Calgary Oil Company Drilling Off Island

A Calgary company, Pan American Petroleum Corporation, is carrying out exploratory drilling off the northern shores of the province.

The company is one of five which hold oil and gas exploration licences from the provincial government.

According to Graham Rogers who is working with the department of industry and natural resources, "the purpose of the present exploratory drilling is to check the formations and sediments at moderate depths to enable a study to be made of the possible deeper formations which might contain oil and gas."

Mr. Rogers added "if the present work and studies prove interesting then further deep drilling would certainly be undertaken and probably be several companies."

The present exploratory work is taking place in a northerly line from North Cape.

"This rig can be used in 3,500 feet of water and, in fact, drilled a hole in the bottom of the ocean off the Grand Banks recently where there was a water depth of 3,500 feet."

"The water depth in the Gulf of St. Lawrence where the exploratory drilling is now taking place runs from around 185 feet to somewhat over 200 feet and does not present any great drilling problem."

OTHER COMPANIES
Other companies now holding exploration licenses from the provincial government are Hudson's Bay Oil and Gas Com-

pany, Imperial Oil Limited, California Standard Company and Texaco Exploration Company.

Officials of Hudson's Bay Oil and Gas Company are expected in the province within a week to arrange their coming exploration program.

Industry and Natural Resources Minister Lloyd MacPhail said today his department is "co-operating fully with the various companies and there is a great deal of detailed work involved."

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Charlottetown Motorist Gets Impaired Driving Fine

In the city police court yesterday morning, Oliver Pineau of Charlottetown was fined \$125 and costs by Magistrate A. J. Haslam when he pleaded not guilty to a charge of drunken driving, but pleaded guilty to the lesser charge of impaired driving.

Gerard MacDonald, city, charged with theft under \$50 was remanded until Sept. 11 with bail set at \$100.

Barry Bradley, city, charged with driving without due care and attention had his case adjourned till Sept. 14.

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Morell Native Tops Atlantic CA Exams

The highest standing in the Atlantic Provinces was attained by J. Lyman MacInnis, native of Morell, in the final examinations of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. As a result, Mr. MacInnis won the coveted Harry E. Hoben Memorial Prize in the examinations which are uniform all across Canada. In addition Mr. MacInnis was awarded the P.E.I. Institute prize.

There were 1,445 candidates across Canada writing the final exams; 464 of these 822 were successful.

Mr. MacInnis, who received his early education in his native village, was formerly employed here by H. R. Doane and Co. after returning to the Island from Toronto where he had worked with the Canadian Pacific Railway and Trans Canada Pipe Lines. He is again employed by the latter firm in their taxation research department in Toronto.

Also successful in passing the uniform final examinations and becoming a chartered accountant was J. Gordon Thomson, while Brian R. Zwicker successfully passed the intermediate exams. Both are employed in the Charlottetown office of H.R. Doane and Co.

Cold Storage Plant Sold To City Firm

Provincial government cold storage facilities on Esher Street in Charlottetown have been sold to a city company, it was announced yesterday by Public Works Minister Philip Matheson.

He said highest tender for the purchase was submitted by Island Freezers Ltd., and accepted officially at yesterday's meeting of the cabinet.

According to Mr. Matheson, the purchasing firm will make the "necessary repairs" to the cold storage building and "provide cold storage service to the general public" as has been done in the past.

Mr. Matheson said "there will be a minimum of disruption in service while the plant is undergoing repairs."

City Schools Enrollment Totals 3,751

Enrollment at Charlottetown's public schools for the coming term remains much the same as last year, according to figures released by Dr. K.A. Parker, superintendent of city schools.

A total of 3,751 students registered yesterday, as compared with last year's total of 3,749. Dr. Parker indicated that an additional number was expected to enroll during the remainder of this week, however.
