"He's young and he'll come. It's just the ball to left field really isn't his forte. He's a lefthanded batter and has long field power at Fenway Park."

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—The trial of Buffalo Bill football star Cookie Gilchrist on traffic charges was adjourned Tuesday.

## Arnie Palmer Is Out Front In Money Race

DUNEDIN, Fla. (AP)—Arnold Palmer, last year's leading money winner, has climbed to the top in the 1963 professional golfers money-winning race. His third-place finish in the PGA's Open at Brookline, Mass. Sunday—he came in third in a three-way playoff with winner Julius Boros and runner up Jacky Cupit—paid \$7,000. This was enough to boost his 1963 winnings to \$63,545 and move him ahead of Nicklaus, who failed to make the 36-hole cut in the Open.  
Palmer's leading money winner in 1962 and again in 1963, jumped into the lead with the \$18,000 he won at Brookline. He has winnings of \$39,896, which gives him a \$500 lead over Nicklaus in third place. Nicklaus, who led the pack last week, has won \$33,000.  
Tony Lena, who has \$1,166 in the Open, is in fourth place with a \$52,413 total.

TORONTO (CP)—Ken Carpenter, former head coach of Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Western Football Conference, has been appointed assistant and defensive coach of Toronto Argonauts of the Eastern Conference. It was announced Tuesday.  
Carpenter, 27, who played with Oregon State before joining Cleveland Browns of the National Football League in 1950, played with the Roughriders as an offensive half and from 1954 to 1960, when he took over as head coach.  
He was defensive coach with Denver of the American Football League in 1961 and last year was head coach of Indianapolis of the United Football League.  
Carpenter takes over his duties with Argonauts following the resignation last week of defensive coach Steve Stice.

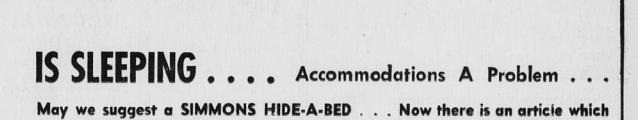
