Humane Societies Blocking Supply Of Research Animals

OTTAWA (CP)—The growing problem of obtaining animals for medical research and teaching could be eased by establishment of permanent provincial boards of advisers on procurement, production and care of experimental animals, says a National Research Council committee report.

The committee set up in 1964 to study the problem says humane societies are one of the biggest roadblocks to a major source of animals.

Although our growing medical schools and universities require an ever increasing number of cats and dogs for teaching and research purposes, the number of healthy animals killed in municipal pounds and humane society shelters far exceeds present requirements.

The report adds that the humane movement's stated policy is to take over and operate municipal pounds wherever possible and "it is against the societies' principles and policy to release animals for experimental purposes even when the owner is unknown."

"This is true even with the assurance that animals will not be subjected to painful procedures and will be killed while under deep anesthesia. This practice is wasteful but, as humane society shelters replace municipal dog pounds, the supply of animals available for teaching and research will decrease and accentuate the shortage already evident in regions having several medical schools and universities."

NO SHORTAGE OF RATS
The report says no problem exists in procurement of rats and mice. Some institutions breed them for their own use.

The report suggests consideration be given to raising dogs and cats specifically for certain research purposes and that the extra cost of the animals be recognized as a legitimate charge in making research grants. The animals could be raised by central agencies for widespread distribution.

This would provide a training centre for veterinarians in laboratory animal medicine and would enable continuing studies on animal care and facilities.
