THE WINTER CABINET

The honor of the German Empire, the Post says, must be safeguarded against a corrupt republic of blacks. If no cruiser is ready an iron-clad must be sent.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

TORONTO, November 13.—Rev. Joseph Lofthouse, an Anglican missionary, stationed at Fort Churchill, is, with his wife, spending a few days in the city on his way to England. Mr. and Mrs. Lofthouse have been working among the Eskimos and Indians in the country about Fort Churchill for nearly 14 years. Some idea of their isolation may be gathered from Mrs. Lofthouse's statement that only once during the last nine years had she seen the face of a white woman. When the Tyrell brothers reached Fort Churchill in a famished and exhausted condition after their terrific struggle down the icebound coast in the course of their journey through the barren lands, this missionary and his devoted wife were unremitting in their attentions to the traveller. They have a church up there capable of seating 300 people every nail in which was driven by the missionary's own hand. Mr. Lofthouse preaches in the Cree, Chippewyan and Eskimo languages.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 13.—The Star's London correspondent cables: Premier Laurier's doings in Washington excites much attention in leading journals which publish daily special New York despatches reflecting United States hope that Canada may be induced to strike a bargain which will draw Canada away from England; first, commercially, and ultimately politically. Some journals contrast these insinuating approaches of the Washington authorities with Mr. Blaine's bluff rejection of Canada's advances. Canada, the paper says, has shown Uncle Sam that she has a will and a way of her own, and instead of talking mightily about the presumptuous colony, she now assumes an attitude of give-and-take, and comes calmly to business. No one here suggests that after the jubilee fervor and assurance of Messrs Laurier and Fielding, that Canada would listen to the proposals of discrimination against England, though it is recognized that there is no Downing street disallowance to prevent such a course if Canada determined on it. What is freely suggested is, that it might not take much in the way of friendly Washington overtures to induce Canada to substitute equal tariff treatment of England and United States for the policy of pro British preference which is now in vogue.

BRINDISI, Italy, November 13.—Letters lately received from Athens say that the torpedo scandal continues to be the sensation of the Greek capital. The Committee of investigation appointed to inquire into the matter decided that two officers, Captains Rastopoulo and Anastasi must be tried by court martial on the charge of culpable negligence. Captain Rastopoulo, who is now being tried, has asked that Prince George of Greece, who commanded the torpedo flotilla during the war, be called as a witness. The court has refused to do this and the Greek news papers are publishing vigorous articles on the subject, the anti-dynastic Heastia going so far as to demand that Prince George be tried by court martial.

VIENNA, November 13.—The Neue Freie Presse to-day publishes a despatch from Constantinople, saying that some Greek bands which crossed the Thessalian frontier, between Diskat and Domenik, have been repulsed by the Turks, who killed many of the invaders and captured a large number of prisoners. The Turks also seized 150 rifles and 170,000 cartridges belonging to the Greeks.

LONDON, November 13.—Dr. Darby, Secretary of the Arbitration Alliance, has presented to Lord Salisbury, the Premier, a memorial with 64,572 signatures attached in favor of an Anglo-American arbitration treaty.

LONDON, November 12.—A despatch to the Morning Post from Berlin says: "The United States is credited here with offering its intervention in the difficulty between Germany and Hayti. But the German government is waiting for the arrival of Luders and the report of Count Sswerherin, due by the next mail packet."

PARIS, Nov. 13.—The Matin, referring to the speech of the Marquis of Salisbury at the Guild Hall Baquet says: "Lord Salisbury's caustic reference to the Niger negotiations sounds strange from the lips of a champion of peace."

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 12.—Hon. R. W. Scott, Secretary of state, was asked if there was any truth in the report from London that Mr. Chamberlain had forwarded to Lord Aberdeen last week important recommendation on the future trade relations between Canada and the United States from the imperial point of view. "Mr. Chamberlain never sent any suggestions here upon the subject—would never think of doing so," said he. "On the status of the sealing question they are well posted in England, because its national and intercolonial importance and because upon it hinges the finding of the Paris tribunal of arbitration. But they are very little concerned in the subject of our immediate trade relations with the United States, the alien labor law, the bonding privilege, and so on, except that they would like to see a settlement of these questions, which, while not of supreme importance in themselves are a source of irritation between Canada and the United States, and furnish a constant theme for the belligerent press on both sides."
