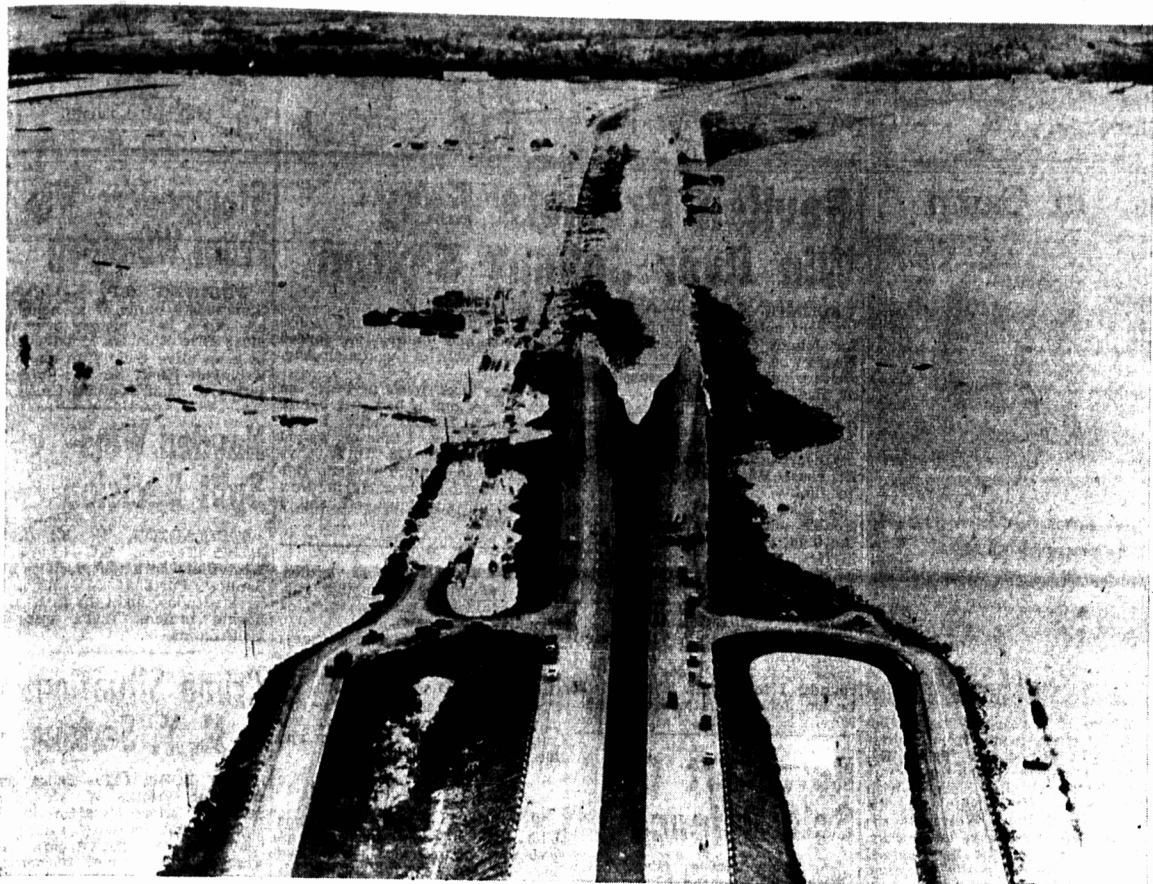


Flooded Highway 30 Miles From Toronto

Given Preview Of 1955 Models At Toronto Meeting

Mr. Allison MacLeod returned this week from the final session of the October 5 to 15 National General Motors Dealer Conventions in Toronto.

He described the record-breaking event, attended by 3,000 GM dealers and department heads from every Province and the Yukon Territory, as "the greatest automotive convention in terms of attendance and range of activities ever staged in Canada."

Commenting on the mammoth convention, which he attended in company with his department heads, Earle G. MacLeod, the Charlottetown Pontiac-Buick dealer said, "The high point of the program was the preview of the 1955 models, which are still under a very close security screen.

I may say that the new cars, which will be publicly announced later this Fall, have undergone the most complete re-designing in at least 15 years, and will offer startling improvements to drivers in the popular field."

The three-day Pontiac-Buick session, which concluded the history-making convention, was closed with a full table of events, Mr. MacLeod said.

Following the opening preview of the new cars, which were presented in a musical production starring ballet dancers and musicians, the program includes guided tours by special trains to

Oshawa and St. Catharines. At Oshawa the dealer party inspected the vast 47 1-2-acre GM passenger car assembly plant, Canada's largest by a great margin. Special guides at St. Catharines took the group through the most modern foundry in the world, one section of the new Grantham Township plants of McKinnon Industries, a General Motors division.

Among a number of luncheons, banquets and receptions was a ladies' luncheon that included a fashion show of the latest styles from New York and Paris.

On his return, Mr. MacLeod said, "The overwhelming success of this great convention was due largely to the powerful impression made by the advance showings of the 1955 models. My own view is that these cars will make as great an impression on the public in a few weeks' time as they did on the enthusiastic assembly of dealers in Toronto."

HAS RADIATION DISEASE

SAILS WITH PRODUCE—The M.V. Baronet sailed from Souris last evening with a cargo of 1,200 bags of table potatoes, 600 bags turnips, some eggs and four tons vegetables, for Red Bay, Labrador. The 95-ton vessel, registered at St. John's, Nfld., arrived in port Saturday afternoon. The cargo was loaded by Russell Ching of Souris. The M.V. Typhoon from the Magdalen Islands is now at Souris awaiting a cargo of produce for her home port. She is of 80-ton registry.

Reported Change In Ferry Plans

It is reported unofficially that the new Wood Islands-Caribou ferry which is to be built by the Federal Government may accommodate 60 cars with five lanes instead of 50 in four lanes as originally planned, and will cost two million dollars. The ship is to be built at the Ferguson Industries Ltd. shipyards in Pictou, N. S., but the formal awarding of the contract has been held up while these changes in design are being finalized. The government has not yet announced who will operate the service when the new boat is completed.

The following general particulars of the proposed new boat are for the original design calling for 50 cars and four car lanes: Length overall 250 feet; Breadth molded at auto deck 46 feet; Load draft even keel ten feet; Vehicular clearance auto deck two center lanes 14.3 feet (minimum); Vehicular clearance auto deck two outer lanes 7 feet (minimum); Speed on trials 14 1/2 knots.
