Nigerian Student Visits Prince Co.

 Alberton has an interesting visitor this week in the person of Rev. Iyaya Ude of Nigeria. While here he is the guest of Donald W. MacKay at the Presbyterian Manse.

Mr. Ude came to Canada two years ago and is a student at the University of Toronto. In September he will resume his studies there and he will also take studies at Knox College before returning to his native country. During the summer he is touring the Maritime Provinces of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Mr. Ude says that his country, which became independent in 1960, is the most densely populated in Africa. Its area is about equal to that of British Columbia and the population is 38,000,000. It is chiefly an agricultural country with its most important export crop being vegetable oils.

One of the principal concerns of this newly independent country is education. Mr. Ude states that about 40 per cent of its budget is for educational purposes. The proportion of all children attending school is about as high as in any African country. Two universities and three colleges are functioning and another university is slated to open this fall. The expectation is that there will be five universities by 1965.

As yet there are not enough school for all children attending and there is need for more teachers. At present teachers from Nigeria, Christian and about 40 per cent is Moslem. However, he says that Christian influence will lead one to believe. This is due to the fact that the majority of government officials are Christian.

Among the Christian churches to be found in Nigeria are the Anglican, Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian and Roman Catholic. The Presbyterian Church in Canada, where Mr. Ude is a member, dates back to the founding of a church of Scotland mission in 1846.

The early days of this mission was inseparably linked with the name of one of the greatest Scotch missionaries of all time, Dr. James H. Cameron, who was a member of the Presbyterian Church in Canada became associated with this church of Scotland mission in 1855.

It is pleasing to learn that Mr. Ude is enjoying Canadian life and that he is finding people to be friendly wherever he goes. He is planning to stay in Prince Edward Island for a week and will spend some time with the boys and girls who are attending vacation Bible School at the Fraser.

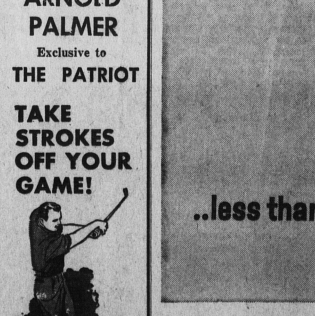
Mr. MacDonald said the chief had always been very co-operative and will be missed by a great many.

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S'ide Police Hold 'BB' Gun

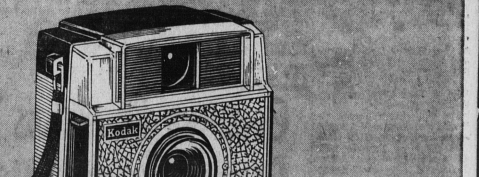
