

Manitoba Man Sees Money In Pulp Mill At Kitimat

PRINCE GEORGE, B.C. (CP) — Ben Ginter, who left Swan River at 14 with two bits in his jeans and made a fortune in the West, believes he has the background to succeed where giants have given up.

Specifically, the Manitoba-born millionaire is sure he can make a pulp mill in Kitimat pay.

Just because M a c M i l l a n, Roedel and Powell River Ltd., one of the forest industry's giants—decided they couldn't is no reason in Ben Ginter's mind to hold back.

"To me, it's a very interesting kind of challenge," he said in an interview.

"I think I can put it together.

We're working very fast. I've got as far in a month as anyone else got in two years—industry people, who are supposed to know."

He is convinced enough timber exists in the area covered by the tree farm licence to make a mill economic.

"There is no reason to believe there isn't, because there is," he said flatly.

Backing him in that belief are 10 operators from Terrace, B.C., and unnamed European interests who altogether make up the Eurocan Pulp and Paper Co. Ltd. of which Ginter is president.

The company first attracted attention this spring by bidding \$12,000,000 for a tree farm licence whose assessed value was \$340,000.

Under British Columbia law, the company to which the licence had been assigned had to match the \$12,000,000 bid, or lose it to Bonanza.

The company pined up the \$12,000,000 and kept the licence, with a certain amount of dark muttering, and the names of Ginter and Eurocan took on added meaning in the industry.

Ginter blandly denied any "fun and games" in connection with the \$12,000,000 bid—or any spite, either.

"I don't live like that. Money doesn't mean that much to me."

"I was brought up a strict Baptist, although I may break the rules a bit as far as taking a drink is concerned," he said.

Ginter went against his trading enough to buy an interest in a Prince George brewery, although "it wasn't to my church's liking, and my mother was upset."

He also owns 14 companies, and holds \$25,000,000 worth of contracts for clearing highways and pulp mill sites.

The boxcar in which he stole a ride from Swan River, Man., at 14 took him west, and he took himself to beet fields and lumber camps, and ultimately to Prince George with a bulldozer, a trailer, a pickup truck and a wife.

The same kind of confidence, he believes, can take him to a successful mill in Kitimat, no matter what any forest giant says.

"I have enough capital behind me not to go wrong," he said. "Believe me, I didn't build what I did on stupidity and putting the cart before the horse."

"I learned at an early age which way the horse went."

EXECUTIVES OPTIMISTIC OVER STEEL

CLEVELAND (AP)—With the biggest first-half output in the industry's history just recorded, steel company executives are becoming increasingly optimistic about the outlook for 1965 production, shipments and consumption, Steel magazine reports.

Production of ingots in the first six months approximated 70,600,000 tons, compared with 61,300,000 tons in last year's first half, the weekly journal of metal-working says.

Most melting furnaces and many finishing mills are working right through the U.S. July 4 weekend, steel says, because of heavy order backlogs.

Last weeks 2,800,000 tons of steel for ingots and castings was up 5,000 tons, and the weeks output will be slightly higher, Steel says.

June brought a mild decline in placement of new orders and July is expected to show another slight decline, Steel reports. Immediate delivery can be made on products squeezed by import competition, says the magazine, but some products continue in tight supply and a 16-week wait is necessary for wide plates.

Steel's composite on No. 1 heavy melting scrap was unchanged for the fifth straight week at \$34.83 a ton.

Beatles Return From Continent

LONDON (AP)—The Beatles have returned from a European tour on which they played to less-than-capacity houses and received a welcome home from about 1,000 young screamers, mostly girls.

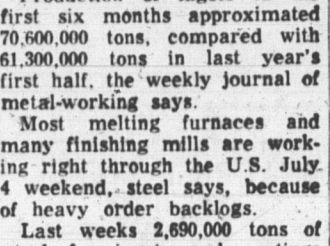
The quartet had its bankroll depleted by a Spanish airline for \$550 in excess baggage charges. Other passengers on the Iberian Airlines Caravelle jet had to wait 40 minutes at Barcelona Airport while the Beatles checked through 66 pieces of luggage and haggled with Spanish authorities over extra charges.

When they landed here, some girls had been waiting 14 hours to cheer them. Several started their airport visit at midnight in a cold drizzle. Before noon the crowd filled the airport's roof gallery, armed with banners and confetti.

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Brewery Firm Profits Down

TORONTO (CP)—Canadian Breweries Ltd. had net profit of \$4,333,880 or 14.34 cents a share in the six months ended April 30, compared with \$6,015,382 or 22.07 cents in the same period last year.

The company says sales were \$181,155,648 against \$182,719,305. For three months ended April 30 earnings were \$2,283,706 or 7.71 cents a share, compared with \$3,005,587 or 11.03 cents a share.

In Canada, both sales and profits were higher but in the United States sales and earnings were lower.

Working capital of \$62,071,351 at April 30 compares with \$66,290,487 a year ago.

Investments increased by \$4,639,678 to \$61,498,793. This included shares of Charrington United Breweries Ltd. at cost of \$19,591,708. The shares now have a market value of \$24,555,000.

Opening lead—king of diamonds.

When it comes to the play of the cards, your state of mind—your view of the hand as a whole—has a great deal to do with how you eventually fare. This applies equally to declarer and defensive play. It is not enough to confine your thoughts to the play of a particular trick or a particular suit; you have to do more than that and think about the play of the entire hand.

For example, take this hand which involves defensive play. West led the king of diamonds, East signaling with the seven, and continued with the queen and another diamond. Declarer ruffed in dummy, forced out the ace of spades, and easily made four spades.

If the defender had been smart enough to arrange for a heart ruff, declarer would have gone down one. The question is whether the defenders can be fairly blamed for neglecting to find the killing line of defense.

Actually, the right defense is not difficult to find, and the failure to find it must be pinned squarely on East. He had all the clues needed to point the way to the proper line of defense, but he did not bother to put them together when he followed to the king of diamonds opening lead.

It was obvious immediately that West had led from the K-Q of diamonds. It was likewise obvious, from East's view, that the defense probably had three tricks coming—two diamonds and a spade—and that a fourth trick would have to be garnered to defeat the contract.

A moment of thought would have told East that the fourth trick might be obtained by arranging a heart ruff, and a little further thought would have induced him to overtake the king of diamonds at trick one and return a heart. Had he done this, South would have been unable to prevent a later heart ruff.
