Suburban Vote Seen Factor In Redistribution Plans

By KEN KELLY OTTAWA (CP)—Fate of the latest attempt to provide new machinery to redraw parliamentary constituency boundaries may depend on how strongly the suburban voters feel about being under-represented in the Commons.

becoming increasingly pre-occupied with wooing the suburban vote. They recognize that after the next redistribution of seats, many new suburban ridings will be carved out of what are now mixed rural-suburban or urban-suburban seats.

And, if the bill does get through Parliament by the end of 1964, the prospect of having a new constituency boundaries drawn up by mid-1965 may deter both government and opposition from getting into a general election before then.

Observers here figure none of the parties with an eye to the future wants to be placed in the position publicly of holding up redistribution machinery which will give a louder voice to the uncommitted suburban voter in general elections.

Experts here say that a general election before mid-1966 means fighting on the basis of the 1952 electoral map, which takes no account of the huge shift in population to the suburban areas.

Nor are they likely to want to be caught pushing for an election on the basis of a 1962 constituency map which they all acknowledge grossly under-weighs the suburban vote.

The fact that the Liberals are in power isn't a certificate of virtue. But we can at least say that we have done something.

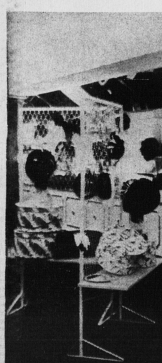
Goldwater Says LBJ Is Using Classified Data

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Senator Barry Goldwater has charged that President Johnson has used "highly classified defence information in a purely political manner."

Goldwater's staff said this was a reference to a speech Thursday by his Democratic rival in Sacramento, Calif. Johnson announced the United States had developed a new radar that could detect missiles beyond the earth's curvature and could shoot down satellites carrying nuclear weapons.

Goldwater said it also referred to an earlier Pentagon statement about U.S. nuclear strength.

The charge came in a statement released here by the Republican candidate for president. In the statement, Goldwater said Johnson's election campaigning last week had demonstrated he had the support of "the entire government propaganda machine, the campaign support of cabinet officers who are making more and more political statements from their high offices; and even the support of highly classified defence information which the president feels free to use . . . in a purely political manner."

Free Education Promised At All Levels in Quebec

By REMY D'ANJOU STE. GERMAINE, Que. (CP) In a marathon three hour address to 450 persons at a Liberal provincial byelection campaign rally here, Resources Minister Rene Levesque prom-

ised Quebec eventually will have free education at all levels. "We still have a few miles to go but we'll get there," he told Dorchester county voters, who go to the polls Oct. 5 in one of four provincial byelections.

"We might have to deprive ourselves of other things for 15 or 20 years, but it is necessary to have our youth educated because when they leave university with a degree, they become an asset to our society."

"I told the crowd not to listen to the 'cattle of catastrophe' being chanted by the Union Nationale opposition party. The three preferred verses of the constitution are the resignation of Mr. Lapine, federal-provincial affairs, and the province's borrowing."

DEFENDS RIGHT Mr. Levesque defended the right of George Lapine, recently resigned minister of cultural affairs, to "take his leave without asking permission."

He was in politics for 20 years and he spent a large part of that time fighting against a wall. Mr. Lapine led the Liberal opposition during the 1950s, when the Union Nationale government of the late Maurice Duplessis was in power.

As for federal-provincial affairs, the government of Premier Lesage, hadn't "sold out" to Ottawa.

"For that matter, what would it get to sell out to Ottawa? Everybody knows Ottawa isn't the best place in Canada to do it at this time."

Apostle's Head To Be Flown To Greek Church

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The head of the apostle St. Andrew, kept in a reliquary in St. Peter's Basilica since 1462, will be flown to Greece next Saturday as a conciliatory gesture by Pope Paul VI to the Orthodox Church.

Three days of masses and prayers, with many of the 2,500 prelates of the Vatican Ecumenical Council taking part, will be held in the Holy Church of St. Andrew of the Valley before the departure for Paris.

St. Peter is regarded by Roman Catholics as the man whom Christ founded His Church and the popes are considered successors of Peter.

St. Andrew was Peter's brother. He preached in Asia Minor, he put to death on an upturned cross and later he headed. The Orthodox church considers the patriarchs of Constantinople (Istanbul) as his successors.

The head of St. Andrew was taken from Paris just before the sack of that city by Mehmet II. It arrived in Rome April 12, 1450.

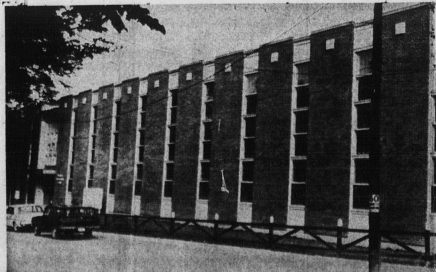
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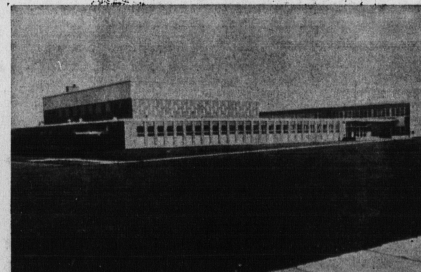
