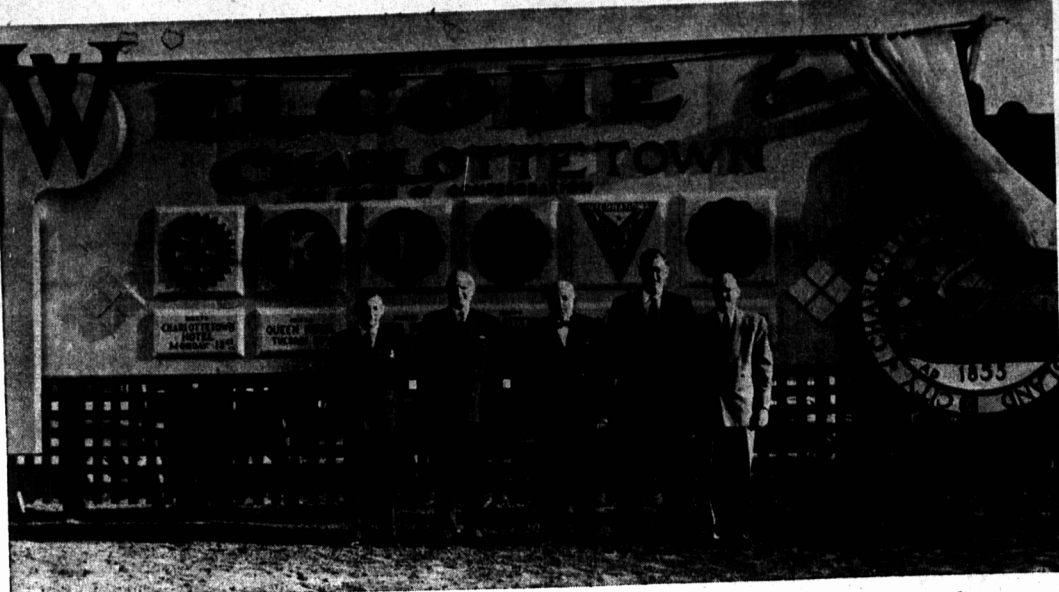

Active Year Reported By Ch'town Board Of Trade

A comprehensive report of the year's activities was given at the annual meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade last night by President Keith MacKinnon.

Among the highlights, the president listed the following: 1. Charlottetown Airport extension. The Council of the Board appointed a strong committee of businessmen, E. D. Reid, chairman, H. C. Burke, W. R. Jenkins, A. H. Peake, E. C. Baker, F. W. Hyndman and F. W. Gaudet, who with the co-operation of the Provincial Government and City Council drew up a comprehensive brief dealing with all aspects of the matter and presented the same to the Minister of Transport at Ottawa. The proposal was for a new NE-SW runway of 5,000 feet. This was no way to be by the Minister and an alternative proposal of lengthening the north-south runway to 3,900 feet has been planned and approved. This is a project that can be considered again by the new Council.

2. Wood Islands-Caribou Service: The provision of adequate service on this route has received the attention of the Charlottetown Board for a number of years. We are very pleased with the announcement by our member, Mr. N. A. Matheson, that a new 60 automobile ferry will be constructed very shortly at Pictou for this service to go into operation during the 1956 season. (Incidentally the Council has requested that Island firms be given an opportunity on tendering for subcontracting on construction and furnishings). Every effort has been made to have additional facilities available for this busy year but nothing could be done.

3. Charlottetown's New Civic Centre: We heartily congratulate our Mayor and Council on this progressive improvement which brought to a successful conclusion three projects of the Board, i.e. (1) Removal of the City Weigh Scales from the main intersection to a more appropriate site on Prince Street Wharf. (2) A larger, finer and more central Travel Bureau, and (3) a Central Modern Bus Terminal equipped to accommodate the travelling public and not interfere with traffic on our City streets.

4. The erection of the new Federal Building will fill a long felt need in the City and the proposed new Naval Building on the waterfront will be a distinct asset to the City employing upward of 35 men. With regard to the former, the Board has given serious study to the attending parking problems and is endeavouring to have additional parking facilities made available to the west of the new building.

5. The application before the Board of Transportation Commission for the curtailment of Railway passenger service has been considered by the Board and a qualified committee has been set up to study the whole question. This committee will be reporting to the incoming Council prior to the public hearings. It is to be expected the Board will present a brief.

6. With the availability of the new National Building Code the Board contracted the City Council and is pleased to report that a committee has been set up (by them) to study the question and bring in recommendations as to the sections applicable to the City of Charlottetown.

The Government of Prince Edward Island was represented on the platform by Premier Matheson, Hon. Keir Clark, Minister of Education, and Hon. E. P. Foley. Also present on the platform with Dr. MacKinnon were Mayor J. D. Stewart, Dr. G. D. Steel, former Principal of the College, Rev. J. A. Sullivan, Professor J. B. Brown, vice-principal and Professor W. J. MacDonald.

His Honour Lieutenant Governor Prowse presented the prizes and certificates and from the smile on the faces of each recipient it was evident that the students received not only congratulatory but assurance from Her Majesty's representative.

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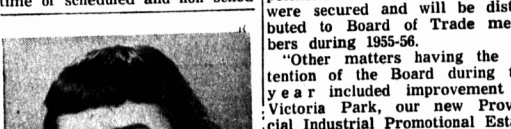
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Queens Graduate
