A PROMISING COLT.—A St. John Sun reporter met a gentleman from Charlottetown who had been present at the races last week. Speaking of the performance of the three-year-old colt Promoter, owned by J. M. Johnson, of St. John, and W. S. McKie, of Charlottetown, he said: "He won the admiration of all. He made a record of 2:21 1/2, but as a matter of fact he trotted one heat in as good as 2:27. For he got a bad start-off and had to trot clear around the whole field, making the distance fully five seconds further than that covered by the pole horse. When it is considered that it was only the second time Promoter was started in a race, that three months ago he was a green 600 lb. colt by a New London farmer, and that he was wholly unknown to any one at that time as a trotter, his work may be better understood. The man who drove Promoter never saw the horse until the day of the race. It is believed he can make a mile in 2:25. Promoter is by Preceptor, one of Nutwood's best bred sires, which passed through this city a few years ago as a yearling and which C. C. Gardner, of Charlottetown, purchased in Kentucky. His dam is Lady Bell 2:38 1/2, full sister to Will-o'-Wisp, 2:29, by Dean Swift. Promoter holds the three-year-old record for Canada. It was the unanimous opinion of horsemen at the Charlottetown races that Promoter is the best three-year-old colt that has ever appeared in public on any track in the Dominion."
