### Thrifty Dutch Cooks Favor Budget Stretching Meals

CONSIDERING this nation as a whole, farm, town and city families of all incomes spend an average of 20 percent of their take-home pay for food.

The thrifty Pennsylvania Dutch have a way of stretching the food money by serving their families wholesome, nourishing meals at budget-wise prices. For example, today's menu for 4 persons costs only \$2.09, including coffee.

This appetizing meal was prepared by Mrs. Anna Smith, formerly Associate Professor of Home Economics and now consultant at Albright College.

Reading, in the heart of the Pennsylvania Dutch country. There they make the most of plentiful foods, flavor, nutrients and fuel by slow-cooking in porcelain cast-iron cookware.

**PENNSYLVANIA DUTCH BUDGET-WISE DINNER**  
Endive with Boiled Dressing Sausage-Vegetable Casserole Pumpernickel Cottage Cheese Apple Butter Fruit Dumplings Coffee Tea - Milk Measurements are level; recipes for 6

**ENDIVE WITH BOILED SWEET-SOUR DRESSING**  
(Endive mit Brie).  
1/4 c. sugar  
1 tsp. flour  
1 egg, beaten  
1/2 c. water  
1/2 c. cider vinegar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
4 c. crisp endive salad leaves  
1 hard-cooked egg, chopped  
Combine sugar and flour. Beat in egg, water, vinegar, salt and pepper. Cook in a lipped porcelain cast-iron sauceron until thick.

Cool; pour over endive. Top with hard-cooked egg.  
**SAUSAGE - VEGETABLE CASSEROLE**  
(Langsan Gekocht Warsacht)  
2 c. water  
4 tsp. coarse chopped onion  
4 peeled carrots, coarse-cut  
4 peeled potatoes, cut in eighths  
1 lb. smoked sausage, cut in 2 in. pieces  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
1/4 c. cold water

Pour water into 2 qt. porcelain cast-iron casserole. Bring to boiling point. Add vegetables, sausage and seasonings. Cover; cook over medium heat for 25 to 30 min.

Remove lid and stir in flour and cold water mixed to smooth paste. Simmer 5 min. longer.  
**FRUIT DUMPLINGS**  
(Obst Kneppe)  
1 c. canned red pitted cherries, drained  
1/2 c. sugar  
1/4 c. flour  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/4 c. cherry juice  
1 c. sifted flour, additional  
1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. salt  
2 tsp. shortening

Place cherries in oiled 1 qt. baking or "Divan" dish. Combine sugar, salt and flour. Add the cherry juice slowly; pour over the cherries.

Mix flour with baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening (the Dutch prefer lard) until mixture is as fine as meal. Add milk. Drop dough by small tablespoonsfuls around edge onto cherry mixture. Cover; simmer 15 min. over low heat, and serve warm with cream.

**THE CHEF SUGGESTS APPLE DUMPLINGS**  
For today's dinner apple instead of cherry dumplings would be suitable. To make, follow the recipe for fruit dumplings using thin-sliced cooking apples instead of canned cherries. Cover. Steam-cook 20 min. over low heat.
