## Local Fisheries Department Concerned Over Moss Plant

Concern has been expressed by Fisheries department officials in Charlottetown over the latest development in the establishment by the federal government of an Irish Moss plant in the Miramichi area of Prince County.

"We have been advised," said Fisheries Minister Leo Rossier, "that the Atlantic Development Board which put up \$100,000 for the plant's construction has turned the whole project over to the federal department of fisheries."

He said "We are now disturbed over the lack of information on the form of development the project will take."

"It was our intention through three years of research on the project that the plant would provide industrial, economic information on the Irish Moss industry, not technical research in processing."

"A great amount of information available and what concerns us is whether or not a commercial size drying plant will be a paying proposition in the area."

"There is talk that the project will be a little pilot plant. That is not what we want. We want a commercial venture. The Irish Moss industry doesn't want a drying oven — it wants a moss plant."

The Irish Moss industry is worth several hundred thousand dollars annually. "We're concerned with the lack of information on the Prince County plant," Mr. Rossier said, "and we are following this up with the proper authorities."

## Police Chief Makes Appeal To City's Youth

City Police Chief Stern A. Webster has made an appeal to the city's youth to show the "same sense of responsible thinking and adult action" on Halloween as they displayed during the visit of the Queen.

Chief Webster said Wednesday the splendid actions of the young people of the city earlier this month showed all of Canada how youth should behave on important occasions.

In particular Chief Webster expressed the hope older youths would avoid vandalism and suggested the enter into the new Halloween spirit of going to parties instead of roaming in gangs. This, he said, would mean that the lots of "trick or treat" fame would be able to go about safely and happily.

He noted that for protection of citizens if it were needed the police force will be greatly augmented that night and the fact it will be completely mobilized will mean the men will have the ability to move swiftly if needed.
