NEW YORK (AP) — Stengelisms, as voiced by the old master, Casey himself:

On Yogi Berra—"Well, I tell you now, I got four men who can hit for distance, and they can run. My catcher, can run if he wants to. The trouble is he gets to first base and he gets tired, wants to talk to somebody, get the news."

On Don Larsen—"Who would I say is my No. 2 pitcher? I'd have to say Larsen. I said the same thing early last year."

On right field—"Is it safe to say Hank Bauer will play right field? Well, I'll tell you, somebody's got to beat out Gil McDougald at shortstop."

On other clubs—"Everywhere I go people tell me you better look out for that Detroit club or it will give you a good whacking over. Now the Red Sox, I told you two years ago they were good, but they fell off last year. If Williams reports in good condition they will have an outfield which is hard to beat. And Baltimore is going to win some ball games."

On Bill Skowron at first base—"There was a time I let the others know I didn't want him to go after them foul balls. But he worked on them and finally he was going after them and getting them."

On third base—"Tell me who's a better third baseman in the league, either league, than Andy Carey. I know he fell off in hitting last year, changed his stance 78 times. But two years ago he hit .300. Nothing wrong with him."

**Japanese Players Top Seedings For Tennis Ch'ships**

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Japanese players will top the seedings for the 1957 world table tennis championships here, it was announced Monday.

K. A. Raben, president of the Swedish Table Tennis Association, said Ichiro Ogimura, 1956 world champion, and Toshiaki Tanaka will be seeded first and second. Japan won four of the seven world champion titles in Tokyo 1956.

Britain's top entries, Richard Bergmann and Ann Haydon, will both be seeded fourth.

So far 365 players from 38 countries have entered for the championships March 7-15.

**WILLIAMS SIGNS**

BOSTON (AP) — Ted Williams, baseball's highest-paid player, signed with Boston Red Sox Wednesday for the 1957 season.

The 38-year-old slugger conferred with Joe Cronin, Boston general manager, and agreed to a contract.

No terms were announced but it was assumed he had signed again for about \$100,000, the same amount he has received in the last few years.

The contract is for one year. Neither Williams nor Cronin would comment on the amount but the big outfielder, agreeing to play his 16th season for the Sox said "it's very satisfactory to both parties."

**Saddler Hopes To Resume Career**

NEW YORK (AP)—Sandy Saddler, who retired as featherweight boxing champion last month because of impaired eyesight, said Wednesday he has solid hopes of resuming his ring career after hospital treatment.

"This doctor (Dr. Alexander Knapp) told me I had a very good chance of fighting again," said Saddler. "I'm sure glad to hear it."

Saddler has been in a hospital for a few days, undergoing special treatment. He received a head injury in an auto accident last summer that put him in the hospital for several weeks. He has not fought since then.

Hospital authorities said Saddler has suffered a detached retina in his right eye, resulting in blurred vision.

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The Milwaukee Braves, with a new all-time record for season ticket sales already set, have guaranteed themselves a 1957 home attendance of at least 838,744 two months before opening day.

**Metkovich Sold To Charleston**

VANCOUVER (CP)—Outfielder George Metkovich, rated Vancouver Mounties' No. 1 player in their first season in the Pacific Coast League in 1956, has been sold to Charleston of the American Association, general manager Cedric Tallis announced Wednesday.

Metkovich led PCL hitters in 1955 with a .335 average while with Los Angeles but dropped to .294 last year.

There was some doubt here whether Metkovich would report to Charleston. He owns a restaurant near Los Angeles and may retire from baseball.

**H. S. Students Build Houses**

NANAIMO, B.C. (CP) — Senior high school students are gaining practical experience by building houses on the school grounds.

The scheme, launched five years ago with the approval of the British Columbia education department, has the blessing of trade unions and building contractors.

Students have already built four houses and now are working on a fifth—a 900-square-foot six-room dwelling.

Supervised by carpenter-instructor Jack Parker, the boys do all the work from the blueprint stage right up to the finished product. When finished in May the house, which has about \$3,500 worth of materials in it, will be put up for sale by the school board to recover the cost.

Builders welcome the idea because it provides the companies with a reservoir of labor from which they can draw skilled labor and potential foremen.

At present 22 youths are on the job. Classes are divided between university and general program students.

Mr. Parker said that for the students it gives practical experience if they want to study architecture or engineering. The others have a training which can be developed in later life.

The house is built to NHA standards and has to have the approval of the building inspector. There never has been any shortage of home-seekers wanting to buy a house built by the students.
