

Don Juan de Austria, of 2 cannon and 100 horse power. The whole making a force of 22 and 325 cannon.

This fleet is expected to be sufficient for the defence of Cuba and Porto Rico, and for the protection of the Spanish trade in the Gulf of Mexico.

We trust that the constituency of the Third District of King's County will not forget that the choice of a representative will again devolve upon them so soon as the Legislature shall meet. Mr. Le La-
cheur's seat must then be declared vacant, in conformity with the Statute; and it behoves the electors to be upon their guard, lest that seat should be usurped by a person who would not represent the interests and opinions of his constituents, but would slavishly lend himself to the designs of the oligarchy, and allow himself to be put through his facings in the House of Assembly by Mr. Edward Palmer, who acts there as a sort of Generalissimo to the set. It is funny to see Mr. Palmer giving the nod and the whisper to his cads, when they happen to be ignorant or in doubt of the way in which they should vote. The Liberals of the Murray Harbour District should call a meeting, if they have not done so already—decide upon their man, and put him forward without any delay: it is a great truth in political agitation, that you can never be too fast in canvassing a constituency. We have some anxiety in regard to the coming election for this one District, not that our party are absolutely in need of the seat, and could not possibly get on if an obstructive sneaked himself into it, but that we are bound to squeeze our adversaries into the smallest corner; which we would be always sure of doing, if the Liberals, as a party, were well organized. When we think how scattered that party is—how woful is its want of concentration—of union of thought and action—we feel surprised that it has achieved and held so long a high position in the Colony, in the teeth of a party, who are ever on the watch—are wily and cunning in all their movements, and enjoy those influences which wealth and long possession of the Government bestow.

GOOD NEWS FOR THE FARMER.

We are informed by the Novascotian of Wednesday last, that potatoes from this Island, in capital preservation, are now selling at the Market Wharf in Halifax, at two shillings and sixpence, that currency, per bushel. Those who take the precaution to dry this esculent, and ship it in good order, will have a very profitable return from this year's crop of it. Various other agricultural products, says the same paper, have arrived at Halifax from the Island, all of which appear to be excellent of their kind.

We notice in the Shipping List of the Port of Halifax, that 23 vessels arrived at that place from Prince Edward Island, between the 2d and 8th of the present month, all laden with Agricultural produce.
