Sportsmen fear there will be no shooting this spring on account of the bad condition of the ice. Announcement was made on Sunday that Rev. Mr. Kirby, of Bedouque, would preach in the Methodist church here next Sunday. Collection for educational purposes. The net proceeds of the entertainment given in Market Hall last Monday have been handed to the town clerk for distribution among the poor. The Electric Light Co. have taken the contract of lighting R. T. Holman's new building. Mr. J. A. Gourlie is also to have some new lights put in his drug store. A very enjoyable evening was held at the residence of Mr. P. R. Baker on Friday last. An excellent musical programme was given. Mr. Harry Wood is having his building on Water Street (lately occupied by Mr. E. Murray) completely renovated. The cellar has been enlarged, and a new foundation put in. Some changes will be made in the interior, and the front re-modelled and fitted with plate glass windows. The March session of the County Court closed on Saturday afternoon. One hundred cases were disposed of. A number of people gathered at the house of Mr. John Baker on Wednesday last, in celebration of his 88th birthday. During the evening Mr. Baker was presented with a purse and an appropriate address by Mr. Geo. Godkin. The attention of hundreds of our citizens was attracted on Thursday by a mysterious individual who walked about our streets all day long. For the benefit of the city who asked, as they passed him by, "Who can he be?" let us say he was the Duke of Wellington.—at least Officer Peters says so, and gives us this story: About 12 o'clock Thursday night he met this peculiar stranger "doing the town," and as his replies to the officer's questions were not very satisfactory, he was placed under arrest. LATEST NEWS NOTES.

The failures during the past week have been 278 in the United States against 244 last year, and 45 in Canada against 50 last year. On the first of April a sweeping reduction will be made in the entire salary list of the Canada Pacific Railway. All salaries from \$2000 up will be cut twenty per cent, and all below \$2000 ten per cent. The matter has been under serious consideration for some time and it was generally conceded by those in a position to know that a move of this sort by the executive would be more than likely. It is said that no favoritism will be shown, and Sir William Van Horne as president with \$50,000 a year will suffer as well as the ticket seller at a salary of one sixtieth that amount. The English bootmakers' strike is one of those fits of madness to which all bodies of men are occasionally prone. The cause of the dispute is the introduction of labor-saving machinery, which the employees say is absolutely necessary to maintain the trade against foreign competition. The plea seems to be a reasonable one, and in fighting against it the men appear to be fighting against reason and against facts. The men are losing \$200,000 a week in the town of Leicester alone, and one fails to see how they can get any nearer the object they have in view. The manufacturers have large stocks on hand, and do not object to a temporary curtailment of production. If the men stop after the English stocks are exhausted, the American manufacturers will step in and collar the market. PERSONAL Mr. Brennan went west yesterday on a tour of Post office inspection. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

THE STANLEY AT THE CAPES. Sir.—When will our Government see the need of placing the SS. Stanley at Cape Traverse? You would think that the business men of the Island would demand that the Government build a harbor for her at Cape Traverse and have the crossing winter and summer here. We have had a very severe winter and there has not been one fine day the SS. Stanley would have crossed in less than one hour. Last week while she was stuck out in the ice there has not been ice enough in the Straits here to stop a tug boat. Yesterday the ice boats crossed in one hour and fifty minutes and never hauled on the ice, but rowed all the way. Today it is clear from board ice to board ice, with the exception of about one mile of drift-ice here. Surely the public in general will demand a trial here and not let personal interests keep the Stanley any longer on the route she is on; for there is no doubt that when ever we have easterly winds she will be stuck again, and easterly winds clear the Straits' ice and leaves it all water. There is no doubt that the placing of the Stanley here will hurt a good many personally. But the Government should not consider personal injuries if it is going to benefit the Island generally. I have no doubt in my mind but that it would do away with the boat service here, which would be a loss to the place, as I expect there is over \$6,000 per season spent here in the boat service, clear of the boats and equipment. Let the Government take that \$6,000 and the difference in the cost of running the SS. Stanley 40 miles instead of 8 miles, and they would in a few years, save money enough to build the pier here. There is some objection about extending the pier here on account of the sand. I am not an engineer, but it is my opinion there will be no trouble in overcoming the sand. If the present wharf were extended 500 feet, it would give 25 feet of water at the lowest tides, which would be quite sufficient. Would it not be well for the boards of trade to strike now for justice? There is no doubt but that this is the natural crossing winter and summer, and the cost of the harbor here would not exceed \$50,000. ALEX. STRANG.
