks 6-3 Tuesday night to extend the Hawks' winless string in the National Hockey League to 10 games.

Centre Bronco Horvath, the NHL leader, scored his 11th and 12th goals of the young season while right winger Vic Stasiuk also hit twice to run his season total to five goals. Left winger Johnny Bucyk chipped in with a single goal.

Veteran Leo Labine accounted for the Bruins' other goal in the victory which boosted the Bruins into third place by a point over the Toronto.

Chicago's scorers were rookie Murray Balfour, Phil Maloney and Ed Litzenberger. For Litzenberger, who scored 33 times last season, the goal was the first of the year.

Stasiuk opened the scoring in the second minute of the first period when he swept past a Hawk's defenceman to beat Chicago goalie Glenn Hall from directly in front of the cage.

Bucyk in the final minute of the second frame, and Labine midway in the last period, added the frosting on the Bruins' victory cake.

Eskimo Coach Praises Rookie

EDMONTON (CP)—Halfback Howie Schumm, a 19-year-old farm boy who has leaped from grain fields to professional gridiron in three years, appears to have a brilliant future with Edmonton Eskimos.

"Half the season was gone before I realized how good he was," said coach Eagle Keys after Saturday's game in which Schumm played a big part in helping Eskimos beat British Columbia Lions 20-8.

"When we had to name our imports we gambled on Schumm and he's proved the best Canadian find in the league in three years."

The husky rookie, who won't be 21 until next March, gained 88 yards and scored a touchdown as Eskimos won the opener of a two-game total-point Western Inter-provincial Football Union semi-annual series.

Joey Giardello Likes Cleveland

CLEVELAND (AP)—Joey Giardello likes to fight in Cleveland. He calls it "this lucky town of mine."

He tests that luck for the fifth time here tonight against Dick Tiger, who won an unanimous decision over Giardello in Chicago five weeks ago. The two middleweights are matched for 10 rounds, and the scrap will be nationally televised.

A good reason Giardello likes to fight here is that he has won all four previous times at the arena. Not only has he won, but he looked good and pleased a sizable turnout of partisans in defeating Bobby Boyd, Rory Calhoun, Bobby Lane and Charley Colton.

The former Philadelphia, now living in Rosedale, N.Y., had a string of three straight victories—over Chico Vejar, Holly Mims and Del Flanagan—when Tiger, British Empire middleweight champion from Nigeria, upset him.

Giardello faded in the last five rounds. Tiger landed left hooks and scored in the infighting, while Giardello couldn't connect with his right-hand power. There were no knockouts.

Tiger, who lives in Liverpool, England; made his U.S. TV debut in Camden, N.J. He has won 35 of 45 bouts, 10 by knockouts.

Giardello will be a slight underdog for tonight's bout, and he knows he can't afford another loss to Tiger.

"I'm 29 now, and I've been fighting 12 years without ever getting a crack. I deserved at the middleweight title," Joey said Monday in a capsule summary of his case. He has won 78 fights, 27 by knockouts.

The fight at Chicago was a close one, Giardello said, "I thought I won it, and so did most of the writers."

Britain had a bye Tuesday and opens play today against South Africa.
